

London, Dec. 23.—The Morning Telegraph to-day prints a telegram from Berlin, announcing that Prussis has called a conference of the Great Powers of Europe to settle peaceably the question at issue between Turkey and Greece.

London, Dec. 23.—The report of the proposed Conference on the Eastern Question is fully confirmed. The Vienna Presse, the Government organ, says, semi-officially, that the plan originated with Russia, backed by Prussia, and that the scheme is favoured by Austria snd Italy.
