PEACE TREATY SIGNED TO-DAY

VERSAILLES, June 28--Special--The Peace Treaty was signed by German delegates to-day.

VERSAILLES, June 28.--The Germans put their signatures to the Peace Treaty at 3.12 to-day. Colonial Minister Bell signed after Envoy Mueller. President Wilson signed immediately after, and Premier Lloyd George signed next.

The delegates representing Germany reached the palace at 3.08, and the formalities of affixing signatures took place about at once.

HEAVY INDUSTRIAL LOSS CAUSED BY DESTRUCTION OF FLAX MILLS

Early morning fire destroyed flax mills at Lincoln Avenue, when the flax works and valuable contents—defective electric wire said to be responsible.

A serious fire occurred this morning at Lincoln Avenue, when the flax mills owned by the Canadian Flax Works, Limited, who have fourteen plants in the province of Ontario, were destroyed by fire which caught from a defective electric wire. When the employees started operation at seven o'clock the wire which leads to the motor which operates the machinery refused to work properly and as a result through several sparks into the dust and flames were soon visible. The manufacturing part of the plant which is of brick was entirely destroyed to the extent of \$150,000 but owing to the prompt action of the St. Catharines Fire Brigade the warehouses and boiler room were saved but the extent of the damage by water will amount, it is stated, to approximately \$200,000. At present 51 employees are on the pay roll, but in two weeks time when the pulling of the flax is necessary 250 would have been employed.

To Rebuild at Once
A Journal representative in conversation with Mr. Hoover, head accountant of the plant, received the information that the company would rebuild immediately. The firemen lost no time getting on the job, but unfortunately the pressure of water is very poor at this part of the city, out with three streams playing on the blaze excellent results were accomplished. Although the fire was entirely under control soon after the brigade arrived they remained on the job until 10 o'clock when it was positively known the fire was entirely extinguished.

UNION THRIPS

The Onion Thrips, a small insect, about one twenty fifth of an inch long, of a pale yellow color, tinged with blackish is present on many of the onion crops in St. Catharines district according to the Department of Agriculture. This insect will chafe the epidermis to dry out, whiten and die. The insect is small and its presence will not be noted unless the onions are examined carefully.

The Thrips can be easily controlled by spraying with "Black Leaf 40" 2-4 pint, 40 gallons water, add 4 lbs. soap. For small patches, 1 teaspoonful of Black Leaf 40 to 1 gallon soapy water. Spray when insects appear.

WINNING ITALIAN REVOLUTION

COPENHAGEN, June 28.—Italian, German and Austrian Communists held a conference in Southern Tyrol a few days ago, for the purpose of preparing for a revolution in Italy, says a dispatch from Vienna. This revolution was fixed for the middle of July.

CHERRY SLUG ATTACKS FRUIT TREES OF DISTRICT

Growers who are bothered should spray at once.

The Pear and Cherry Slug is making a severe attack on Plum, Cherry and Pear Orchards that have not been sprayed with Arsenate of Lead this season, according to the local agricultural department. Fruit Growers who have an attack of this insect should spray at once with Arsenate of Lead, 2-2 1/2 lbs. paste to 40 gallons of water. It will not be safe to use the Arsenate if the fruit is to be picked within the next ten days, but late Cherries, Pears and Plums should receive an application as soon as attacked. The insect can be controlled by dusting two or three times with air-slack lime, this method can be used where fruit is nearly ripe.

The insect can be readily recognized, as it is a slimy blackish or greenish-black larva about 1/4 inch long and distinctly enlarged at the head-end which gives it a tadpole appearance.

Referee will handle the game, and will no doubt bring it to a successful issue. The Veterans have a strong string and a great game is anticipated. We would like to bespeak for the Veterans as well as the visitors a record attendance.

COMMITTEE TO TRY TO MOVE PEG EMPLOYERS

New Body Will Endeavor to Get all Who Went on Strike Back at Old Positions.

