For a whole year the British and Cape Governments dallied with the situation thus created. When at last a formal protest was made by the Cape to the British Government, her Majesty's Ministers had come to the conclusion that it was too late to do anything. They had trusted the German assurance, and had been deceived and forestalled. Togoland went to come to the conclusion that it was too Germany in much the same way, and so did the Cameroon. In both places, as in German South-West 'Africa, German traders prepared the way, and when the time came the German Government backed their claims. That way also went German East Africa, Here, too, the German Government gave to Great Britain the assurance that she was not endeavouring to obtain a protectorate over Zanzibar, Such a pledge could have only one meaning. At the moment when it was given a German expedition, under the notorious Karl Peters, was perambulating the interior of the Sultan's territory. Nominally, its objects were exploration and trade.
