OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—The Montreal City Passenger Railway Company is understood to have submitted a proposal to the postoffice authorities to transport all uniformed mail carriers within the city and suburbs for a fixed sum per aunum, the idea being that this service will not only expedite the delivery of letters, but may enable the department to re-

duce the number of letter carriers. 
