

Pump and colonial models, with very short vamps that show to advantage the unusually lovely silk stockings of to-day, are among the most popular models. Black satin evening slippers have heels studded with brilliant. Ex-tremely pretty are the black satin models with heels covered with either cloth of gold or silver. The new bathing suits are fashioned from black satin, blue-and-white and black-and-white checked taffetas, tartan plaids and plain taffetas and striped saraha. Biscuit-tinted veils are decidedly modish. An auto veil of chiffon on this color is barred with a fine black silk thread and finished on each edge with a darker tone of silk. An exceptionally snappy bathing-suit model is of plaided blue, green and black taffeta, barred in white. The circular skirt is made with a deep blue fold of the silk above the hem. The fancy of the moment in millinery is the small flat bow. It is used to hold back a portion of the turn-up brim, or a number of small ones are arranged to resemble a flight of birds. Laces on the ratine and macrame order come in white, light and dark ecru and string color. Bandings and edgings of these laces figure largely on frocks and coats of ratine and linen. Colors among the reds are sunset, raspberry, watermelon, tomato, geranium and flame. In purple we have grape, night, royal, thistle and amethyst. Colors with a tinge of tan are all popular. With a picture dress of black satin and white chiffon, which has a suggestion of "old fashions" skillfully adapted to modern ideas, an old fan should be carried. A Fragonard fan would be appropriate.

Beefsteak is usually bought on the hoof at 4½ cents a pound by liberal gentlemen known as packers, who wish to act for their country's good and at the same time extract a bare living profit for themselves and their dependent families. By the time they have transformed the hide into a pony skin coat, the horns into gluecase and the hoofs into shaving scap, what is left is sold at 25 cents a pound to people with rubber-set teeth and a love of adventure. In order to be thoroughly enjoyable, beefsteak should be cooked over a slow fire for one week prior to the noon-day meal. The most expensive variety is porterhouse steak, one slice of which will cause a \$12 a week salary to sag at the knees. This kind of meat is undressed and allowed to ferment in a refrigerator, and is never served until old age has put it on the defensive. The rib steak is a crude imitation of the porterhouse, and has to be assaulted with more determination. Then there is that hairy household favorite, the round steak, which has a very stubborn disposition and has to be carved with a two-handed cross-cut saw. The flank steak is a by-product with a cravenetite finish, and should either be Fletcherized or fed to some household pet. The fibre of the average hotel beefsteak is not approached by anything except the split hickory spoke and the better grades of linoleum, and is seldom molested by anybody after the first round. The fortitude of the American beefsteak reflects itself in the American character and stomach, neither of which is afraid of anything. A brisk bout with a beefsteak three times a day gave England her navy and her nerve, and it is making America the reddest-blooded infant of the nations of the earth.

Violated Pledge.

We have again and again pointed out that the Government is pledged to a reduction in taxation and that pledge has been flagrantly violated. Opportunities for doing something have been presented in four separate sessions of the Legislature but nothing at all has been done in the direction of easing the burden of the people.

How positively pledged the Government is to the policy of reduction of taxation is manifested by the words of Sir Edward Morris's Manifesto issued nearly four years ago. He pledged his faith to this policy in all the plainness of print, and with all the sacredness of his signature.

Easy as Sir Edward declared the problem, he has not tackled it. On the contrary he has worked energetically at piling up the debts and increasing yearly the burden of interest on the public debt. The high cost of living is especially felt in Newfoundland, for every rise in the outside market price on a dutiable import has not only to be met, but the high duty on the rise itself, and the importers' profit on the rise too. Here is where the special hardship of high duties come in. The evil has been intensified since the Morris Government came into power by the operation automatically of high custom duties on rising prices abroad. Yet nothing has been done to relieve a situation which is steadily growing worse.

10 Weeks To-day

It is now ten weeks to-day since the first memorial to His Excellency the Governor was sent in by the President of the Fishermen's Protective Union in reference to the connection of the Hon. D. Morison with certain transactions in timber limits. The Memorial protested against the retention of Mr. Morison as a Minister of the Crown. Not only is Mr. Morison retained in his office, but he is to-day practically Acting Premier. His Excellency was invited to take the matter into his cognizance, and it surely cannot be urged that he has not had ample time to deal with the question.

Serious Accident
 To Couple Intending to Get Married.

An accident happened in the West End of the city this morning under the most peculiar circumstances in which a bride and groom while on their way to the church to be married had a narrow escape from death and as it is so seriously injured.

Unfortunately, however, after being not more than a dozen yards from Alexandra House they were overtaken by a runaway horse which was dashing eastward at a lightning pace and run over. The animal was drawing a heavy four wheeled truck and collided with the side of a house on Queen's Street and did further damage. In the meantime the groom and bride were picked up (both unconscious) and driven to their respective boarding houses which they left. Miss Roach was badly injured about the head and is being constantly attended by Dr. Tait, while Mr. Kelts is seriously hurt about the sides and legs and Dr. Cowperthwaite is looking after him. The accident under such circumstances, is unusual and is being the topic of talk all over the city to-day. It is hoped that the unfortunate affair will not prove fatal.



