SINOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of atleast 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter. Duties—Six months residence in each of

per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, acruiby or stany land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

LONDON, June 21.—Confirmatory reports of the cutting in two of General Pflanger's army in Bukowina are contained in a despatch to the Star from Petrograd to-day. When the Austrians retired from Czernowitz, says the correspondent, part of them retreating due south along the Roumanian border and others toward the Carpathians, there was no time to hold the Russians on the fortified line running from Kuty to Sereth along the Rivers Mikhodra and Sereth. But, despite the delay caused by the prolonged defence of Czernowitz, General Letchitzky threw his reserves upon the heels of the retreating Austrians at such speed that he succeeded in reaching that line simultane-

The result was that General Pflanger's forces were cut in half midway between Kuty and Sereth at Stroginet.

London Chamber of Commerce Has Ideas on the Subject.

London, June 21 .- (Correspond

ence of the Associated Press)—The London Chamber of Commerce at a ecent special meeting adopted resoutions favoring reciprocal trading elations between the British Emire and Allied countries after the war; preferential reciprocal trading elations between all parts of the British Empire; favorable treatment of neutral nations; regulation by tariff or otherwise of trade relations with all "enemy countries" to render sible a return to pre-war con itions, and for stimulating the development of home manufactures and the consequent increased employment of native labor; and that steps should be taken to prevent dumping (and under valuation) of "enemy goods" into British markets fter the war.

It was suggested that a tentative tariff for five years on an ad valor-em basis might be applied, subject to negotiations with all parties concerned for the settlement of a scientific tariff with specific duties, if the latter should be considered preferable. The Dominions should however, be left free to determine their fiscal relations with Allied neutral and "enemy" countries, unless it were agreed that the Home and Dominion Governments should act together in the negotiations. After consultation with various interests a committee drew up a tentative tariff, the duties under which vary from 30 per cent. maximum, to 10 per cent. maximum ad valorem, for wholly manufacturel goods, to five per cent maximum on raw foodstuffs. (some being admitted free). Raw materials would be exempt from duty. Alcoholic drinks, tobacco and other articles now subject to duties would bear an extra fifty per cent when imported from enemy countries and a substantial duty would be imposed on German and Austrian mineral waters.

The New Zealand kakapo, or large parrot, with all its credit for brains, allows itself to be caught in a very simple manner. In the dusk of the early dawn the Maoris, carrying tame kakapos tied to long sticks, set off to hunt. These are the call-birds used to attract by their screams the large flocks of kakapos flying overhead. When one Maori tethers the call-birds by the leg, and sets them screaming to the full extent of their lusty lungs, another cuts as many perches as there are men in the hunting party from the neighboring bush.
