CLOSING EXERCISES

The examinations and closing exercises of Principal Patterson's school took place on Tuesday last. The weather was delightful and more than the usual number of the parents of the boys and other visitors were present. The class examinations were up to the usual average. Particularly noticeable were the classes of Mr. Tait, in French, Mr. McGill's class in chemistry and botany, and Miss Fulton's class in book-keeping. Mr. Tait has the correct accent and a most admirable way of teaching the French language and the class had caught the inspiration of the leader.

At the noon hour the tables in the large dining room were filled with the boys and guests and ample justice done to the good things provided by the very efficient matron, Mrs. Armstrong and her helpers, under the supervision of Miss Annie Patterson, who always assists at these critical periods in the internal economy of the school. If the boys' capacity for learning equals their capacity for the good things of the table, certainly they will go home well filled with knowledge.

In the afternoon the examination continued and closed with a dumb-bell exercise outdoors led by Mr. Patterson.

In the evening the Hall was filled with an appreciative audience and delighted with an excellent program. The patriotic songs by the Glee Club and the vocal and instrumental music by others, were very good. The original essays by P. Moore, Wm. Eaton and Miss Gerie Curry were all very creditable and the recitations were well learned and well delivered without exception. Mr. McGill's address, "The Requirements of the Times," was a most timely and eloquent paper, which should be published for the reading public. At the close there were addresses by several gentlemen and the Principal's report. The school has numbered from 45 to 60 boarders and some day scholars and has been most prosperous.

The boys in Miss Fulton's class, presented her with \$10 as a mark of their esteem and appreciation of her teaching abilities and kindness of heart, to which she replied in just the right spirit and words. Miss Fulton is very popular and is doing good work in the school. She has been engaged for another year. There will be some changes in the teaching staff, but the old school will be all ready for work at the beginning of another term, with a good staff of teachers as usual.

Work has begun on the new iron bridge near the aboiteau. W R Huntley, a native of this town was here Wednesday renewing all acquaintances.

Dr. Fuller, Hortonville, is erecting a large barn. It will be fitted with water works and modern conveniences.

The hay press run by Mr. Shaw of this town has finished work at Grand Pre, after putting up some 1000 tons.

Mr Grant, formerly with F B Newcombe & Co. Kentville, now travelling for Kenny & Co., Halifax, was in Hantsport last Wednesday on business.

Arthur day was observed by the Grand Pre school. The teacher, Miss Francis Crowe of Kentville, assisted by her pupils, planted trees, made flower beds and smoothed up grounds.

Capt Frank Dodge and Abijah Pearsons of this town went to Palmer Lake fishing last week. Among the number caught was a fine trout landed by the captain, weighing nearly three pounds.

Capt MacKinlay has the keel laid at his shipyard, Mt. Denson, for a large vessel. Having a good saw mill in connection, it is a great help in the work of getting out material for building his ship.

A gay party of townspeople went in a big team to Davison Lake Saturday. They report a very pleasant time and lots of fish - in the lake. However, they caught a good number of the finny tribe, and returned home in the evening, hungry and happy.

There have been quite a number of property transfers near Lawson's corner, Kings Co. lately. Somerville McMillan has purchased Geo. Power's property at that place. George Power bought Ingram Gould's place in Waterville, and Mr Gould has purchased a property in Somerset.

The editor while prowling around down Mt. Denson way, seeking what he might devour, strolled into the precincts of the Aberdeen Beach. Two new cottages have been erected and the grounds will be fitted up for a rushing business. I discovered a robin's nest in the corner of one of the picnic houses, the first family to take up their abode at this popular seaside resort, this season.

The vessel will be a three-masted schooner, 300 tons, 112 foot keel, depth of hold 11 1/2 feet. New York and local parties are interested, the work here being looked after by W C Balecm, one of our most enterprising men. It is hoped this vessel is the first of a large number to be built here, and Hantsport may become again a centre of the ship-building industry. There seems to be no reason why the work should not go on. It pays to build wooden ships elsewhere, and why not right here?

Ezra Churchill of this town had planted on his farm at Mt Denson last spring a large orchard of fruit trees. They consisted of 1500 apple trees of standard varieties, and pear and plum trees, covering 25 or 30 acres. This spring a person walking over the orchard could not find a single one which did not show signs of life. In fact they are all leaved out and doing finely. Mr Churchill has laid out a nice wire fence around the orchard, and fixed the road sidewalk in good shape. The orchard is the subject of much comment by passers-by and shows the owner knows his business. The trees were purchased from the Newport Nursery Co. I am informed Mr Churchill intends erecting a new house on the premises in a short time.

COAL AT LOCKHARTVILLE

Another find of coal, the best struck yet, was discovered a few days ago, by Chas. Sweet, on his farm at Lockhartville. Last February in following up a creek he came across a seam of coal. HANTSPORT AS A SUMMER RESORT

Hantsport should become the most popular summer resort of Nova Scotia.

The beautiful Avon river flows by its picturesque shores and from its bluffs in full view is the historic Minas Basin, with old Blomidon rising in grandeur, the proudest promontory of North America. The great ebb and flow of the tides is a wonder to the stranger, their sweeping current cleansing the rivers, creeks and streams. Within an hours drive is the old home of "Sam Slick," the first humorist of America, and almost within sight of the Hantsport hills, is the prairie, where once dwelt Emeline Labiche, better known as Evangeline.

Long before the Frenchmen stemmed the mighty Fundy, Glooscap, it is said, gave a great banquet to his loving subjects, the Micmacs, on the shores of Minas waters, and then departed in his great canoe, while the winds sang mournfully through the forest.

Hantsport contains citizens bearing a name which descended probably from the largest body of settlers who ever landed in New England. Many are the legends of this charming section of Acadia. The health-giving breezes, with fragrant fields and woodland dells, combine to give Hantsport the elements necessary to make it a resort to be sought after by the great and increasing population of the Northern States and elsewhere.

A private firm might be organized as a company, to purchase the old Davison property, that fine bluff overlooking the river - a large pavilion for dancing, etc., might be erected with kitchen and lunch counter attached. Bathing houses could be put up along the bank, with steps leading to the beach, also swings and a merry-go-round. The hotels of Hantsport are good, and the citizens might let out some of their rooms, and in time a summer hotel could be erected on the highest part of the bluff.

Publishers of Railroad and Steamship guide books could be notified of the new summer resort.

I have visited most of the resorts of the United States and Canada and the location of Hantsport is as pleasing as any I have seen and compares favorably with western New York state.

His subjects will love him the more for his desire to perpetuate the memory of our late Sovereign. Over six decades of Queen Victoria's reign only made her people sing with increased fervor as the years have gone by—God Save the Queen. Now, though Victoria the Good is dead, to-day millions of hearts will echo the old song and without any lack of loyalty to our King, Victoria will remain first in our thoughts. The 24th of May has become so much associated in the minds of the people with the celebration of British sovereignty that it would be a positive wrench to our feelings to allow the date to pass without public recognition. We will still celebrate Victoria Day and time which heals all wounds will gradually transfer our affections and loyalty from the memory of the Queen to the King who now rules and has inherited the virtues of his mother.

Mr. Foster will settle in Toronto as manager of the Union Trust Company, a new organization, of which Dr. Oronhyantekha, supreme chief ranger of the Independent Foresters, is chief promoter.

Scotts Act Inspector Cummings of N. Sydney has been committed to stand trial on both charges preferred against him for perjury.