City Council.

At the Municipal Council meeting yesterday Inspector Baker was directed to report further on the sprinkling of the belt line.

The request of the R. N. Co. for 1-inch water pipes at the car barn was referred to the Solicitor.

The applications of M. Barron and M. Whalen for jobs on steam roller, and E. Kearney for one on rock crusher were handed over to the Road Inspector.

Mrs. Gosling's letter was received, in which she informed the Council that the Public Fountain had arrived, and asked what steps the Council would take as to the location, erection and the ceremonies attending its inauguration.

The Engineer was directed to inspect the site suggested at Baird's Cove, and as to its effect on the traffic. After the report has been considered the other matters will be settled.

Morris and Dunfield, Solicitors, acknowledged the offer of \$1,500 in settlement of the claim of Schofield, Goodman & Co., England, for the supply of water pipes.

Mr. M. P. Gibbs asked for compensation for land taken from James Lynch for the extension of Central Street, and offered to assist in the enquiry. The Council has no knowledge of matter and will accept the assistance proffered.

On F. B. Wood agreeing to comply with regulations he will be given a better water service at the Hamilton Street factory.

The application of W. Clance for position as instructor and caretaker at the Quidi Vidi swimming pool, was filed.

The Council is considering the matter of the extension of the water and sewerage system at Flower Hill.

A. Daws and others of LeMarchant Road will be given a sewer connection. The Council will take up the question of new alignment and repair of Power Street.

The request of W. White for the erection of a fence and for a street line on the Southside was referred to the Engineer.

J. Dwyer, Catherine St.; G. F. Snow, Merrymeeting Road; L. Murphy, Water Street West; Mrs. Stapleton, Cabot Street; J. Keefe, Gower Street; S. Garland, Mullock, and M. Greene, were given permission to repair houses or erect extensions, as requested.

The Engineer will examine J. Doyle's application to build an annex to his dwelling on Brien Street.

J. Day, Field Street, complained of unsanitary condition of water course near his residence. This will be covered to prevent throwing of offensive matter there, and the sewer will be extended from Field Street to and along Scott Street.

Plans of alterations to Moore & Co.'s premises, Duckworth St., and Bowring's stables, Southside, were approved.

Contracts will be given C. Lester for the supplying of 200 tons of quarry spawls, W. Lester, J. Kelly, H. Saunders, G. Simmonds, E. Langmead and T. Linegar, 100 tons each, at 66 cents per ton.

P. H. Cowan will be given order for 100 name plates for streets.

S. Garrett will be given required curbing if in stock.

E. Elsbary will be offered \$300 as compensation for land taken and excavations made at Southside.

Dr. Brehm was directed to report on condition of houses in Plank Road, and steps will be taken to improve the condition of the drains.

Inspector Bambrick was directed to attend to the repairing of piling near Cook's premises, Southside.

King's Bridge will be repaired, and Engineer will estimate cost of necessary work at Browning's.

Sanitary Committee will meet each Thursday, with a view to improving the work conducted by the department.

Council confirmed the decision reached at a special meeting to raise the pay of sanitary staff to \$1.40 per day; the foremen to 20c. daily, and that of Messrs. Bambrick, W. Ryan, J. Holden, Barnes, Donnelly and Dwyer by 10c. per month.

Councillor Mullaly supported the raise of wages for the labourers, but opposed the raise to officials. When they had asked for it before it was refused on the ground that the finances would not permit, and the finances had not improved since.

Next week the water cart will be sent to the Southside.

Councillor Mullaly condemned the charges against the Mayor by an anonymous writer in the press, which stated he had discharged men and also asked inspectors to have their men ready to replace sanitary employees, on the ground that the full Council was responsible and not the Mayor alone. The other Councillors considered the Mayor had acted diplomatically under the circumstances.

The Mayor did not agree with the suggestion that men of wealth would manage Municipal affairs better than the present Board, inferred in a recent press letter, and believed those in power would show as good a record, particularly as to improving of water and sewerage conditions, as any of their predecessors. While he welcomed fair criticism, he felt the Council should not be ridiculed. As to those who were discharged, they had been laid off for refusing duty. Negotiations were being conducted with the L. S. P. U., and nothing definite received as to refusing to work unless the demand was granted, until 10 o'clock Saturday night. The men, therefore, under the circumstances, were dismissed for insubordination, and taken back when a settlement was made. He considered the criticism unfair.

Councillor Ryan pointed out that a few years ago Bambrick's men were held ready to replace those who threatened to strike. It was for the benefit of the city then, and was not objected to, but it was now, for what reason he could not understand.

CAPT HAS 20 WHALES. — The whaler Capt. Bull, operating at Balena, has twenty whales captured to date, most of which are sulphur bottoms. Capt. Bull is ahead of his catch this time last year and is high liner so far this season. Although whales are being found plentiful Capt. Bull says the conditions are unfavourable, fog being continuous.

The Big Fire of June 9th.

