RAILWAY MATTERS.

The announcement given out by the general manager of the Chatham, Wallaceburg & Lake Erie Electric Railway, that the work of strengthening the Third street bridge will be commenced at once, is one which will be received with relief by the citizens of Chatham. This is a matter which has been the subject of aldermanic discussions, and replies from the railway officials for some months, and the majority of the citizens have long since given up try-ing to figure out the city's position. In the meantime the city has been left openly responsible for any accident and the resultant damages which might have happened. Fortunately, however, no accidents have occurred, as a result of the weak condition of the bridge, and the city treasury has not been effected. The present announcement that the bridge will be immediately strengthened will insure the city against any possible trouble in the future.

It seems to be reasonable from the explanations of the railway company, that they have not been entirely to blame for the delay in this work. Mr. Kizer has shown letters corroborating his claims that the company have been anxious to proceed with the work but were unable to procure the necessary steel. The first shipment of steel is expected to arrive in the city in the course of a couple of weeks, but in the meantime the concrete work and piling will be immediately proceeded with.

It is generally hoped that when this bridge difficulty is successfuly disposed of, the company will see fit to carry out their original intention of extending their line to the lake. Speaking of railways, there is a matter in connection with some of the steam railways of this city which has been the source of much annoyance and inconvenience to citizens of late. There is a necessity for a considerable amount of shunting in Chatham, but there is no excuse for blocking up streets with freight cars for indefinite periods of time when pedestrians and teamsters are waiting to cross the tracks. These forced de lays, especially when they are caused to workmen and scholars during the noon hour, are exceedingly annoying and the results are sometimes most unpleasant.

Some time ago it was suggested that the C. P. R. should be required to place gates at their crossing on Wellington street near the Hadley factory. It is not known what ac tion followed, but in any case results are not evident. The Council should take some action in this matter. It is thought that if the proper representations were made to the company, and particular stress laid upon the great need for protection, they would not hesitate to supply the necessary gates. This is one of the most dangerous spots in the city, and hardly a year passes without the necessity for recording some teamster's narrow escape at this perilous crossing. After each accident the agitation for gates is renewed. The Council should not wait until someone is killed, before they stir themto take the matter up with the company, to see if this danger cannot be removed before both the city and the company have cause to regret

BORDEN USES BIG STICK

Opposition Scores The New Intermediate Tariff

'TIS A MERE PLAYTHING

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—The two new members from Montreal were introduced to the House yesterday afternoon, amid considerable applause from the

amid considerable applause from the supporters of the Government. Both gentlemen were supported by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. L. P. Brodeur. The First Minister addressed Mr. Speaker in English when presenting Joseph C. Walsh (St. Anne), and in French when presenting Mederic Martin (St. Mary's).

To Assist Cold Storage.

Mr. Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, moved the House into committee to consider a proposed resolution declaring:

consider a proposed resolution declaring:

"That it is expedient to pass an act to encourage the establishment of cold storage warehouses for the preservation of perishable food products by granting aid out of the public funds towards the cost of construction of such warehouses."

He explained that legislation was sought, authorizing the Government during the next fiscal year, to expend \$1,000,000 for the establishment of cold storage warehouses for the better pre-

storage warehouses for the better pre-servation of perishable food products.

The Minister of Agriculture will be

empowered to enter into a contract at his discretion with persons or com-panies establishing local cold storage

panies establishing local cold storage depots. Upon the completion of any such plant to the satisfaction of the Minister, 10 per cent. of its costs is to be paid by the Government, and later on an additional 20 per cent.

The Government is to retain control of the rates to be charged for the service, and to prescribe the temperature at which the cooling rooms are to be kept. The act will not apply to cold storage warehouses already in existence, but an effort will be made not to have these Government-aided establishments started up in localities not to have these Government-aided establishments started up in localities where they will compete with existing cold storage warehouses.

The Intermediate Tariff.

The Intermediate Tariff.

Respecting the so-called intermediate tariff, Mr. Fielding stated that he did not anticipate that it would ever become effective as to the United States. The people of that country gave no sign of favoring reciprocal legislation. The Government would not attempt to extend the intermediate tariff to any country. So many nations had "favored nation clauses" in their treaties with Great Britain that to lower the duties to one would automatically lower them as to many others. This would apply, however, to Germany or the United States, for they had no such treaties with the mother country.

mother country.

