



The Legislative Session.

The Legislative session, which

had dragged along for nearly eight weeks came to an end on Laturday last, when the House was prorogned with the usual ceremonies, by his Honor, the Lieutenant Governor. The length of the session certainly cannot be accounted for by the volume and importance of the legislation enacted; but must rather be attributed to the time spent in cancus by the Government and their supporters. From the very beginning of the session scarcely a day passed during which several hours were not by them devoted to cancus. In consequence of this manner of procedure by the Govvernment, the sittings of the Legislature were, for the most part very short and the members of the Opposition, always ready for work, were obliged to wait for hours and hours until any recalcitrant Government followers were "fixed" in the cancus. The way in which the Government thus wasted the time of the session was little short of disgraceful. Why were the Government obliged to pursue this course regarding every measure of any importance brought before the House? 