WINNIPEG, June 28.—With the termination of the sympathetic strike yesterday, the General Strike Committee which ordered it automatically ceased to exist. The position at the Labor Temple is now the same as it was prior to the general strike, the chief authoritative body being the Trades and Labor Council. The possibility of a considerable number of men being left without jobs as a result of the unconditional surrender of the General Strike Committee caused great consternation at labor headquarters. It was unofficially reported last night that a movement was on foot to get a committee appointed to take up the question of reinstatement with the employers to watch the interests generally of those men who, though in many cases dragged into the strike against their will, may find themselves out of work as a result. The failure of many to get their jobs back yesterday is given as the reason for the movement. While no approximate figure could be put on the number whose applications to-day were turned down was declared in labor circles last night to be very large.

RAISE FOR CARPENTERS

Mass Meeting Sunday Expects Settlement at 75 cents an Hour.

TORONTO, June 28.—The district council of the Brotherhood of Carpenters will hold a mass meeting on Sunday afternoon at the Labor Temple to consider the proposals of the Builders' Exchange and to receive the Builders' Exchange's answer to the request for 75 cents an hour. It is said that a favorable answer will be given.

THE WEATHER

TORONTO, June 28.—A pronounced area of high pressure covers the Great Lakes and the barometer is relatively low both east and west. The weather has been fair and cool in Ontario and Quebec and showery in the Maritime Provinces and Saskatchewan.

The weather changed from 90 degrees in the shade Thursday to snow flurries yesterday morning in Northern Ontario.

GENERAL STRIKE AT VANCOUVER TO CONTINUE

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 28.—The labor workers of Vancouver voted yesterday overwhelmingly in favor of continuing their walkout as a protest against alleged discrimination against certain strikers.

OTTAWA ENQUIRY DELVES INTO THE GRAIN ELEVATORS

Big Salaries are Paid Officials it is Disclosed at Session of Cost of Living Commission Hearing.

OTTAWA, June 28.—Testifying yesterday before the Cost of Living Committee, Cecil Rice Jones manager of the United Grain Growers, Ltd., said the company was originally incorporated in 1906 and reorganized in 1917. When he absorbed the Alberta Farmers' Co-operative Elevator Co., Limited. The total authorized capital is \$5,000,000, with paid up capital of \$2,153,737. Hon. T. A. Greer president, received \$15,000 a year when he took an active part in the management, but ceased drawing a salary when he came to Ottawa. Tells of Salaries Paid. Witness received \$13,000 as general manager. Mr. Murray, assistant manager, \$11,000; E. S. McRory, divisional manager at Calgary, \$5,200; and \$5,000 is paid to the secretary.

Earnings for the year ending August 31, 1918, were \$441,769, representing 19,70 p. c. on paid up capital, or 11 1/2 on a total working capital of \$3,958,245. Witness declared there was absolutely no watered stock, the subscribers having paid a premium of \$5 on each share of \$25. No individual is allowed to hold more than 100 shares, and has but one vote, irrespective of the amount of his holdings. He said 35,000 shareholders are organized into 350 local units which elect representatives to the annual meetings. The directors don't hold more than the average of ten shares each. Last year they handled 49 million bushels of grain.

PROPOSAL FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF IRELAND

Manifesto Issued Under the Direction of the Irish Dominion League—Signed by Sir Horace Plunkett.

LONDON, June 28.—Establishment of self government in Ireland within the British empire is proposed in a manifesto issued by the Irish Dominion League and signed by Sir Horace Plunkett and other Irishmen. The proposal, it is claimed, is a great advance over any previous proposed solution for the Irish question, except that the British connection is maintained.

Under this plan Ireland would have virtually the same amount of home rule as if she were an independent republic. The manifesto points out the disadvantages to which Irish products would be exposed if Ireland was a republic severed from the British empire. Mention is made of possible hostile tariffs and it is said, such a position might lose for Ireland her share in any imperial preference which might be established.

Irishmen are urged in the manifesto to unite and to let the British parliament and people know what they desire. The manifesto then outlines what the political status of Ireland would be under the new scheme. Not Represented at Westminster. Ireland, it is declared, would not be represented at Westminster, but would be a member of the league of nations and of the imperial conference council or parliament which may be established. Ireland would have complete control of her internal government. The naval and military defense would remain as at present, but no authority but the Irish parliament would have the power to impose compulsory service on Irishmen, although Ireland would agree to make contributions to the naval, military and diplomatic services.

