EX-SOLDIER COMMITTS SUICIDE AT TRACADIE

Bathurst, N. B., February 9.—(Special).—Mysterious circumstances appear to surround the death of Basile Thomas, an ex-soldier of Tracadie, Gloucester County, which took place on the 29th of January.

Thomas committed suicide by cutting his throat with a razor. His dead body was found by his mother when she went to call him to a meal.

Evidence taken at the inquest, which lasted a day and a half, revealed the circumstances under which the deceased had lived since returning from the war. It appears that he was living in a little shack not far distant from his parents' home, preferring to live there alone rather than join the family circle.

On the forenoon of the day on which his dead body was discovered he had called at his father's house for the loan of a razor, presumably to shave with. It was clear from the condition in which the deceased was found that he had actually attempted to shave himself before taking his life. Two great gashes, obviously the work of the razor, were found on his neck. One of them was four inches long, and the other, representing a cross, three inches long.

HAD ENLISTED IN U. S.

In replying to the questions of the Coroner, Mr. Bernard Roussel, the mother of the deceased declared that until he went to war he was perfectly normal in all respects. At the time of the outbreak of the war he was living in the United States, enlisted in American Expeditionary Forces and went overseas with them. After the armistice he returned home, but he was never the same. It was at this point that Mrs. Thomas made the remarkable statements concerning the movements of her son.

In the fall of 1919, she said, two strange men came and took him away with them. He was gone for several weeks but returned home. It was then that the deceased built the little shack for himself to live in. In the following year, however, he was taken away again, but this time he returned after an absence of only eight days. His father brought him into the house and upon examining his person found him wounded. A doctor was called, and upon his instructions, the poor fellow was ordered to the hospital. He would not stay there however and shortly afterwards he returned to his little shack.

FOUND BY HIS MOTHER

On Sunday, January 29th, his mother went out to the shack to give him his supper but to her great astonishment she found the door fastened up on the inside. Upon looking around she discovered, to her horror, drops of blood under the door. She pushed

ed the door open and entered to find the body of her son, face downwards, on the floor, in a pool of blood. He had his head covered with a white cloth. Mrs. Thomas informed her husband of the tragedy immediately. The razor, which the deceased had borrowed earlier in the day, was found on the floor near the body. From the evidence of the doctor it was rendered clear that the young man had committed suicide.

The funeral was held on the 31st of January.

Needless to say the sad occurrence had evoked a great deal of talk in the district.

HAD GONE AWAY WITH MILITARY OFFICERS.

Bathurst, N. B., Feb. 9.—It was learned later that the men who took Thomas away, were officers from Fredericton, and that they were authorized to do so by the Military authorities, Thomas being regarded as still requiring medical supervision.

HENRY FORD ISSUES

CHEQUE FOR \$8,000,000
Detroit, Feb. 11.—A cheque for \$8,000,000 bearing Henry Ford's signature, was turned over today to Ralph Stone, receiver of the Lincoln Motor Company, completing the transaction whereby Mr. Ford becomes owner of the Lincoln property, sold at auction last Saturday. The deeds when filed for record for Mr. Ford will bear \$40,000 worth of revenue stamps.

CAMPBELLTON WINS LAST LEAGUE GAME

Last Night's Game Gives League to Campbellton With One Goal to Spare.

The sensational clash between Campbellton and Chatham on the latter's ice Wednesday night resulted—if the principles of sportsmanship are to be adhered to—in Campbellton winning the Northern Section of the N. B. and P. E. I. league by a victory of 3 to 1.

The excitement of all those interested in the game was aroused yesterday afternoon when word was received that Wilkie the referee appointed to handle the contest, had missed his train in Halifax. Manager Alexander of the Campbellton team immediately got into communication with A. Sterling president of the league but this merely gave birth to a "double referee" controversy—a disgusting repetition of that infamous wrangle which was a prelude to the deciding game between Campbellton and Chatham last year. Campbellton refused to play and the game was called off.

Finally, about 6.45, a telegram was received from Sterling appointing Kirk Murray and Thos. Gilbert official referees of the game. Campbellton finally agreed to play under protest.

At 8.45 the uproarious clamoring of the 1800 fans present temporarily subsided into tense expectancy when the teams appeared and the belated game was begun. The first period which was anything but slow ended with the score 1 to 1.

If the second period Lavolette scored a second goal for Campbellton on a pass from Sharpe. In this period Chatham shot a goal from inside the circle—which, according to hockey regulations could not count as score. Despite this fact the referees persisted in calling it a goal but if hockey rules are to be used in governing a game of hockey, this shot was obviously illegal and the score was rightfully 2-1 in Campbellton's favor at the close of this period.