Revolutionary.

Hon. George E. Foster denounced the intermediate tariff. It was revo-lutionary. The Governor-in-Council at any time might so reduce the duties against the United States as to seriously endanger our manufacturing in-

iously endanger our manufacturing interests.

Mr. Fielding thought that Mr. Foster was unduly alarmed. The permitted reduction was only 21-3 to 5 per cent of the general tariff. Opening the book at random, he selected the item of hair oil. Would there be any danger of revolution if the duty on hair oil, for example, was 321-2, instead of 35 per cent.?

R. L. Borden pointed out that there seemed to be no principle upon which this novel legislation rested. He was surprised at Mr. Fielding's confession that United States reciprocity was out of the question. No such language was heard from the Liberals when they were trying to get into pewer on the platform of continental free trade.

Hon. John Haggart also criticized the Government, and Mr. Foster pointed out that the reductions if made in favor of the United States, might disturb Canadian industries and lower the British preference.



STATES LACK DEVELOPMENT

Salient Points In Roosevelt's Letter To Congress

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Washington, D.C., Dec. 5.—The President of the United States com-municated his annual message to Con-gress yesterday. The salient points in

the message are:

He advocates consideration by Congress of a progressive inheritance tax to reduce great fortunes.

He advocates the supervision by license or otherwise of all corporations other than railways doing interstate commerce business.

commerce business.

He advocates a bill providing for a more elastic currency.

Besides the reading of the reports of the various officers of the Society, a very interesting feature of the evening's program was the lecture on Children's Aid work, given by Mr. S. M. Thompson, of Brantford. Mr. Thompson's address took up the latter part of the evening, when he spoke for about an hour or so on the good work which the Children's Aid Societies were accomplishing all over the Province. Mr. Thompson is enthusiastic over the noble cause for which he strives, and his address was most interesting. His remarks were illustrated by lantern views thrown on a canvas. Mr. R. Killop operated the slides of the machine in satisfactory style.

Mr. Thompson is a man who by nature is admirably fitted for children special talloring business in the city of Brantford in order that he may devote his entire time in the interests of the Society. His address here was more than appreciated by all present. Rev. W. S. Rutledge opened the proceedings with prayer, after which Mr. D. S. Paterson, who presided, made a short address. This report stated that eleven meetings had been held during the year, and referred to the encouragement with which the Society had met on every side. Dr. Bray's work was also referred to in flattering tones in this report.

A vocal solo by Miss Rosg preceded the Treasurer's report read by Mr. Fred. Stone, which showed the Society's financial standing to be in a flourishing condition. The report of the convenor on clothing and supplies was next read by Mrs. Sheldon.

judge, the case has to be dropped,
and correction and help has to be
withheld. R. V. BRAY'S REPORT.

During the year I have made 99 visits in connection with our work, which is 15 more than in 1905. Thirty-one of these were out of town in vestigating complaints, visiting houses where some assistance in the way of clothing and food was necessary, but where no cause existed for the greenwar of the child; attending the County Court, having runaway children and in the other cases secure an order making the child a ward of the Society. The total distance travelled would total a great many miles, and when at some of these visits lengthy and frequently somewhat stormy interviews were necessary, so you will see that a lot of valuable time was spent in the work.

The number of letters written during the year were 181 compared with the requests came from various towns in the county and in Chatham. The homes, with one or two exceptions, were very suitable ones, and I carresponded with the Torcant of the promote of the homes. There are still six or seven bomes offering for children ranging in age from 4 to 12 years. Our society, this year as last, sought financial aid from the villages, towns and township councils in the county. Some of them responded nobly, others did not respond at all.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the Board and especially the president, Mr. Patterson, for the assistance which they so kindly rendered us during the year, and for the generous expression of approval of the work which I have tried so faithfully to perform. Some changes in the Board will occur, but I sincerely hope that whoever may be appointed on the Board to fill the evacancies will recognize the necessity that exists for this work and the fact that they will hive to do their fair share in that work.