7 BROTHERS GET TWO YEARS EACH IN PEN

NEW YORK, June 28.—Seven brothers, Abraham, Charles, Davis, Elias, George, John and Joseph Solomon, were sentenced by U. S. Judge Knox to two years each in the Atlanta penitentiary. They had pleaded guilty of conspiring to swindle merchants of goods valued at more than half a million dollars.

ALLIES' NEW DUTY TO ENFORCE ALL TERMS

Poincare Says Hun Acts Not Signs of Repentance.

PARIS, June 28.—The allies' duty to be vigilant in enforcing the peace terms with Germany was among the subjects discussed by President Poincare at the dinner which he and Madame Poincare gave to delegates to the Peace Conference, at the Presidential Palace here last night.

President Poincare said: "The delegates of the victorious countries have not met during these long months and have not convoked to Versailles the delegates of conquered Germany in order to retain in their hands nothing, but a simple piece of paper. The disposition shown by violations in advance of a treaty that one is going to undertake to respect, makes it our duty to watch carefully to see that criminal hands do not rekindle sooner or later the conflagration, which we have smothered. German ships, sunk by their crews, French flags burned and demonstrations before the new Polish frontier are not signs of repentance."

The telephone company, the factories and several of the business places of the city were also called up and advised. In this way the news was pretty well spread around in half an hour.

Due perhaps to the long time that the word has been expected and to the several delays on account of the cupidity of the Germans, the announcement through the ringing of the bell and the blowing of whistles seemed to be attended with no outward demonstrations such as accompanied the busy day and there was so much business that had to be put through that citizens went along, conscious of the fact that they would have Monday as a holiday upon which to celebrate.

In the churches of the city short religious services will be held tomorrow for thanksgiving and praise over the event. This had been arranged by the clergymen in anticipation of what was expected to come through today.

Table with columns: NAME, Temperature of Milk, Butter Fat, Sediment Test, Pasteurized. Lists various names and their corresponding milk quality data.

