

# HASTEN SLOWLY With Cold Storage Bill.

TO REMOVE ALL DOUBT A CLAUSE SHOULD BE INSERTED THAT THE GRANTEE CANNOT SELL BAIT FOR BAIT PURPOSES TO FOREIGN FISHERMEN.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—The Legislative Council will be called upon within a day or two to consider the agreement embodied in the Cold Storage Resolutions recently passed by the House of Assembly. The importance of this measure cannot be overstated. Cogent arguments were adduced during the debate in the Assembly to show that one of the effects of the operation of that agreement would be to destroy the effective control over our bait fishes which the Bait Act affords. It was anticipated that the party who would bring the Government followers into line with the policy of the Government implemented in this agreement. This anticipation proved correct; but it is evident from the backing and filling of the Premier during the passage of the measure that it required all the control the Government could exert to bring some of its followers over to its view sufficiently to vote for the Resolutions. It is to be hoped that the Upper House will take a more deliberate and impartial view of the situation and that its members will safeguard the interests of the Colony.

**Beyond Any Doubt or Question.** The most serious aspect of the question to be considered by the Council is the effect of the agreement with these American fish merchants upon the effective control of the Government of the Colony of the bait supply. The importance of this question needs no argument. The subject for consideration is, can the agreement be left in its present form without seriously jeopardizing the effective control by the Colony of its bait supplies. If there is any doubt or hesitation on this subject it should not be removed definitely and beyond peradventure. It should be borne in mind that the Bait Act is an Enabling Act, only giving the Governor in Council discretionary powers of control over the export of bait fishes. The question to consider is not whether the lessees are exempted from the operation of the Bait Act. If the Bait Act were a statute which established a law which remained in force by virtue of its enactment solely, different considerations would have to be brought to bear. It is nothing of the kind.

**If Given the Governor in Council Certain Discretionary Powers as to its Operation or Suspension.** If then the Governor in Council are a fortiori the Legislature does anything which prevents the free exercise of that discretion to the same extent he, or it loses effective control over our Bait supply. By the Agreement under consideration this American firm agrees to erect at their own expense five Cold Storage Plants for fish and fish products, and the Government states in the preamble its desire to assist and encourage the said business, particularly in connection with freezing, handling, packing and marketing of fish and fish products. In the correspondence between the Premier and the "lessees" preliminary to the Agreement the "lessees" state distinctly their intention to do business largely in Bait Fishes—herring, caplin, etc. The Premier when introducing the Resolutions into the House confirms this. Surely these facts import an agreement ratified by the Legislature, on the part of the Government of the Colony not only to prevent the American firm to carry out their agreement according to its true intent and meaning but also and more strongly still not to do any act, matter or thing on the part of the Government which would prejudice, hamper, or in any way injure the lessees in the prosecution of the business established by them under agreement with the Government sanctioned and ratified by the Legislature. Now the enforcement of the Bait Act is entirely within the power and control

of the Government. In exercising the discretion given by the Bait Act to enforce it or not the Government must be guided by exactly the same considerations as would apply in the performance of any other Act, or the exercise of any other power within its discretion.

**If Consequently the Enforcement of the Bait Act Does Damage to Parties Having Contractual Rights With the Government the Enforcement of That Act Against Such Contractors is as Much a Violation of These Rights as any Other Act Within the Discretion of the Government.**

It is a breach of contract, a consequence of the rights of the lessees for which they would have the right to appeal to the courts open to them equally with any other breach of contract or confiscation. They would have the right of action for breach of contract. There can be no doubt that if the Government should refuse such license the court would under the contract compel the Government to pay. The issue of a license is an administrative act which cannot lawfully be exercised to the detriment of the legal or contractual rights of other parties. Under these circumstances the lessees under this agreement if it is made law in its present form may, should the Government enforce the Bait Act against them resort to an action for damages for breach of contract. It can therefore be reasonably asserted that the effective control which the Bait Act gives the Colony over its bait supply is not injured by this agreement. Can it be said that it is not necessary to move slowly and cautiously?

**Surely if the Insertion of a Clause Stating that the Bait Act Applies Fully and Entirely to These Lessees Will Put These Questions at Rest it Ought to be Done and Done Now Whilst the Act is Before the Legislative Council.**

If after this Contract has become law it is discovered that the Bait Act cannot be enforced or that its enforcement is a violation of the contract with this American firm the damage can only be repaired by full compensation to the lessees; compensation probably going into millions of dollars. The question to be considered is not whether these people are exempted from the Bait Act but whether or not the Government of the Colony can effectively enforce the Bait Act against them. Remembering always that the enforcement of the Bait Act is an administrative Act entirely within the discretion of the Government, and that the lessees under the agreement have the right to act up to the full letter of their contract which includes handling and marketing of Bait Fishes, and that the Government has contracted itself out of the power to exercise its discretion to enforce the Bait Act against them.

Thus her many pupils shed tears of sorrow when her death was made known. Some thirty years ago rheumatism claimed her as its victim, and she was for a few years able to get around with a stick; but she gradually got worse and at last she was confined to her room, where she has spent the last 25 years of her life. But she simply bore the pain and torment of that number of years with a smile. 



**Holiday Notes for 1910.**

CHAPTER XIII.—Bristol's Part in the Guy Celebration.

I. C. MORRIS.

The growth of Empire is a subject that well repays the student for his pains, and the statistician for his figures. But the writer does not intend to deal with these details in this article; his purpose is of a more general character, and of a more patriotic nature. His standpoint is that of a colonist, who, from his colonial home in the distance, views the world-wide Empire of which his country was the first-born child. And yet it is not a review of Empire, but rather of an incident in the beginning of its expansion, some three centuries ago.

