The wit ness then detailed wfiat occurred in conversation with the defendant and with Thomas Chisholm, and aceoriling to his textimony nothing improper was said by hiw. Constable Arnold carFohorated this evirience insofar as it connected him with the dffair: but asserted that Le and Cunningham sep. aratel soon after-they left the Groto saloon. Constahle Routh testified that upon heling informed of the atfair, he bil taiked with the prisoner, Tom Chisholm, Thomas Sparks, and one suith, with a view of ascertaining whio was responsible for the marked cards. ## PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Where in the civilized world is ther a town of the age and size of Dawsn which has no public school. Dawson is well alung in its third year as town. It has been built upon lines so substantial and is backed by resource so extensive as to wariant the belief that it has a long and prosperous life before it.

We have some half dozen church organi ations, a paid fire department, an extensive police service, government officials by the score, soldiers stationer bere to see that we observe the laws, commercial companies with millions of capital invested, banks, newspapers and other business enterprises, such as are found in every progressive com munity, but still we bave yet to see the day when it can be amnounced that Diwson has a public school supporter by public funds and open free of charge to the several hundred children who are now in the city.

This condition certainly should not prevail. It is a reflection upon our in . telligence as a community that such a condition does jrevail. In the early days of the town's history an excuse might have been found in the fact that the number of children was very limit ed. But for the past 18 months there has been no room to advance such an excuse. There has been a steady inerease in the number of families per manently located in Dawson and at the present time there are several hundied children of school age in town.
Should Dawson become an ucorporat ed municipality, the matter would doubtless be taken up immediately, but in the event that such should not prove to be the case the council should take action to provid some sort of educutional facilities at the earliest possible moment,

John Collins, one of the old land marks in Seattle, has been nominated as the candidate of the Democratic purty for the mayorally of that city. Culins was major of the Sound metrop ohs at one time in the early days and his been afflicted with the buzzing of the political bee ever since. He was the heaviest owner in the Telegraph, a Democratic newspaper which he hoped to use as a lever to force himselt into high office, but it served only to deplete his pocketbook and was finally absorbed by the Post-Intelligencer. The nomi. nation of Collins is probably regarded by the Democratic leaders of Seattle as a harniless method of repaying one who has often stood sthe brunt of Democtacy's financial requirements, for Collins has abont as much show to win in Seattle as Bryan has to win before the country.
Politicians in the States are keenly alive to the importance of Incle Sam's alive to the importance of Tncle Sam's
Alaskah appointments. The judgeships
re very much sought after, and the wires are being pulled strenuousty in
favor of various candidates. Evidently the iexperience of Judge Johnson must hagistrate har only exercised the powe's of his office for a short time when he felt called upon to resign the rubes of office in order to give attention to the demands of his growing private interests. Undoubtediy the ermine ca be made the stepping stone to the cquirement of valuable private inter ests in Alaska, añd it is a question whether the dignity and honors of office or the posssihilities of acquring wealth in the gold fields present the mos attractiuns to the ambitious politicians who seem so rearly to sacrifice thei personal comfort to the service of Uncle Sam in far away Alaska.

London gave itself over to the cele bration of a holiday upon the receipt of the news of the relief of Ladysmith. The rejoicing is universal over the em pire. With Cronje, the pride of the Boer army, in the hands of the British, a serious blow has been struck at the Boers: The war is not at an end by any means, but without doubt the entering wellge has been plared which ultumately will mean the defeat of the Boers. How long they will be able to prolong the struggle is an open question Should all their forces be corcentrated 0 oppose Roherts, and a pitched battl ensue, the end may be reacher earlier than is anticipated.

Presents a Serious Question Not Easily Solved.

Mine-Owners Assert That It Tends o Retard the Development of the Country.

The system so generally in vogue in the Yukon, that of letting lays on mining claims, is peculiar to the countro. Undoubtedly, if is the outgrowth of the bond and lease contracts, which obtain in the mineral bearing districts of Brit ish Columbra and the United States, but local customs and written agree ments have so modified the character of "lays," that there exists only a mere furmal contract of bond and lease the furmal contract of bond and lease. In fact, there are no lowsuits, relating to the interpretation of lay agreements either express or implied, excepting such precedents as have been established by the territorial court in this judicial
district. This mode of developing mining property was devised, to meet the strange conditions existing here. Most of the claim owners, in the early days of the camp, were not anle to near
the exnenses necessarily incident to the develupment of their properties, uthers were not disposed to spend much money in prospect work, and their ground was opened by laymen Perbaps many of the conditions which occasioned the custom, have passed away; it may be true that this manner of developing property has survived its usefulness; but it is questionable indeed if the time mill ever come when lay agree
ments shall be totally discarded in the ments shall be totally discarded in the Yukon.
Whether the lay system is advantageous or not to the industry of mining in this territory is a serious question, and one not easily determined. Without doubt the misciirected efforts of men unskilled in mining who nevertheless secured lays on valualle property, have retarded the developinent of some good creeks. Sulphur is periaps the most assertion. A year ago last fall innumerable lays were let by the claim owners the laymen soon became dis-atisfied and q it their properties; bad sepurts were based upun their judgment; and as a result wrong ideas respesting the worth of Sulphur properties were entertained by the people generally. It is unly witnin the past six months that these false impressions have been eradicated, and the value of the creek has been㲘 opment work of the claim owners themselves
There are two sifles to every question. and the one in respect to lays is no exception to the rale Most of the men who own claims asse t that the cnstom of lays operates disudvantageously to the district generally. They contend that laymen do not thoroughty prospect the ground, and that they are too easily discouraged. When the claim has been ahandoned by-a layman its-market value immeliately dectease. On the ather hand, it is affirmed that innumerable goad clarms have been opened by laymen, and that the system has been and is of incalculabie benefit to the terridoes not care to be munted owner who does not care to be quoted or the reason that several of his properties are let on lays, said
. gave rise to the lay eustom are passing away. I to not favor the system for the reason that it dors not tend to thor: oughly prospect virgin ground; and the unsuccessul efforts of a layman too fre quently place a false estimate on the worth of the pruperty which he has abandoried.