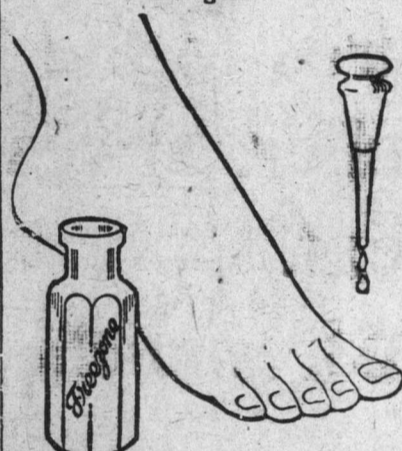

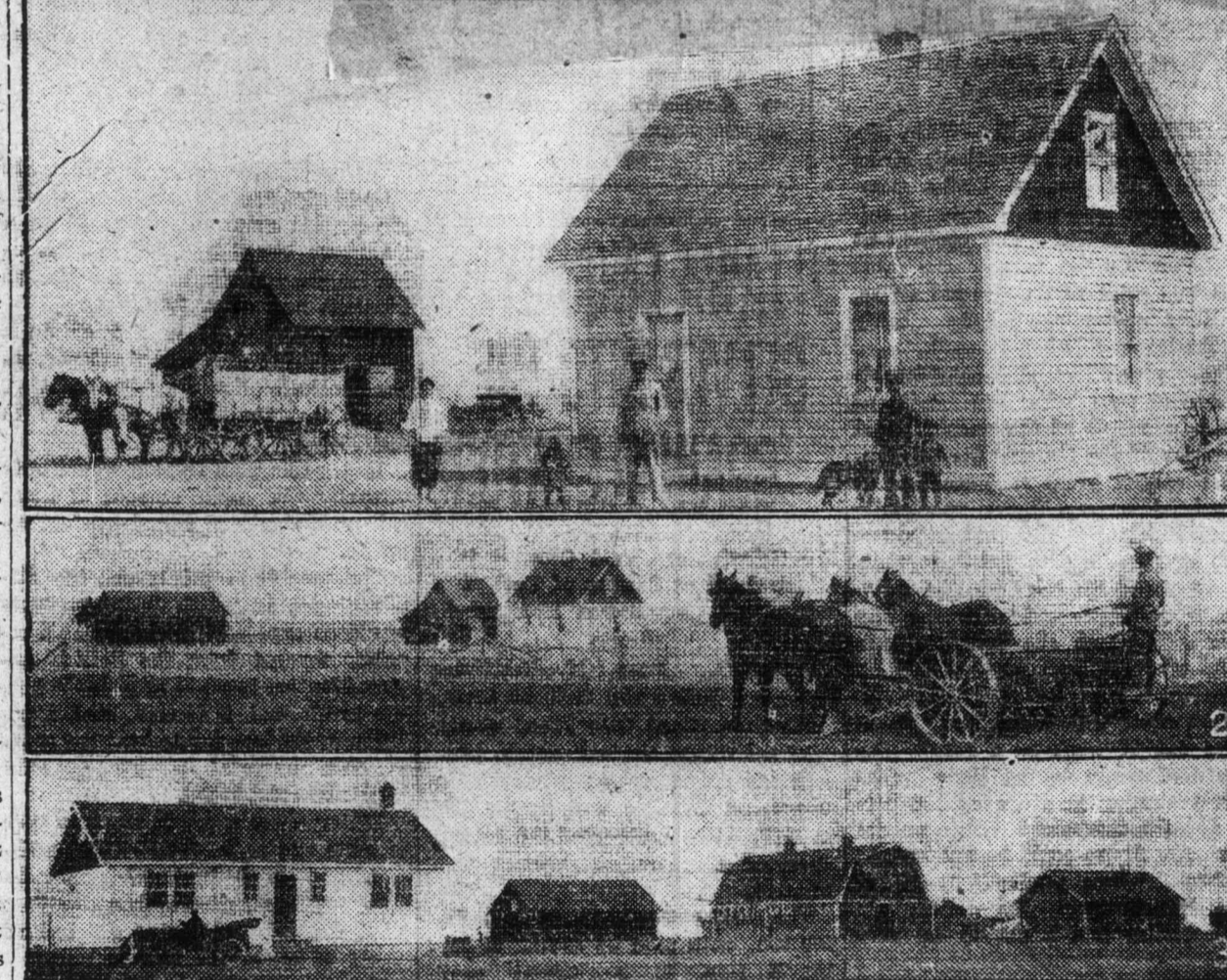

From Fighting to Farming

Not many months ago two men were in the same battle in France—the one an officer, the other a private. They both were in at the end and in the short interval since the armistice was signed have come back to Western Canada, received their discharge from the army, and are now occupying neighboring farms in one of the farm colonies prepared for returned soldiers by the Canadian Pacific Railway in Southern Alberta.

Here in these colonies are soldiers of all ranks, a number of whom were in the firing line up to the signing of the armistice. What surprises one most is that so many of them have so soon got back to practical work again and the Canadian Pacific Railway is to be congratulated on having had the foresight to adopt a practical scheme which has made it possible for a large number of men to begin farming on their own account in so short a space of time after their release from military duties.

begin farming in a new country under most favourable circumstances and which has contributed in no small measure to their present success. The soldier settler in these farm colonies has an unusual opportunity to make good. He finds on the farm a comfortable house ready for him to move into with his family and effects. There is a good barn for his horses and cows, his water supply is provided for, his farm is fenced, and he has forty acres of land broken and ready for crop which will bring him a revenue during his first season.

Some of the larger implements are available for use by the colonists in common, a set being allotted to

every three farms and use by them in turn under the direction of the colony superintendent. A fixed charge per day is made for the use of these implements. The colony superintendent is an expert agriculturist and it is his duty to assist the colonists with advice as to the best manner of conducting their farming operations.

A more enthusiastic community of farmers will be hard to find anywhere than those in process of formation in these veterans' colonies in Alberta. To see the men at work for themselves, on their own farms, after what they have gone through is an inspiring sight. The spirit of mutual help and comradeship that is everywhere evident, speaks well for the success of the venture. These farm colonies are sure to become centres of considerable agricultural activity.

Since the split which occurred over the Military Service Act in 1917 there have been two wings of the Liberal party, the one which is still devoted to the broad and permanent principles of the party but which supported a Union Government in order, as it thought, to successfully prosecute the war, the other which refused to have anything to do with conscription, which alleged treachery by its former brothers and which now undertakes to constitute itself the real and only Liberal party.

