

The Priests' Convention

The Convention met at 10 a.m. yesterday to hear three excellent papers. Rev. A. E. Tulk, R.D., read a paper on "The Priest in the Study." He reminded us that study is one part of Ordination It is essential to an efficient Priest, and therefore must not

The paper given by Rev. I. Parsons dealt with the work of the Priest in his various duties in the House of God. He emphasized the need of the priest to be extremely careful in his deportment at all times in the church whether engaged in services or not. Many practical hints were given as to the conduct of the various services but especially of the great service of all—the Holy Communion. He pleaded for the greater use of the Church as a place of private prayer and devotion, which would react from the parish priest upon his people.

The paper was followed by one by Rev. R. F. Palmer who viewed the priest itself. Clearly and concisely he gave many counsels to guide the rest of the brethren in almost every department of the priest's life which includes both body and soul. Strikingly he emphasized our duty to the bodies of our people showing that very often the state of body influenced the soul. He felt that this was particularly true in the outports, where the opportunities for physical culture were so limited. An animated discussion followed these papers, which showed how greatly the convention appreciated

At 3.15 the Convention reassembled to hear papers by Rev. E. M. Bishop on "Missions at Home" and by Rev. Canon Smart on "Missions Abroad." Mr. Bishop spoke of the areas in our country with such a small population that they could not support their own Priest. They must, for years to come, receive help from the more prosperous and more densely-populated areas. He thought that our appeals for this purpose are too much in the abstract, and suggested that each Deanery should be made responsible for supplying the needs of a certain area. He went on to outline a scheme which would bring the Deanery into close touch with its "Mission" thereby rousing more interest. Canon Smart read an excellent paper on the duty of studying the world's problems and of acquainting ourselves with the needs of the church in other lands. Rev. E. Godfrey then spoke, from his own experience, of the great good done in India by Christian Missions. 

Economical Problems and Others

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-Your two editorials of

recent issues have interested me very much indeed. The one you headed "Carry out the Law" and the other "The Coal Industry and British Trade." It seems to me your Editorials reflect and suggest a great deal more than you actually write. Perhaps it is only a peculiar contrariness of my mind that seems to persist inaccepting the thoughts of another and setting them up as building stones in its own temple-a sort of finished ashler is thus provided for the use of a craftsman builder.

The thing that interests us all is life, and its manifold expression, and this peculiar form of life expression, existing on this little island home of ours, being human we are naturally interested in the activities of our species in some other part of the

Your Editorial, "The Coal Industry and British Trade" then becomes of real interest to us and in it we see that industry precedes trade. Great Britain by her genius for industry has become the greatest trading nation in the world. Her industrial genius made it necessary for her to go out and scour the undeveloped parts of the earth, and to bring in raw materials for manufacture into marketable products for the use of her own population and for exportation to the less industrially minded peoples of the world.

England does not produce raw cotton: well then why does she not sit back and buy her cotton manufactures from the U.S.A. or elsewhere? Most people will consider this a silly question when applied to England and her industrial life; but do not so readily see its suicidal aspect when applied to our cwh country and

her industrial development. The fact, as cited in your editorial, that the number of miners employed in England fell off from 1.137,000 in December to 1.122.700 in March becomes a serious cause for alarm. This represents a decrease of a little over one per cent, and is sufficiently serious and important to engage the active interest of the whole nation, whereas in Newfoundland the loss of a home industry almost a hundred per cent, does not seem to arouse more than passing thought.

Capt. Kean and other writers have shown up the passing of one of the great local industries, that of shipping, that of transportation of our products to foreign shores for sale. the writer in your contemporary, the Jaily News, shows that this industry would be worth to Newfoundland the handsome amount of over a quarter of a million dollars per year. In other words this industry of shipping would add, and should add, over a nuarter million dollars to the purchasing power of Newfoundland and Newfoundlanders.

We have purselves had the painful duty of bringing to the attention of the public the passing of another great local industry-that of the manufacture of boots and shoes in Newfoundland.

I could quote other cases of industrial starvation and near death, but let the above suffice for the moment.

My limited knowledge of the practical working cut of the shipping industry does not enable me to enter into any detailed discussion of its problems. My economic knowledge, however, and a more or less cursory reading of the trend of events in the thipping world entitle me to make tome general observations.

It would seem to me that oil could be stored at St. John's and andled much more efficiently than toal. Beneficial legislation should y all means be effected, forthwith. There should be no hesitation allowng foreign going ships to obtain prorisions and stores in bond, including il or coal.