The third period was one of the most sensational episodes in provincial athletic history. The speed of the Campbellton players was incredible and the Chatham team played like madmen. Again and again the visiting players were slammed up against the boards by their opponents with bone-breaking brutality and when penalties were inflicted Campbellton invariably "got it in the neck" and the real offenders on the Chatham team went unpunished.

Lavoie played a stellar game in goal, defending the Campbellton net with superhuman alacrity and skill, beating back the vicious onslaughts of his fendish opponents and standing the strain in an admirable manner. In this period Matthews made a sweeping end to end rush and scored. The goal-judge announced a goal. Then, fully a minute after Murray offered a ridiculous, inconsistent objection and ruled off the score. The Chatham players now apparently lost all reason and Keoughan and Duncan abandoned their sticks and reverted to fists instead. While Keoughan held Thomas, Duncan began using his face for a punching bag and when some of the Campbellton boys objected, Murray sent Thomas to the box. This is surely a new way of playing hockey. An excited crowd of spectators climbed over the railing eager to engage in the combat. This included a bunch of Chatham "hood-

lum" who do little else but fight. According to the referees, who had apparently abandoned all reason through fear of the frenzied Chatham supporters—the score stood 2-2, so ten minutes of overtime play was allotted.

Chatham scored a goal. When four minutes of the allotted ten had elapsed Matthews and Sharpe were ordered to the box for the offence of a Chatham player and the Campbellton boys thoroughly and justly disgusted with the injustice of the referees, skated off the ice. In the eyes of Chatham the score stood 3-2 in their favor but if hockey rules and ordinary fair play still obtain in this province, the result was a distinct victory for Campbellton of 3-1.

Space does not permit printing the approbrium which Chatham so richly deserves. If the Campbellton team and rooters who attended the game are sore it is because of the infamous methods employed by their opponents. Campbellton can take a fair licking. She has done it before. But to submit uncomplainingly to such treatment as they received last night is not demanded by the principles of clean sportsmanship.

Hockey at its tamest is not child's play. It is essentially a rough game, but when it comes down to raw unadulterated DIRT, the Campbellton boys will not swallow it.

SHIP 10 WEEKS FROM NEWCASTLE N.B. TO PORTLAND

Government Will Note Yield To Wage Demands

Ottawa, Feb. 8.—Steadily mounting wage demands of men for whom work was provided by the Government in Ottawa to relieve their distress have led to the discontinuance of the work and a hundred men who have been receiving \$4 a day will again be jobless.

The work being closed is the construction of a retaining wall along the Rideau Canal. The wall has been erected as far as the Grand Trunk bridge at Ottawa East. It will be carried no further now. An interesting story attaches to the discontinuance of the work. The men employed in it had recently received two increases in wages in response to their demands. It is as a consequence of their demanding still more from the Government that the work is stopped.

The work was undertaken this winter solely for the purpose of providing relief in the unemployed situation. The men employed were paid thirty cents an hour. The Allied Trades and Labor Council discussed their wage and it was also brought up at meetings of the Civic Advisory Committee on relief. After the change of Government the men applied for higher wages. The intervention of the Minister of Labor, Hon. James Murdock, on the point of fair wages on government enterprises was secured and on his recommendation the men were increased to \$3.40 a day of eight hours. This did not satisfy them and they applied for a further increase. This also was granted, the rate of pay being raised to \$4.00.

France Wants To Delay The Genoa Conference

London, Feb. 8.—It is unlikely that the French Government's request or a three months' delay in the opening of the Genoa conference will be met by Great Britain. It was stated in official circles today. The sooner the conference convenes the sooner European industrial reconstruction will begin, according to the view of these officials.

Paris, Feb. 8.—Premier Poincaré today reaffirmed the French Government's determination to seek guarantees before going to the international economic conference at Genoa. He made this clear at a secret session of the foreign affairs committee of the Chamber of Deputies to which he gave complete details of the Government's plans and copies of documents.

The Premier said it was France's right and duty before going to Genoa to get the necessary assurances that none of her rights under existing treaties, nor those concerning the League of Nations would be jeopardized. But as to whether French delegates actually would go to the conference or not, he said:

"It is not for France either to accept or decline an invitation issued in her name."