Judging by the results of the election of 1917 the former is in the majority in numbers, two against one, and yet it had no voice in the selection of a leader. It can have a voice however, in other ways and it may not approve of the treatment handed out to Mr. Proudfoot though recognizing the ability and militant style which Mr. Dewar possesses for leadership.

Mr. Proudfoot has been in politics for forty years and has given, therefore, a good portion of his life to the party and yet today he is roughly set aside for one who only recently made his entrance into public life.

The question arises as to what prospect Mr. Dewar has for successfully leading a section of a party which constitutes itself as the only thing Liberal in the Province?

Time will best settle the issue.

SAYS GOVERNMENT EXCURSION WAS PLEASANT BUT MIGHTY EXPENSIVE

Public Operation of Railroads in United States has Been Expensive Experiment—Hoped That Good May Come out of it.

From Monthly Letter of Farmers' and Merchants' Bank, Los Angeles.

What was intended to be a pleasant excursion into state socialism, inaugurated when, under the cloak of a war measure, the Government seized the railroads of the country and later, after the armistice was signed, without the slightest justification, also seized the telegraph, cable, and telephone lines, privately owned in America, has resulted in the greatest possible disaster, financially and otherwise, that ever overtook an administration in the United States.

Confessed Failure
The President himself confessed utter failure, of the Government's administration of the railroads, in his last appearance before Congress, when he admitted that he had no solution of the question to offer. In his recent message to Congress, telegraphed from abroad, he unqualifiedly announced his intention of turning the roads back to their owners at the end of the calendar year.

Former Director-General McAdoo confessed failure when he resigned. He was intelligent enough to go while the going was good. His successor, after assuming the duties of his office, rather warmly advocated Mr. McAdoo's proposal that the Government should retain the roads for five years after the close of the war. His experience in the office held by him

has caused him to change his views. He now advocates the return of the roads to their owners as soon as possible. In fact, everybody connected with the railroad administration in a governmental capacity is in great haste to be relieved of further responsibility. Congress will probably take such action as will again put the owners of our transportation system in possession of their property.

Will Receive Bankrupts
They will receive the roads bankrupt, financially, with rolling stock impaired, roadbeds deteriorated, and the morale of all railroad employees destroyed. In addition to the above handicaps, the roads are loaded with unnecessary employees and increased labor charges, which will render it impossible for them to be run at all without continued increase of fares and freights. After the inconveniences, experienced by it, during Government control, the travelling public will welcome any sort of a change.

And now comes the belligerent Postmaster-General and confesses that the job undertaken by him is too heavy a load for even his mighty shoulders. He is a nervous man to get rid of the management of the cable companies as a baby is to discard an empty nursing bottle. He asks to be quickly relieved of the telephone and telegraph lines. In eighteen months the best railroad service in the world, and in a much shorter time, the best and most economical telegraph, cable and telephone system in the world, have been converted into a wasteland. While the lesson has been a costly one, it may, price.

The Germans, as they describe themselves to each other, are always a wonderful people; indeed, with none like them anywhere. If they pay indemnities they will tell each other that they do it, not under compulsion but out of the generosity of their noble natures.—Toronto Star.

It is claimed by Chief Taplin that the Toronto lad ran away from Whittby. The Toronto police have been notified of the letter.

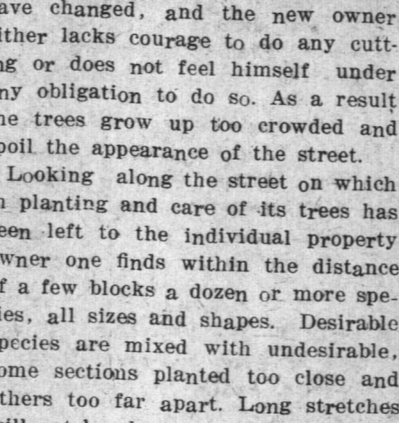
A Civic Plan For Street Trees

By B. R. Morton, B.Sc.F., Dominion Forestry Branch; Author of "Native Trees of Canada."