There should be a definite and nore concerted effort made to develp direct return trading with the ountries to whom we sell. This coupled with some statesmanship could be made of inestimable value in timulating these markets for our roducts.

The world is fast approaching a iew era of co-operative trading where oth parties to the bargain are beneited thereby. Many benefits would low to our little land from a more efinite and exact system of tradng. Personal interests or political ifferences should not be allowed to nterfere with the most efficient deelopment of cur foreign trading. lvery interest should unite in the uilding up of this great local indus-

When a consignment of fish arrived from Monroe & Co., it was fish bonded. Very often he would cable the Islands at once or would write by the earlies opportunity. Some of the fish was sold locally in bond, and a transfer was given to the local purchaser. The price received was entered in the Consignment Sales Book,

made them out at the duty paid prices. membered, was in the case of a cargo of fish landing here from the schooner "David C. Ritcey." which arrived here in distress. Large quantities of this fish were shipped to Pernambuco on the instructions of the shippers. The cargo was never intended for Barbados, but for Brazil. The quality of the fish sent to Pernambuco was better than that sold locally. Mr. Monroe had always requested him to sell the fish for the best price he could get in the other islands, if he could not get it sold in Barbados.

In adding \$1.50 to prices of the goods in bond, he was following the custom in the trade in this Island. It was nothing invented by him. He had been brought up in the commission office of Mr. Bancroft, but Mr. Bancroft never handled fish on consignent. He had heard Taylor say that he manipulated the Account Sales when making them up, but that was an absolutely false statement. Sometimes he would sign the Account Sales in hurry to leave the office. These account sales were generally made up at the close of the sale of the consignment. In one or two cases if three or four casks were left and a mail was ready, these casks would be priced at the last price received,-sometimes at a lower price, never higher,-and the account sales were completed and sent on instead of losing the mail the object was to let the consigner know that he was ready for another shipment. He never, purchased on his own account a single cask of fish from any consignment. Monroe & Co. had written him on several occasions expressing their satisfaction with the manner in which

he had been doing their business. At this stage, 1.30 p.m., the further hearing was adjourned until 10.30 a. on Monday.-Barbados Advocati

Landslides Versus Snowstorms

Californians "declare their state to be the ideal place to live, and we won't say it isn't," says an editorial writer in Aera (Albany and New York), "but it looks as if old Mother Nature was determined that even in an ideal climate the street-railway men shall have something to trouble them." He refers to landslides that have disarranged the tracks of a San Francisco street-railway, and he suggests that it probably costs the operating company as much to make repairs after such slides as it costs a big eastern or northern railway company to remove snow and keep its lines open through a blizzardy winter. Brief details of the toptigraphical conditions that make operation of the San Francisco railway a complex engineering problem

are given: "The Market Street Railway operates a double track around the cliff leading to the Cliff House, overlooking the Golden Gate. The tracks are along the bluffs, about 200 feet above sea-level. At several places the line passes through ravines, where the surface is sand on a thin layer of blue clay lying directly on a slanting rock foundation. During the rainy season the drainage from a large area seeps in on this clay, and the entire surface of the ravine begins to slide. The ravines are from forty to seventy-five feet in depth and from 100 to 200 feet wide. In some of them there is a continual slide, throughout the year, but it does not cause any material dam-

During the heavy rains of last February the line was destroyed in several places.

How Fast Can You Think?

TESTS TO MEASURE MINDS.

To guide them into the most suitable areers, one thousand London school children are being subjected to psychological tests. "John is younger than Bob, but John

is older than Bob's younger brother William. Which is the oldest?" It seems a trivial question. Yet the speed with which you can grasp and reply to this schoolboy's problem gives the scientist a fairly accurate indication of your general mental powers.

One girl in every eight leaving London's elementary schools becomes a dressmaker's apprentice, which is a larger proportion than for any other occupation. Now a successful dressmaker has a keen perception of equal distances, which enables her to fold her work, as in hems and tucks, with accuracy, and to make stitches of equal size. So the industrial scientists have invented tests, such as dividing pencil lines in half without measuring or drawing freehand parallel lines, and the girls who excel at these tests can be definitely advised to take up iressmaking.

What Are These Animals?

Many other occupations, ranging from engine-driving to clerical work, are being analyzed in the same way, and appropriate tests devised. Here are some of the simple ones. URTLET. BARBTI.

Each of the above groups of letters can be rearranged to form the name of an animal. Most schoolboys can complete a list of twenty such names in four minutes.