NOVASCOTIA MUNICIPALITIES WANT MORE 'HOME RULE'

Halifax, N. S. Feb. 8.—The Nova Scotia Government is being confronted by a demand for more "home rule" from towns and municipalities throughout the Province. The Provincial Government, they say, has been encroaching upon sources or revenue which the towns and municipalities believe they should be free to exploit for their own purposes. The Pictou County Council recently refused to obey the Provincial law requiring an assessment for highway purposes, and the Town Council of Kentville is protesting against the tax on their general assessment to assist the Provincial Government to maintain, "not the roads in the town, but the highways in the country."

The Provincial Government levies taxes on theatres, moving picture houses, circuses, motor cars, pool rooms, and skating rinks, and many towns, cities and municipalities are now claiming that they should have a share of all these taxes.

Eight Men Killed In Mine Explosion

Huntingham, W. Va., Feb. 8.—Eight men were killed, two badly injured and one is missing as the result of a mine explosion late yesterday which wrecked a mine of the Marietta Coal Company on Pond Creek, according to information received here last night.

Federal Election Returns

Figures published in an Ottawa despatch which appears in another column show that in all 8,121,844 votes were polled in the last election, to return 235 members of Parliament, or an average of 13,284 1-2 to each member. For the Liberals 1,296,723 were cast for the Conservatives 971,502 and for the Progressives 789,387. On the basis of 16,135 1-2 to each member, according to the number of votes polled the Liberals should have 100, the Conservatives 75 and the Progressives 60. Although over 300,000 more votes were cast for the Conservative candidates than for the Progressives, the latter have fifteen more members.

Toronto Presbytery Favors Amalgamation

Toronto, Feb.—Toronto Presbytery today, by a practically unanimous vote, sanctioned a plan, drawn up and presented by a joint committee on co-operation, for the amalgamation of thirty Methodist and Presbyterian rural congregations within the Presbytery.

The congregations affected will be allowed to endorse or reject the plan of the churches to be merged, eleven are Presbyterian and nineteen are Methodist. In the Woodbridge-Bolton section the Methodists gain fifteen families and four members, and lose \$150 in stipends; in the Queensville Sutton section the Presbyterians gain sixteen families and thirty-six members, and gain \$15 in stipends. The union is planned to become effective about July.

In commenting on the union plan, Rev. Dr. Chown, superintendent of the Methodist church, said: "It is quite in harmony with the larger union which is to take place in the near future. It saves the church from the waste of both men and money, and the church itself, as an institution, has a much larger public influence."

Gulf Stream Fallacy Re-Stated

(London Observer)

There are still some scientists, it appears, who hold the theory that our climate is affected by the Gulf Stream. At the annual meeting of the Science Masters' Association the theory was re-stated by Mr. Douglas Beridge of Malvern College. Sir Richard Gregory, however, pointed out that anyone who has studied the Gulf Stream fallacy knows that the stream never gets farther east than Newfoundland, and that our climate does not in the least depend upon it.

"The Gulf Stream," Sir Richard explained in an interview with a representative of the Observer, "is only an incidental part of the waters of the North Atlantic, and has no more to do with causing this circulation than the proverbial fly had in moving the wheel on which it rested. It cannot be distinguished east of Newfoundland, and has been proved to lose itself in the Atlantic long before it reaches our shores. It is therefore quite illusory to suppose that the Gulf Stream, as such, has any influence upon British climate."

The relatively warm water which flows northeastwards from the region south of the Great Bank of Newfoundland is independent of the Gulf Stream and is now usually called the North Atlantic Current or the European Current. This is the current which washes the coasts of Europe and fills the seas and channels adjacent to our islands.

It is not, however, merely a question whether we call the ocean waters which come to our islands from the southwest the Gulf Stream, Guir Stream, or European Current. The main point is that our climatic advantages must not be ascribed so much to warm water as to wind. The mild winters of our western coasts are not due to the heating of air by contact with a surface of warm water brought by a current from warmer regions, but to the fact that the air itself has come from these abundant moisture which sets free vast quantities of heat when the vapor is condensed to form rain.

"The effective cause of oceanic circulation is wind-action. The Trade winds give rise to the great equatorial currents and tend to heap up ocean waters on the eastern sides of continental masses. The Gulf Stream is a current by which some of this heaped up water in the Atlantic escapes northwards, but it is really nothing but a rill of warm water com-

pared with the depth of the ocean below it.

"There is a prevailing drift of the atmosphere eastward and northeastward over the North Atlantic, and this causes the entire surface of the ocean north of the region of the Trade winds to have a general movement towards the northeast. The aerial currents which produce this movement also distribute over Europe the heat they derived from low latitudes.