It is unfortunate that in so many of our Canadian towns and cities the work of caring for and planting of street trees is not systematically carried out. Instead of having a properly organized municipal shade tree department the work is too often left to the individual property owner with results which are far from satisfactory. The individual is perhaps not to blame for the results. He is spending time and money from which the public as a whole will benefit, but he is working without instructions.
The value of shade trees to a town or city is inestimable. Well cared for trees in streets and parks contribute immensely to civic pride and patriotism. They are one of the greatest aids to the attractiveness of a community. A treeless town cannot be beautiful although it possess many fine buildings. A street of plain tenement houses can be made attractive by the uniform planting of trees to break the harshness of the bare rows. Visitors to a city are impressed "as much by the city's trees as by its buildings, and are influenced by them in deciding if the city is a desirable one in which to live. Trees are an asset, adding value to property. From the standpoint of health and comfort well shaded trees are desirable, for they modify the temperature on the hottest days by cutting off the direct rays of the sun.
To obtain the best results the work of planting and caring for the trees should be entrusted to a special department. This department should be responsible for the selection of suitable species and proper spacing, as well as the protection and any necessary trimming and repairing that may be required. It is only where a street tree department exists and has control of all tree work along the public highway that stately, impressive, uniform results can be expected.
Where street planting is to be done the appearance of the street as a whole should be taken into consideration. This is not done when the work is left to the individual citizens. The average owner consults only his own tastes in regard to species and spacing and concerns himself only with the section immediately in front of his property without regard to his neighbor's plans. An error that many owners fall into is the planting of too many trees on their

PIG PASTURES

(Experimental Farms Note.)

The loss of the production of pork can be materially reduced by the use of pastures. Under ordinary conditions where a pig is fed on grain alone, it takes careful feeding and a very thrifty kind of pig to make 100 pounds gain from 500 pounds of grain, and more frequently 600 to 700 pounds of grain are consumed. Experiments with pasture and self feeders at Brandon Experimental Farm have shown that it is possible to make good gains at the rate of 300 to 400 pounds of grain to the 100 pounds of pork with the addition of pasture. Pasture cannot be used satisfactorily to replace grain, but it may very profitably reduce the grain consumption by one-third. As the pasture can be grown very cheaply and the pigs do the harvesting, themselves, the cost of producing a pound of pork may be reduced 20-25 per cent. This may mean the difference between profit and loss.

There are a considerable number of crops that may be used for pig pasture. The ordinary grain crops such as wheat, oats barley and rye are quite suitable. Sown in the spring these crops are ready for pasturing at the time that spring pigs born in March and April are old enough to use pasture to advantage. Spring rye is the first of these crops to be ready to use. The pigs eat it well and produce good gains on it. However, it soon passes the most palatable stage and becomes more woody as it shoots into head. Oats and barley are about a week later than rye in reaching the proper stage for harvesting but are relished rather more by the pigs and continue in a suitable condition for pasturing for a longer time. Wheat also produces good pasture but is no better than other grains and the seed is more expensive.

For later summer and fall pasture, there is nothing better than rape. Sown in early spring it is ready for pasture about the middle of July, or, if sown later, it reaches pasturing stage in about six weeks from the date of sowing. Pigs like it very well; it produces a large amount of feed and stands pasturing well. It is one of the best plants for hog pasture.

Another good fall pasture is fall rye. If sown in midsummer it is ready to pasture in a month from the date of sowing. It produces a good grade of pasture until severe frosts come and does not head out in the fall.

Perennial crops may also be used as pig pasture. Alfalfa will produce more pasture per acre probably than any other pasture crop. Pigs do very well on it, and produce economical gains. However, it costs more to start with alfalfa as the land must be prepared two years ahead and sown one year ahead of the time it is to be used. Also its greatest growth is in May and June when on the average farm there are few pigs to use pasture as the spring litters are too small and very few fall pigs are raised. The second crop of alfalfa comes in well for later summer pasturing for spring pigs. Pigs root out alfalfa and soon destroy it if allowed to. It is advisable to put rings in their noses when they are pastured on alfalfa.

The ordinary grasses such as bromo and timothy make first class pig pasture in the spring months. But, as in the case of alfalfa there are usually not many pigs to use pasture at that time. In midsummer and fall when pigs need pasture most, the grass pasture is often dry

Windsor—Council appointed a reception committee and granted \$4,000 a year for expenses. Council pays rent for club rooms, \$45 per month.

