

THE LATE DR. SHAW.

REMAINS OF THE REV. GENTLEMAN TO BE INTERRED TO-DAY.

For 45 Years the Victim of a Late Tragic Accident Has Devoted Himself Assiduously to the Welfare of His Fellow Beings—The Fall-Bearers Chosen From Among His Sorrowing Friends in the Ministry.

At 2 p.m. to-day the remains of the Rev. John Shaw, one of the pioneers of Methodism in this country, will be borne to their grave in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery by six of his associates, who, like him, have grown white-haired in the service of Christianity.

Dr. Shaw was born at Perth, Ontario, in 1815, and was educated at the University of Toronto. He was a member of the Executive Council of the Methodist Church in Canada, and served as Moderator of the General Conference of 1878.

He was a man of great energy and ability, and his life was a constant struggle for the betterment of his fellow men. He was a devoted husband and father, and his death is a great loss to his family.

His remains will be interred in the family vault in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery. The funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.

Dr. Shaw's life was a long and useful one. He was a man of great faith and courage, and his death is a great loss to the church and the world.

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DOINGS AT WASHINGTON.

Walrath was shot and died in Hope Hospital. Stone is under a 10 years' sentence. Duffy was sentenced to 15 years.

Stone's confession details the murder of a wealthy farmer, the stabbing of Jack Buffalo, and other crimes. He also admitted to several other murders.
