

"If after the expiration of one year from the date of insolvency the insolvent has not obtained from the required proportion of his creditors a consent to his discharge, he may apply by petition to the court to grant him his discharge, and must at least 30 days before such application send to each of his creditors, whose claims amount to \$100 and upwards, notice of such application.

"No landlord shall be entitled to distrain upon any goods in the custody of any guardian or liquidator, and any landlord having distrained upon any goods of the debtor before the same shall have come to the possession of any guardian or liquidator, shall be bound on demand to deliver up such goods, subject to the rights of the landlord to his preferential claim for rent.

"Clerks and other persons in the employ of the insolvent in or about his business or trade at the time of the assignment; or the issue of a writ of attachment, or within one month prior thereto, shall be collocated in the dividend sheet by special privilege for any arrears or wages due and unpaid to them at the time of the execution of a deed of assignment, or of the issue of a writ of attachment not exceeding three months of the stage.