To-morrow (Sunday), marks the 66th anniversary of a memorable disaster in the history of the city. It is that of the great fire which occurred on June 9th in the year of 1848. The supposed origin of the conflagration was the upsetting of a glue pot in a furniture store on Queen's Street. Despite the combined efforts of soldiers, volunteers and citizens, the fire reached such headway that by midnight the entire city was wrecked, all the dwelling houses and business premises being wiped out and thousands upon thousands of dollars worth destroyed. There was also considerable loss of life among the fire fighters.

The remains are embalmed and well preserved and was forwarded by the S. S. Florizel this evening to Halifax in care of Messrs. A. G. Jones and Company, who will take the responsibility of the corpse to its destination.

The R. M. S. Mongolian left Liverpool on Tuesday last for this port. C. C. C. PARADE.—The C. C. C. will hold battalion parade at their armory at 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon. The S. S. Almeriana, Fairclough, sailed from Halifax at 9 o'clock last night and is due here early Monday morning. Mrs. Clapp left by last evening's train for New Harbor, T. B., on a visit to her sister, Mrs. (Rev.) J. White. We hear that a native of Bay Roberts has in view the building of a lumber mill at Maher's, nearby those already erected there. The timber in that part of the country is good and the water power excellent. The new mill will run in summer only.

The vote on the ninth district brought the days first definite line up of 38 to 17 in favour of the several Taft delegates and closed the Alabama contests.

Special to Evening Telegram. MIDDLETOWN, Conn., To-Day. A classing of 250 striking operatives at the Russel Mfg. Co. with the force of police officers and deputies at the mills, South Farms, brought here a platoon of volunteers from the Connecticut National Guard, who will stay to assist the police until the trouble is over. A few clashes were brought about by strikers trying to stop others from going into the mills. There were many arrests.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, To-Day. The proposal that Canada, Britain, and West Indies co-operate financially toward linking the British West Indies by cable is under consideration. Hon. Geo. Foster, now on the way to England, will take up the question with the British Government. The Canadian and West India delegates at the recent trade conference at Ottawa passed a unanimous resolution favoring the laying of a new cable from Bermuda, Demerara and other islands concerned in the proposed new trade arrangement.



HAVANA, June 7.
The gravity of the situation in Cuba was emphasized by the issuance last night by President Gomez of a proclamation to the Cuban people, urging them to arm and organize in face of national peril. The President expressed the hope that Congress would vote credits to cover the extraordinary military expenditure. This is in addition to the million dollars already voted. In his proclamation Gomez calls upon the Cuban people to rally to the support of the Government and to take up arms in the cause of civilization and their nationality against the onslaught of barbarian hordes, because if the uprising is not controlled within a short time, American intervention, resulting in the loss of Cuban independence, is inevitable. Gomez intimates that he proposes to take the field in person. A body of negroes attacked the Toledo sugar mill at Marranas, a suburb of Havana, with the intention of burning it, but were held at bay by the guards until the cavalry arrived.

BUDAPEST, June 7.
Count Tiesza, President of the Lower House, had a narrow escape from assassination in the Diet this morning. He was fired upon three times by Dep. Kovacs, who then shot himself, probably with fatal effect. Tiesza was uninjured. Kovacs was one of the most militant members of the opposition and was included in those who were elected from the chamber on Wednesday because of disorderly conduct.

CHICAGO, June 7.
President Taft won the first of the contests for seats in the Republican National Convention heard by the committee to-day, when by a vote of 53 to 0 the six delegates at large for Alabama was decided in his favour. The first vote was viva voce, Senator Bernal of Idaho asking for a ye or nay vote. It was complied with and the unanimous decision was confirmed.

LONDON, June 7.
The threatened national strike has been postponed again. The strike leaders had pledged themselves to issue orders for a strike to-night unless the employers agreed to their terms, but the employers said they would not be able to reply to the Government's proposal before Monday. Action is deferred till Tuesday.

BERLIN, June 7.
A special despatch to the Lokal Anzeiger from St. Petersburg, states that King George and the Czar were met during the summer to personally discuss a possible alliance between Britain, France and Russia. These countries are now in entente, and it is rumoured that the entente will be converted into an alliance.

NEW YORK, June 7.
Women, pledged to war on high prices for staple goods, started a campaign of violence at Brooklyn today, directing their efforts against meat shops. Riots resulted, and glass windows were broken, and a hundred women screamed approval.

LONDON, June 7.
Edward Wilding, one of the architects of the Titanic, said at the inquiry that if the steamer had struck the iceberg head on instead of a glancing blow, she would have been brought safely to harbour.

BOSTON, June 7.
Employees of the Elevated Railway are on strike, demanding recognition of the Union. Violence, including assaults on motormen, conductors, and the smashing of cars, resulted.

VIENNA, June 7.
Thirty soldiers were killed and a hundred were injured by an explosion at the Woelersdorf ammunition factory.

MONTREAL, June 7.
The health of the Duchess of Connaught continues to improve.



I'm old and battered up, in truth, and yonder tending cloths enjoy the priceless boon of youth, the first gift of the gods! It isn't fair—there's something wrong! I'm too short-winded now to push those buckskin mules along and guide the safety plow!"