"The predominant winds in these islands are southwest and west, and these are also the rainiest. In water the most rainy districts are in general the warmest, so that the air grows warmer from the east to west, thus indicating that the chief source of heat is then the relatively warm wind blowing from the Atlantic.

"If the temperature of our island depended upon latitude alone, and no mild wind vapor-bearing winds reached us from off the Atlantic, we should probably be exposed to cold as severe as that experienced at Labrador, where the temperature in winter often falls to thirty or forty degrees below zero. As it is, London has the same in an average temperature—about fifty-one degrees—as Philadelphia, which is 750 miles nearer the equator, and Edinburgh is warmer on the average than Halifax, Nova Scotia which is 700 miles to the southward.

"The Gulf Stream fallacy," Sir Richard added, "has been exposed over and over and over again; yet people accept it today almost as confidently as they did in the days of my youth, when a common subject of discussion at debating societies was that of the influence which a Panama Canal would have upon the climate of the British Isles by the supposed diversion which it would effect upon the direction of the stream."

Returns from Motor Vehicle License Fees

Fredericton, Feb. 7.—Returns from Motor Vehicle Act license fees for the year 1921 were more than three times as great as the amount of revenue received from this source by the Province of New Brunswick three years ago. Figures which have been given out show actual receipts for 1921 in excess of \$276,000, while in 1918 the receipts amounted to \$90,000.

Wholesome Food Means Healthy People

There is much in the report of the Veterinary Director General for the year 1920-21 that must be very gratifying to Canadian readers. From it we learn that Canadian Live Stock continues to maintain its enviable reputation as among the healthiest in the world, that one of the great plagues, such as rinderpest, foot-and-mouth disease and contagious pleuropneumonia, has been allowed to enter the country; that hog cholera and glanders have been so effectively dealt with that losses have become comparatively trifling, and that mange has been practically eradicated from the great range country in Alberta. The last mentioned was a particularly heavy task as can easily be understood when it is stated that 2,082 townships, approximately 74,952 miles, a territory as large as Scotland, had to be covered. Cattle could stray for hundreds of miles. Restrictions and dipping regulations had to be imposed and happily were readily complied with by cattlemen, with one lone exception, when the police had to be called upon. Dipping vats were built so that no cattle would have to be driven more than twelve miles to be treated, and every contingency was provided for. Commencing June 24th 197,721 heads were dipped for the first time, and on July 2 and following days, 197,914 were dipped for the second time. The accredited herd system adopted in the previous year, having for its object the elimination of tuberculosis is made excellent progress.

The report shows similar energy and achievement by the two other divisions of the branch. The Pathological division, which has charge of the Biological laboratory at Ottawa, supplies all the tuberculin and mallein required for inoculation, makes examinations of specimens submitted for diagnosis, conducts research work, and manages branch laboratories, including one at Charlottetown, P. E. I., for the study of fox diseases. The Meat and Canned Foods division, has been termed "the all in guardian of the public health." Besides inspecting and certifying to the quality and wholesomeness of all manufactured food products within the scope of the Meat and Canned Foods Act, this division supervises all imports of like foods, including fruits, vegetables, milk and their products. Canada, it is worth mentioning, is today the only country in the world that has a law setting out standards for food products to which countries in trade with her must conform.

AN ALPINE GUIDE OF THE CANADIAN ROCKIES

"If mountain climbing is dangerous, then lying in bed is far more dangerous, since more people die in bed than on the mountains." That is the answer of Rudolf Aemmer, the famous Swiss guide of Edelweiss, British Columbia, in Montreal recently, when asked if mountain climbing is a dangerous sport.



RUDOLF AEMMER

Rudolf has been in Switzerland since the beginning of the winter. He went over to see the old folks in Interlaken, where he was born, and also to indulge in the Swiss winter sports. He expects a record climbing season in the Canadian Rockies in 1922, and he has been keeping himself fit to meet it. He will be back from Switzerland in May.

Though he loves his native Switzerland, Rudolf would rather live in Canada. He has been here since 1909.

Asked how he learned to climb, Rudolf said he learned in the Swiss mountains when he was a child. When a young man he got his climbing diploma. He then exhibited this in the shape of a medal which he wore on the inside of his coat. One has to qualify in Switzerland before becoming a guide.

June, July and August are the best months for Canadian climbing, Rudolf says. He told of different climbing parties he accompanied. The longest climbing trip he had was around Lake Louise and he and his party were out thirty-six days; on this trip there were thirteen people, and twenty-six horses were employed to carry the food, Indian tents in which the party slept, and other requisites.

