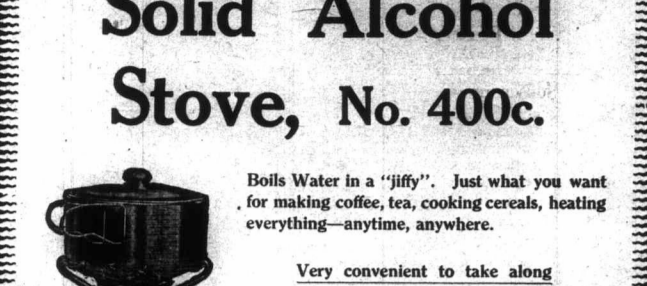

GERMAN AFRICA

THE GERMAN AFRICA. Their aims on the Dark Continent and how they acquired the African Colonies. By Evans Lewis. (Casell, No. 64, 1st ed.)

THE POLITICAL GEOGRAPHY OF AFRICA BEFORE AND AFTER THE WAR. An address delivered before the Royal Geographical Society on February 24, 1915. By Sir Harry H. Johnston.

M. R. Lewin's book is timely and much more than timely, extremely well and lucidly done. It handles a big subject with a just sense of proportion, with a rigid suppression of superfluous detail, and with a moderation of tone which marks thorough knowledge of the subject and a constant thought for the object in view. Criticisms there might well be made as they are, we hasten to have done with them. The chief is that the book as a whole is perhaps too drab in tone, too sober and unemotional, too consciously subjected to a rigid restraint in the writing, for such a subject. It holds in the suggestion of drama that is the life of all history. Mr. Lewin sees German aims and ambitions in Africa almost wholly as the machinations of statesmen and their agents. He shows up all the great men that lay behind these cool and deliberate and calculating schemes; the yearnings for Empire of the German people; their passionate resentment against other nations which had such a long start of Germany in the race of colonial expansion; above all, the effect of German acquisitions upon the native races that were brought under their rule. In this respect Sir Harry Johnston's pamphlet is infinitely superior. It holds in its pages more of the glow and fire of national rivalry and of the human agony that has resulted from it, through thousands upon thousands of miles of African territory, than Mr. Lewin has got to more than that the pamphlet is the work of a man who has seen distinguished service as an African administrator. We would not press such a comparison, which, on a point like this, would be to do to the work of an exceptionally able and sympathetic student. One other criticism can be as lightly touched. Mr. Lewin's references are not always complete, or self-explanatory. Page 216, where a quotation is given from a report by Sir Percy Fitzpatrick as though he was the author of the passage cited, is an example.

What Mr. Lewin has brought out, with admirable clearness and with an exact sense of proportion, is the deliberate and long-planned progress of German schemes in Africa. He makes us see the leaders of German policy poring over the map of Africa and putting their finger with an almost malign far-sightedness upon certain essential spots. "Here we must go; here and here. This must be joined with that. Here we must establish towns, here drive railways, here win some scrap of territory now held by Britain, or France, or Belgium." At each step the sense of this scheming, this implacable determination, grows more and more strongly upon the reader as he goes from page to page. And every-where, in the German view, the means have justified the end. Sharp practice, false assurances, ruthless treatment of native races, alternate coaxing and bullying of France and Belgium, contemptuous spurning of Great Britain—the record of all these things is everywhere. Mr. Lewin can have felt little surprise at the revelation of German's thoughts and ways that the war has brought to most Englishmen. He knew them all before, as would anyone who had troubled to become familiar with German progress in Africa.

A few examples of this may not be amiss. On February 7, 1893, Count Herbert Bismarck, speaking as the accredited agent of the German Government, assured the British representative that Germany had not "the least design to establish any footing in South Africa." Almost exactly two months later, in April, the German Government was hoisted on the coast of what since been German South-West Africa. For a whole year the British and Cape Governments dalled with the situation thus created. When at last a formal protest was made by the Cape to the British Government, her Majesty's Ministers had come to the conclusion that it was too late to do anything. They had trusted the German assurance, and had been deceived and forestalled. Topland went to Germany in much the same way, and so did the Cameroon. In both places, as in German South-West Africa, German traders prepared the way, and when the time came the German Government backed their claims. That way also went German East Africa. Here, too, the German Government gave to Great Britain the assurance that she was not endeavouring to obtain a protectorate over Zanzibar. Such a pledge could have only one meaning. At the moment when it was given a German expedition, under the notorious Karl Peters, was permeating the interior of the Sultan's territory. Nominally, its objects were exploration and trade. Actually, it was busy engaged in exacting concessions of territory from the tribal chiefs. When the inevitable claim to the territory came, the British Government again gave way. This case is the more flagrant because in the same month (November, 1884) in which this particular assurance was given by Germany to Great Britain an International Conference met at Berlin, under the presidency of Bismarck. It purported to settle the spheres of influence of the European Powers in Africa. Germany, who knew what her agents were doing in East Africa; and to the conference Germany said nothing.

