1. For membership $\$ 1 \mathrm{up}$ to the day of show.
2. Parties uot claiming their prize money before Dec. 31st, forfeit the same for the benefit of the Society. Parties receinng a prize or prizes will be paid the full amount.
3. Animals exhibited must have been the bona fide property of exhibitor for at least one month previous to the show.
4. All produce must have been grown by the exhibitor during the ourrent year. Potatoes to be exhibited in bexes or baskets; and apples upen plates.
5. Brood Mares, Cows, Ewes and Sows must have borne young during the present year. Mares must have raised a foal, and cows must be giving milk at the time of exhibition or give evidence of having been far gone with calf.
6. Each animal must be provided with a chain or rope, and be placed on the show greands amongst those of its class, and exhibitors of thoroughbred stock must be prepared to produce the certificate of registration.
7. All Manufactures to be of Canadian make, the property of the manufacturer or his agent. Articles shown under the head of Manufactures and Ladies' Work must have been made by the exhibitor or their family, and never been awarded a prize previous to 1891, exhibitors in all cases to be the producers and bonn fide owners. Upon the discovery of any fraud or deception, either in the production or ownership, concerning any article exhibited, the Directors will have power to withhold any prize awardecu, and may prohibit any such party from exhibiting in any class for two or three yeurs, and may priblish the names of such persons or not, as may be deemed expedient.
8. Exhibitors are requested to enter such articles only as they intend to exhibit, which will greatly facilitate the work of the Secretary, and save unvecessary waste of time.
9. While the Directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of the articles sent to the Exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting, and, should any ariicle be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery, but they will not make any payruent for the value thereof.
10. It does not follow that because a prize is offered for any particular animal or article that it must be awarded, unless there is proper competition, or unless the exhibit is roally of sufficient merit to warrant the award bcing made. The Judges are partioularly requested to note this fact.
11. Articlos entered for exhibition must be in their assigned places by 11 o'clock on the morning of the first day of the Show, 27th September, otherwise they may be re fused.
12. All Live Stock ind Implements, etc., etc., must be on the Show Grounds at 11 o'clock a.m. sharp on the second day of the Show, 28th September; and all Grain, Roots, Fruit, Dairy Produce, Ladies' Work, Fine Arts, Horticulture, in the Hall by 11 o'clock on the first day of the Show, September 27th.
13. Ladies are particularly requested to have articles for competition in Class 20 properly entered so as to correspond with the Prize List.
14. No articles shall be removed from the Hall until 4.30 o'slock p.m. on the second day of the Show, and any person detectel takina frdit or other articles wile be positivily punished accomding to law. This year four constables will be placed in the Hall.
15. No person shall be a Judge in any class in which he is an exhibitor, or interested in or has any relations exhibiting.
16. Heayy Dranght Teams must be $\varepsilon$ ttached to a Lumber Wagon, and General Purpose, Carriage and Roadster Teams attached to a Democrat or Buggy. No Sulmies allowbd. Saddle Horses with their proper equiments.
17. Exhibitors or others will not be allowed to handle or interfere with articles on exhibition. When entered they must be considered in the hands and under the entire control of the Society.
18. No animal or article entitled to more than one prize, excopt in special prizes,and no article exhibited in the Hell is to have the owner's name thereon. No more than one premium in any class will be awarded to any exhibitor, or paid if awarded.
19. In all cases of doubt or difficulty that may arise before making their awards, the Judges shall submit the matter to one of the Directors; and the President and two or more Directors shall finally settle the same.
20. 1st prise ticket, Red; 2nd, Blue ; 3rd, Yellow; Highly Commended, Green.
21. No entire horse allowed to compete, except yearlings in their respective classes by themselves, or for the fastest walking team competiticn, or for speeding.
22. Membership tickets or duplicute ticket will admit one if presented to the gate keeper. To others a charge of 15 cents each will be made (and please have the riglt change). T'ickets must be purchased before going to the gate, as no money will be taken there. Twenty-five cents for a one-horse buggy, and twenty cents for a saddla horse (if not entered for competition).
23. Judges are requested to report themselves to the Secretary on their arrival and proceed to their duty, at $11.45 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. on the first day (Sept. 27th), nnd at 12 o'clock sharp on the second day of the Show (Sept. 28th).
24. Those extiibiting Fruit or Flowers are requested to have the proper name attached to the article when available.
25. Parties exhibiting new kinds of grains are requested to give the name, and exhibit samples in ear.
26. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing and it must be delivered to the Secretary within one week of the cause of protest; it must state pluinly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be accompanied by a deposit of $\$ 2$, which sum shall be forfeited to the Society if the said protest is not sustained. The Board of Directors, however, earnestly hope that exhibitors will not enter protests without the strongest grounds for so doing, as much annoyance and uipleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
27. The Judges are expected, in the execution of their duties, to be careful to act with the most rigid impartiality, and make their entries in a clear and conspicuous manner ; in all cases of doubt or difficulty referring freely to the Secretary.
28. No animal or article exhibited shall have about it any prize colors or caida until the awards have been made in their respective classes.
No person shalis be permityted in the Honse or Cattle Rivgs during the time of judg. ing except the Judges, the grooms, or persons in charge of the animals, or Directors.
29. All prize cards which have been affixed by the Judges must be displayed during the Exhibition. Any infraction of this rule will incur the forfetture of any premium awarded.
30. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with or influence the Judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall at any time, on the premises of the Society, use any contemptucus or abasive language to any Judge in consequence of any award made by him, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitled, and shail be excluded from exhibiting for two years thereafter. Judges are particularly requested to immediately report any breach of this rule.
31. At the hour of 4 o'clock in the afternoon, or as soon as all prizes are awarded on the second day of the Show, all Prize Horses and Cattle shall be paraded in the ring in their respective classes, and if any are absent, the prize or prizes awarded for such shall be forfeited.
32. All entries must be made with the Secretary, either personally or by letter (pre paid) if possible four days prayous to the day of the Show; persons neglecting to do so may up to 10 o'clock on the morning of the Show, by paying twenty-five cents, to be applied to the General F'und.
33. Exhibitors making their ontries are particularly requested to make outa list, before leaving home, of the articles they intend to enter, with their name and address clearly and legibly written. This will greatly facilitate and expedite the making of entries as well as prevent mistakes, which frequently occur in filling blanks hastily from verbal instructions.
34. Tho 'treasarer will commence payment of prizes aix days afthr the show, and persons having prizes awarded them may call on that day, or leave a written order for