For climbing, Rudolf went on

"you need strong waterproof boots, with heavy nailed soles. The guides help in every way they can so that beginners starting out on a climb are properly equipped."

"Do climbers ever get nervous or dizzy?" was a question put to Rudolf.

"Yes," he answered, "but they very soon get over that. In an exceptional case of dizziness we bring the person down again."

Proceeding, Rudolf said that the guide led the climbing parties, and climbers held on to a rope, keeping about twenty-five feet apart. The guide used his axe to sound snow bridges. By the sound made when he hit the guides know if it is safe to cross the snow bridge. It is easier to climb up than to climb down.

Rudolf has climbed with many famous Alpinists, both men and women. Records of climbs are kept at Lake Louise. It was he who carried Mrs. Stone on his back to safety after her eight day exposure on the ledge of Mount Fowl last summer. The Swiss guides of the Canadian Rockies reside at a village called Edelweiss built for them in Swiss Chalet style of architecture by the Canadian Pacific Railway. It may be seen from the transcontinental trains about a mile west of Golden, B.C. There they bring their families, and the youngsters are taught to climb from their infancy. So Canada is assured of a hardy race of mountaineers.

MANY DID NOT VOTE IN LAST ELECTION

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—In the general elections on December 6, a total of 3,121,844 votes were cast out of 4,726,722 on the electoral lists, or about sixty-five per cent. In the general elections of 1917, the total of votes cast was 1,885,329 out of 2,093,799 on the electoral lists. The increase is due chiefly to the extension of the franchise to women and to the fact that there were no acclamations in December last.

The official computations issued this afternoon do not give the votes obtained by each party in the field, but calculations made at the instance of the Canadian Press, Limited, give the totals cast for each party as follows:

Liberals, 1,296,723; Conservatives, 971,502; Progressives, 769,387; Independents, 84,232.

The figures show, rather curiously, that while the Progressives elected sixty-five members in comparison with the election of fifty Conservatives, the Conservatives had a larger popular vote than the Progressives. It is calculated that each Liberal member elected represents 11,100 voters; each Progressive, 11,800, and each Conservative, 18,400.

By provinces the popular vote was as follows:

Ontario—Liberals, 351,717; Progressives, 329,502; Conservatives, 445,150; Independents, 9,003. Total, 1,135,372. Total on voters' list, 1,803,599.

Quebec—Liberals, 558,056; Progressives, 31,790; Conservatives, 163,743; Independents, 33,478. Total, 793,066. Total on voters' list, 1,141,230.

Nova Scotia—Liberals, 136,054; Progressives, 35,741; Conservatives, 87,988. Total, 259,793. Total on voters' list, 385,037.

New Brunswick—Liberals, 76,653; Progressives, 17,447; Conservatives, 61,172. Total, 155,272. Total on voters' list, 241,640.

Prince Edward Island—Liberals, 23,950; Progressives, 8,990; Conservatives, 19,904. Total 52,844. Total on voters' list, 66,889.

Manitoba—Liberals, 29,525; Progressives, 83,350; Conservatives 46,486; Independents, 13,361. Total 172,722. Total on voters' list, 254,541.

British Columbia—Liberals, 46,249; Progressives, 21,766; Conservatives, 37,345; Independents, 3,610. Total 155,000. Total on voters' lists, 228,419.

Alberta—Liberals, 28,404; Progressives, 104,295; Conservatives, 35,161; Independents, 6,024. Total, 173,904. Total on voters' list, 271,309.

