



THE LATE HON. THOS. D'ARCY MCGEE.

The public mind has not yet recovered from the shock it received by the intelligence that the Hon. Thomas D. McGee was shot dead on Tuesday morning by an unknown assassin.

Mr. McGee was the second son of the late James McGee, of Wexford, Ireland, and was born at Carlingford, in the county of Louth, on the 13th of April, 1825, so that had he lived a few days longer he would have been forty-three years of age.

On Mr. McGee's return to the States, and between 1848 and 1857, he at different times published "The New York Nation," and "The American Celt." During this period he was violently and, from the force of recent discipline, bitterly hostile to Great Britain.

Previous to this time his occupations were professedly those of an author and lecturer, and only accidentally those of a politician.

in which he had taken up his abode. His public career in Canada now fairly commenced, and since then it is a matter of history with which our readers are quite familiar.

Mr. McGee was never in the proper sense of the word a politician, nor did he possess in any great degree those qualities which make a laborious and efficient executive officer.

If there is one question more than another with which Mr. McGee has identified his name, that question was the union of all the Provinces, and as connected with, and inseparable from it, the question of national defence.
