GROWEH OF THE HUMAN NAILS.—I stained the roots of my finger nails on the first of last August, to find out the exact time a healthy nail took form—in other words, to find out how often a man changed his finger nails. On the 14th of this month ail the old nails had disappeared: thus it took exactly four months and fifteen days to form new nails. Allowing this period to be the average time for the complete renewal of the human nail, a man who lives to 70 years has had each nail renewed 186 timer—in other words, he wears out 1860 finger nails in 70 years. In the four and a half months I could distinguish no difference in the periods of formation—the growth was gradual and systematic, from week to week, without eny variation. I stained the nails with corrosive sublimate; the color was tawny; and was not the least affected with all its numerous vashings and exposure to the air. My occupation is nedentary; the nails may grow faster of some, and slower on other individuals, according to their constitutions, or the particular occupations in which they may be engaged.—Scientific American.