Ottawa Knows Nothing Of Reciprocity Plot

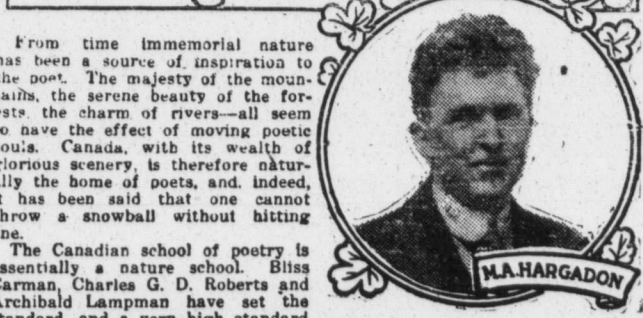
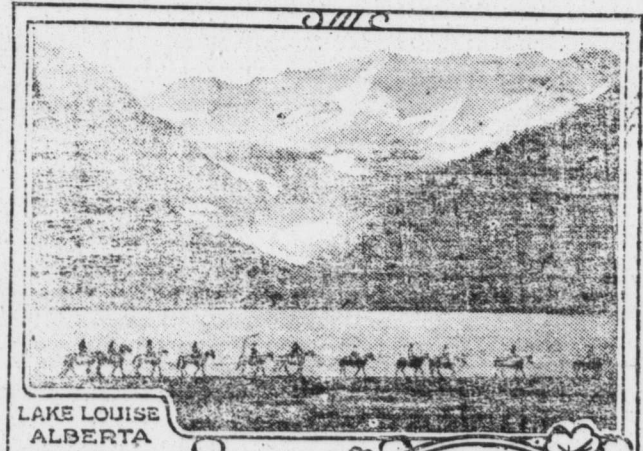
Ottawa, Feb. 8.—The Government has no knowledge of any agreement between Canada and the United States whereby dairy products of these two countries will be permitted to cross the border under a mutual reciprocal pact. This was stated on the highest authority this evening. A Regina despatch quoted Darcy Scott, legal adviser to the National Dairy Council, as saying that such an agreement was now assured.

Another Chair Established At McGill University

Montreal, Feb. 9.—The Mrs. E. B. Eddy, chairman of industrial chemistry will be the title of a new foundation at McGill University. This was settled yesterday afternoon when the corporation received the report of the Principal, Sir Arthur Currie, announcing the approval of the board of governors to the proposal to establish such a chair of teaching.

By the will of the late Mrs. E. B. Eddy a bequest was given to McGill University with the proviso that the money should be used for the establishment of professorships. According to the plan for the new chair, the holders of professorship will devote special attention to wood chemistry, the Eddy family having been concerned in an important way with the forest production of Canada, both in lumber and manufacturing.

The Harp in Canada



From time immemorial nature has been a source of inspiration to the poet. The majesty of the mountains, the serene beauty of the forests, the charm of rivers—all seem to have the effect of moving poetic souls. Canada, with its wealth of glorious scenery, is therefore naturally the home of poets, and indeed, it has been said that one cannot throw a snowball without hitting one.

The Canadian school of poetry is essentially a nature school. Bliss Carman, Charles G. D. Roberts and Archibald Lampman have set the standard, and a very high standard it is. Probably nothing in Canadian literature has been more quoted than Bliss Carman's "Low Tide on Grand Pre," a poem which breathes the spirit of nature as felt on the lovely shores of Nova Scotia. The modern Canadian poets are following in the footsteps of these writers, but going further afield, as the facilities for travel throughout the great Dominion are extended. Thus, for instance, in a neat volume of poems by a young Irish-Canadian poet, M. A. Hargadon, the scene changes from Ireland to Nova Scotia, Quebec, and the Canadian Rockies. Here is a charming verse from a poem about Lake Louise:

"This lake is God's best picture; that is why He hung it on the mountains at the sky And set it in so beautiful a frame; Art galleries of heaven have none the same."

This is the closing verse of a poem inspired by the majestic beauty of Banff:

"There is no lovelier place to live And when at last I die, I think my soul will go to Banff Instead of to the sky; For here there is no sorrowing, No suffering nor care, And, up so near to paradise, It seems enfolded there."

The French-Canadians are described as:—"Branch of a splendid race transplanted here Illuming life through all this lovely land."

In Nova Scotia Mr. Hargadon is inspired to write lines that are par-

ticularly happy!—"I see the flashes of His hand On distant hills, along the bay, All through the fair Acadian land."

"His book is every scene about, There are a million happy lines; The sweetest I have chosen out Beneath the steeples of the pines."

Many of the poems are about Ireland, a country which has given Canada many good settlers, and no doubt, will give many more. Here is a verse from one:

"Young April is in Ireland now, I wish that I were with her there, For she is far the loveliest Of all the April anywhere; She has the sweetest voice and face; She has the brightest gowns to wear."

Irish and Canadian poems are illustrated with attractive photographs of scenes in Canada and Ireland. With St. Patrick's day approaching, and with Ireland now taking her place amongst the nations, the book is likely to create a wide interest at the present time, as it appears at a particularly opportune moment.

It is prefaced by a sympathetic introduction by Colonel George H. Ham.

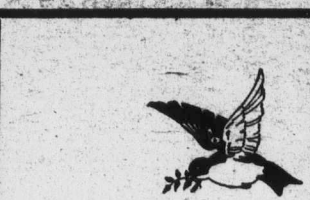
RESULTS OF GAME STANDS