The Kaiser's visit to Tangier in 1905, the humiliation of France that followed the Agadir crisis of 1911, were all parts of the same campaign. Germany wanted colonial possessions in Africa, and got them by these methods. But most of all she wanted a port on the north coast of Africa. As Sir Harry Johnston says: "The Germans never took their eyes off North Africa. . . . If there was one point more than another, another work more upon the Atlantic coast of Morocco it was the Bay of Agadir, which is the only position on that coast where, with a comparatively moderate expenditure of money, a really good naval harbour might be made. . . . Germany would begin here with such a thing, some fortified place which would require months of siege and great expenditure of life to take from her; and from such a point would, of course, eventually achieve her ambition of dominating North Africa. . . . And, unless that aim for the moment, she wrung from France, as the price of peace, concessions in West Africa which brought her colony of Cameroon to the valley of the Congo. So it all hangs together, and Englishmen who have been blind to it for so long might do much worse than take and read Mr. Lewin's book—and have their eyes opened. We would add one warning, let them not be too much fascinated by his chapter on 'The Future of the German Colonies.' That is a particularly thorny subject. In approaching it, it is as well not to forget, as he is perhaps inclined to do, that these vast territories are the dwelling-places of millions of native people. Their destinies cannot lightly be handed over to the hands of any nation whose ambitions might be gratified by a present of territory in Africa.—The Times Literary Supplement.

WEALTHY BRITONS KILLED IN THE WAR

In The Beacon of May 6 and 27 we printed lists, compiled from "Wills and Bequests" in various issues of The Times, London, of wealthy Britons who were either killed in action or lost their lives through wounds received, in the present war. The following is an extension of the list, similarly compiled. —

Lieutenant Colonel Hamilton Regt., W. killed in action, unsettled property
Second Lieutenant John Andrew Stobart, Rifle Brigade, killed in action, unsettled personal estate, 39,901
Captain Erasmus Darwin Parker, 2nd Manchester Regt., killed in action, unsettled property 38,452
Major Chas. Ernest Higginbotham, 2nd Northamptonshire Regt., killed in action, unsettled property 28,924
Lieutenant Colonel Arthur Lousada (26), 2nd R. Sussex Regt., killed in action, unsettled property 25,405
Lieutenant Edward Arthur Lousada (26), 2nd R. Sussex Regt., killed in action, unsettled property 25,405
Commander Charles Dundas, R.N., H.M.S. Monmouth, who was killed in action of the Chilean Coast; unsettled personal estate in U.K. 4,567
Lieutenant Thomas Uchter Caulfield, from a post in the Coldstream Guards, saw service in the South African War, and was afterwards A. D. C. to his father, Lord Mansfield, while Governor-General of New Zealand, and who was killed in action at Quinchy, France, on February 1st, 1915, aged 39 years, left unsettled property of the gross value of £2,900, with net personalty £1,023. In his will he stated: "I have left in any way attempting to fetter the discretion of the guardians of my infant children, his wish was that his sons should follow some profession as a career, and that his son who should be heir-apparent to the Earlom of Ranfurly should be educated at Eton and, unless he should prefer some other career, enter the Coldstream Guards and remain there until he attains captain's rank. In leaving the residue of his property to his wife, he recommended that her marriage would honour rather than cast a slur upon his memory, and that if she should be left a widow, she should be half of her disposable property to their children.

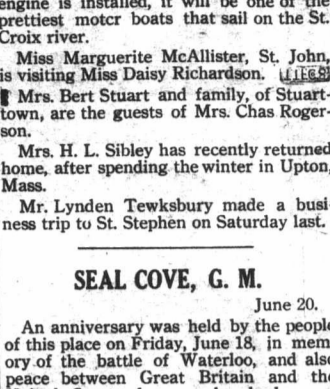