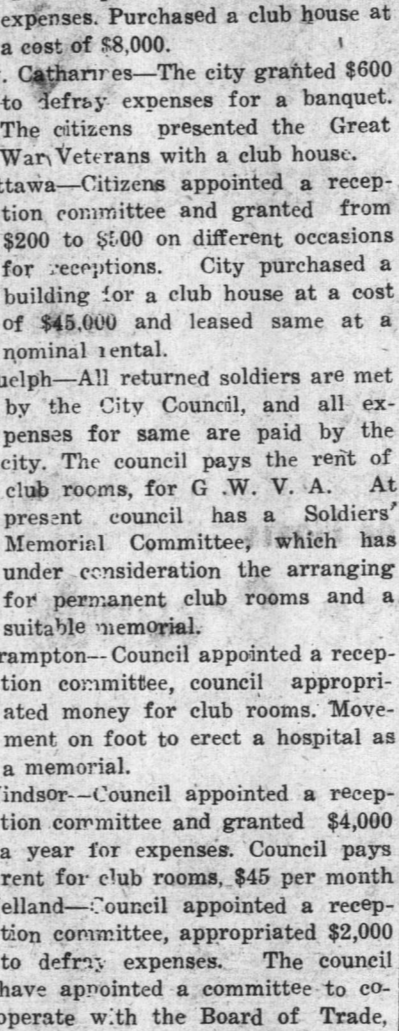

THE CARE OF MILK
Milk spoils very quickly. It absorbs
odors readily. It should not be placed
in an ice box in an open vessel. The
bottle containing the baby's milk
should always be kept covered and it
should and must be kept cool; otherwise
it will spoil.
All Toronto's milk is pasteurized.
The value of this process is well illustrated
by an occurrence in California. A dairy farm was shipping
90 gallons of milk per day to the city
of Richmond and 600 gallons per day
to the city of Berkeley. Recently the
head milker on the dairy farm became
ill with typhoid fever, yet went on
with his regular work for at least
a week before he was so sick that he had
to give up.
The ninety gallons of milk shipped
to Richmond was bottled in that city
and delivered to customers without
being pasteurized and caused a typhoid
epidemic. The 600 gallons shipped to
Berkeley was pasteurized and bottled
and delivered in the usual way and
caused no cases of typhoid fever whatever.
Here is a unique experiment with
human beings, accidental, of course,
but demonstrating conclusively the
protection that pasteurization gives the
milk consumer not only from typhoid
but from other diseases as well.
The milk dealers of Toronto have
shown a fine spirit in co-operating
with the Health Department requirements
in the handling of milk from the
time it leaves the cow until it
comes to your doorstep. Because this
is true, the milk man leaves at your
home a bottle of clean, safe, cool milk.
It is then up to the housewife to keep
the milk as long as possible in as good
condition as it was when she received
it.
Here are some things that you can
do that will be of value in keeping
baby's milk in good condition:
(1) Place a box on your back porch
where the milk driver can put the milk
so that it will be protected from sun
and flies.
(2) Before opening a bottle of milk
wipe the mouth of the bottle and the
cap dry with a clean cloth.
(3) Place immediately in your ice
box. If you have no ice box, call at

Council Sits Until 1
a Few Matters
Lavatories Com

All the members of the City Council
were in their places when the
City Council started business last
night in spite of the chilliness of the
atmosphere.
There wasn't much to be done by
took until 11 o'clock to do it, the
biggest item of business being the
law appointing deputy returning
officers and clerks for the municip-
al elections. The pay was raised to
\$6 instead of \$4 and \$5.

The City Council of Peterboro as

Ald. Eagle who is in the insurance
business said he had no doubt that
insurance men of the city would do
everything in their power to bring
his desirable state of affairs about.
Ald. Westwood complained of im-
possibility of satisfying the fire in-
surers. Whenever any new addi-
tion is added to perfect the fire de-
partment they think up something
else.

Ald. Smith reported for the Work-
ing Committee stating that the Commis-
sion is in receipt of an application
from Messrs. Mitchell and Mohr
contractors on contract for the con-
struction of the Western Hill Sta-
ge System, asking for an extension
of time in which to complete the
work. The Committee expressed
itself as being well aware of the dif-
ficulties which prevented the con-
tractors from completing their work
within the time limit and would
recommend that Messrs. Mitchell and
Mohr be granted an extension of
three months' time within which
to complete their work, covered by the