For a century and more the land discovered by Cabot, and known as Newfoundland, was almost ignored as far as official circles were concerned. A few brave men, foremost among whom were Sir Humphrey Gilbert and Sir Walter Raleigh, and others of equal prominence, had done a good deal in the direction of colonization; but much of their enterprise was of a transitory nature, and they only looked upon the new country as a fishing station. In so far as these good men went, or in so far as they saw, they were very worthy pioneers, and they have no doubt gained the plaudits of Empire builders. But there was a wider vision than they seemed to have possessed, and it was the fulfillment of that vision which gave to England one of its foremost adventurers, and to Bristol one of its most enterprising citizens, and to Newfoundland one of its earliest colonizers. That adventurer, and that citizen, and that colonizer, was John Guy.

**"The Hand of Fate."**

New Secret Society With Black-Hand Methods Discovered at New York.

New York, Feb. 21.—Following the abortive bomb throwing, charged to unknown members of Black Hand, a new secret society of a similar nature among the Greeks is believed by the police to have been disclosed to-night by the arrest of Nicolas Tritakis. He is alleged to be a leader in an organization calling itself "The Hand of Fate," for the alleged purposes of extorting money from a wealthy Greek, Tritakis, who is a young Greek laborer, was seized by detectives in an elevated railway station to-night on a charge of having written threatening letters to the proprietors of the Hotel Athens, a well known house on Forty-second Street.

Within the past ten days Apostolos Fliga, one of the proprietors, received letters demanding a sum of \$2,000. He was afterwards advised by an un-

**Opening of New School at Grand Falls.**

(Concluded.)

Mr. Bray, addressing the meeting, said he looked upon this school, as many other people in the Island looked upon it, as an experiment. For him it was an experiment which with the cooperation of all concerned he hoped to carry to a successful conclusion.

The speaker then briefly reviewed the various ideals regarding education in times past, and showed how these had changed with the advance of time and the alteration of circumstances.

Up to the present time, he said, theoretical and purely literary studies had occupied almost the entire curriculum. Though he did not by any means despise those studies, he thought that more practical work should be introduced into the schools, and that practical studies should be acknowledged as equal at least to literary studies. He then reviewed the various subjects in the curriculum proposed. Every lesson, as far as possible, should be made to hinge upon some problem or inquiry. He dwelt upon the necessity of bringing the children more directly into contact with Nature, to learn of her the great and wonderful story she can tell. The children should be taken to the river, over the hills and through valleys to inquire of the rocks whence they came and of what they were made; of the river, its work and ways; of the winds, when they blow, the tidings they bring and their work in Nature's factory. By this means the children would learn far more than they would ever learn from the pages of a book.

Mr. Bray pointed out the absolute necessity for the parents' cooperation if the teachers were to carry on their work satisfactorily. He hoped the parents would visit the school, meet the teachers and exchange views with them. The teachers on their part would do all in their power to inculcate by their example those great virtues of willing helpfulness and cheerful obedience to duty, and to develop in the children a strong sense of their moral obligations, which will ensure for them peace and prosperity and the goodwill of their fellowmen and women. (Loud cheers.)

Mr. Cooke then addressed the children on Patriotism, love of country. He thought we in Newfoundland were prone to think too little of our country. This, he said, should not be so, for ours is a good country, none is healthier and in no other is there so much freedom in everything. He pointed out that each boy and girl was a unit of a great nation, the great British Empire, and the possessors of a good country, which would some day be great. Mr. Cooke then produced a large flag, the flag of Newfoundland which he presented to the school, and suggested that it should be kept flying over the school building throughout the school year. (Cheers and applause.)

Mr. Bray, in reply, gratefully accepted the gift on behalf of the boys and girls. He had only been in Newfoundland about two years, he said but he looked upon those years as among the happiest he had ever spent. He referred to a trip he had taken last summer around the Island, and expressed his admiration for the beauty of the country, and the great heart of the people, whose hospitality he could never forget. Mr. Bray then briefly described the flag, the significance of the various parts and explained the motto, after which Mr. Scott called for three cheers for Mr. Cooke, which were heartily accorded him.

Mr. Scott then declared the school open, and the Rev. J. Whittle asked the audience to stand whilst they repeated the Lord's Prayer, after which he offered a special prayer and asked a blessing on the school and its work.

The audience then dispersed after a very enthusiastic meeting, which augurs well for the future of the school and education in Grand Falls.

**Hints to Householders.**

PROFESSOR HENRY ADAMS in his Presidential Address to the Institute of Sanitary Engineers early in 1908, said:—"Gas fires for heating are already widely adopted for offices, consulting-rooms where a fire may be required at short notice. I have had nothing else in my office for the last thirty years and do not find any of the ill effects that have been ascribed to them."

"Gas fires are universally used by Medical men in London, and they recommend them for use in the homes of their patients."

The Coal Smoke Abatement Society, among whose members are many men of high scientific and artistic attainment, are strong advocates of the use of gas for heating. The Society carried out a most elaborate series of tests of gas fires, etc., in May and June, 1906.

**Three Die in Church.**

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 18.—Rev. James W. Robinson, aged 76, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, died suddenly to-day, five minutes before he was to begin the morning service. He had walked to the church home in Beneslar as usual and fell to the floor while talking with one of his parishioners.

Springfield, O., Feb. 19.—Stricken with apoplexy while assisting with the Holy Communion at the 7:30 o'clock Mass this morning, Father Francis M. Kennedy, chief assistant pastor of St. Raphael's Catholic Church died to-night without regaining consciousness. He was 26 years of age.

Detroit, Feb. 19.—Miss Annie W. Hayett, aged 51, of Windsor, Ont., was stricken with paralysis while in the Church of Our Father in Detroit to day and died in a few minutes.
