WHISKY AND TOBACCO EXPORTS. The Island Revenue Returns Show a Quarterly Increase in Every Section. The Malt Trade Below the Average.

OTAWA, Ont., Jan. 7.—The annual report of the Department of Internal Revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30 has been printed and ready for distribution. From it it appears the total revenue for the year was \$8,320,230, an increase of \$447,704 over last year and of \$1,067,867 over the average of the four previous years.

On his return to Europe he was thanked by the King for his services, and was personally decorated by His Majesty with the Order of the Star, an order which he received from the King.

After five months' travel in Berlin and seven months' travel in Italy and Austria in medical charge of Sir R. B. De Winton, as principal medical officer of the Congo Free State.

He afterwards visited both in South America and made a voyage up the Amazon.

His services were highly appreciated by the Government, and he was awarded the Victoria Cross for his services in the Congo.