- 36. Efficient constables will be engaged to see that no person be allowed to meddle or interfere with the fruit or other articles exhibited, and special arrangements will be made for the protection of these articles, and to prevent any annoyance from dust or otherwise.

37. No dealer in candies or fruits, hucksters or petty traders, shall be allowed to traffiv on the Show Grounds on fair day except upon previous payment to the Treasurer of a fee of $\$ 20$, and that no such dealer shall be perinitted to traffic. in such wares or goods within 300 yards of the Show Grounds on such days without paying the said fee; and that no gambling be allowed on any phetense whatever, either upon the Grounds or within said 300 yards thereof.

The Directors wish to call particular attention to Rules 7, 10, 29, 31, 32, 33 and 34, as the non-observance of these rules heretofore has given considerable annoyance and dissatisfaction.

L-The Directors this year have made complete arrangements, so that all fruit and eatables cannot be handled by the public.
A large number of horse buyers, and other parties, wanting to purchase Colts, Cattle, Sheep and Pigs, have promised to attend our Show on the second day. This is a good opportunity for farmers who want to sell.

Central Aoricultural Society will not accept of any spitclal donation Prizeg.
Every one must walk the one way around in the Inside Hall, and drive the one way around on the track.

One sot of Judges upon Horses will judge the General Purpose, Agricultural and Heavy Draught classes, and anothor set of Judges will judge the Carriage and Roadster classes, in the order named in this Prize List.
