TUESDAY, JULY 2, 1912 THE REGINA DISASTER

The heartfelt sympathy of every town and in Western Canada will go out to the Capital of the neighboring province in the appalling astrophe which has befallen it.

Outside of the actual srea of the disaster there vas probably no place to which the news came th a greater shock than in this city. Local Market Will Take Care of Three Million **Bushels of Barley**

FROM every section of Alberta comes the news that the rainbow of glorious promise is making glod the basis that the rainbow agriculturalist, and that a bumper crop, surpassing all others of the past is as nearly assured as it could possibly be.

The best of the news is that the grain is fully three weeks ahead of any former season. This means an early harvest, and ar early harvest means the defeat of the Frost King, and millions of dollars for those who till the soil and revival of activities of every industry that depends on those who sow and garner.

'A good early crop will put Alberta ahead five years." said vell known banker to The Albertan yesterday. "It is not probabl that the railroads will be able to handle all of the grain grown this year for months, but the Canadian Pacific is expending millions of dollars for rolling stock for this purpose, and the probabilities are that the grain will move with at least twice the expedition that it did last year. The money will come back by the million. It will go into every avenue of trade, and Calgary, the metropolis of the great wheat belt, will have a fall and winter of prosperity that will astound even the most sanguine.

"A new factor in the local markets will be the provincial consumption of barley, always a fairly sure crop. Big brewing and malting institutions at Calgary, Edmonton and Lethbridge now in the course of construction, and which should be completed in time to take care of much of this year's crop, will afford a local market, according to the report of experts, of 3,000,000 bushels of barley. This is in addition to what has been consumed in the past.






