WEDNESDAY, Oct. 14. The heavy rains of the past two days has almost paralyzed the retail business of the city.

Mr. F. Wolfertan Thomas read the annual report of the directors as follows: The year just closed has been a year of unusual activity in the business of the bank.

Through the lumber interest, which is one of the important industries of the country, is doing well, and the business of both cotton and woollen manufactures is improving, yet, in view of the prevailing depression, the only moderate harvest which has been gathered in, and the low prices ruling for all agricultural products, we cannot anticipate this year's result in any more favorable exhibit than that now submitted.


The New York stock market was active and higher, the close being irregular. The New York Central opened at 101, touched 102 1/2, closed 101 1/2; sales 100,000.
