Noted Writer and Preacher Pleads the Cause of Unionism.

SPEAKS IN LONDON

A clarion call to war against denominationalism was the address on church union delivered in Ryerson school last night by Rev. Charles W. Gordon, D.D., of St. Stephen's church, Winnipeg, ex-moderator of the Presbyterian general assembly, and internationally known as Ralph Connor, author of many books on the great outdoors of Canada.

"The United Church of Canada stands for the evaporation of denominationalism," vigorously declared Dr. Gordon, "and for Christians coming together in a unity in Jesus Christ, the getting rid of de-

Then a movement began in church courts and among the ministers to find out how the people felt. A vote was taken in the diff-frent denominations which include the Anglicans and Baptists. For good and sufficient reasons they did not accept the invitation and the movement went forward without them.

In 1911 a vote was taken. It was found that there was strong opposition in all three churches; that an ideal apart from the people was undesirable.

Desired to Wait.

It was desired to wait, said the speaker. Came 1915, and again the Presbyterians were asked to vote. To the surprise of many the majority had increased about 23,000 against the union. Certainly the movement was not growing in favor but in disfavor.

oncurrent congregation will be cosily nd comfortably set down in 'the resbyterian church in Canada, 'or church with some other similar ame," continued Dr. Gordon, "but instead, such a congregation will find itself an isolated unit, not attached to any living church in the world until a new denomination is formed. "Anti-unionists have been saying that as Presbyterians we don't need to obey the assembly, but should be governed by the vote of the people," said the speaker, "and, therefore, when they draw up their doctrinal basis, they will have to include that in it, unless they have been deceiving the people all these years. I fancy that those astute brethren (the Pan-Presbyterian council) will have difficulty in accepting as Presbyterian a church like that since there is none like it in the world today.

"I would hate to be the man cheed with the duty of building up a new church in Canada," said Dr. Gordon, "overridden as it is now by denominations that should be united." "Anti-unionists have been saying



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
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
