Absorption of the Traders Bank of Canada by the Royal Bank of Canada is in line with mergers that have taken place in the city since the first of the year. Taken in connection with the investigation of the "money trust" in this country, the Canadian merger is significant in that it again brings to light the fact that the United States is not the only country that "suffers" from the concentration of banking power.

n the past twelve years the number of chartered banks in Canada has decreased from thirty-nine to twenty-seven. Of this latter number—treating the Royal and the Traders as one—over 50 per cent. of the resources are concentrated in six institutions. One bank has about 17 per cent. of the total, and another about 18 per cent. The total resources amount to \$1,414,858,991, and the gross deposits to \$1,022,678,194, according to the reports of March 30.

The chartered banks of Canada

March 30.

The chartered banks of Canada are the principal banking institutions of that country. They have practically all the functions that in this country are allowed national, state and savings banks, trust companies and private bankers. Altho chartered by the government, there is little supervision exercised over them. The Canadian Bankers' Association, of which each bank is a member, is authorized by law to supervise the issuance and redemption of bank notes, and it also regulates the clearing houses thruout the country. Each institution has a system of inspection of its branches, but the head office is not examined and the utmost secrecy is maintained by officers and employes, in fact, have to take an oath of secrecy before they may secure a position. A report of the condition of the hanks is made each month, but this report is condensed. condition of the banks is made each month, but this report is condensed, and does not give any information regarding the conditions of the territories in which the branches are located.

Another feature of Canadian banking which would hardly be countenanced in this country is that known as the "one-bank" policy. In effect this policy prevents a person from doing business in more than one institution. In other words, if a merchant falls to secure a loan from his bank he has little hope of obtaining his requirements from another. This policy is one of the unwritten laws in connection with Canadian banking, and is rigidly adhered to by all institutions. In matter of legislation, all banks work together, and all are informed of every bill that is ever introduced in parliament. The banks voice their opinion on a subject thru their general organization, the Canadian Bankers' Association, and an example of the power of this body was revealed some time ago, when one of the smaller institutions was expelled from the Toronto Clearing House because it paid 31-2 per cent. on deposits as compared with 3 per cent. by other banks.



Many of us had not noticed until recently that two Pentecostal blessings are mentioned by the prophet. Our overlooking this was doubtless because it was not due time for this feature to be clearly understood. The word "Sabbath," as is well known, signifies rest, and this culmination of the Sabbath days in a fiftieth signifies the completeness of the rest.





Chicago Pit in Nervous Condition, With Trade Inclined to Bull Position-Climatic Conditions

CHICAGO, May 55.—On account of complaints from Nebraska that rain was needed, and because the drought in Western Kanasa had only been broken in part, wheat to-day showed unexpected strength Wheat closed firm, %c to 1%c above last night. Latest trading left corn varying from %c decling to %c advance; oats up %c to 1%c, and provisions unchanged to 7%c increase in cost.

Wheat speculators at first believed that the rainfall in Kanasa was confined to eastern and central portions of the state, where moisture was not required, and that dypness still plagued the western plains, where the crops had been parching brown. A buying movement here received much impetus before word was received that the downpour had extended a considerable distance into Northwest Kansas. The break that ensued carried the market a little below last night's level, but prices could not be budged any further, and soon rallicd, helped by statements that many thousands of acres in Nebraska were in danger, if rain did not come quickly.

In his special cable despatch the London correspondent of The New York don correspondent of The New York Evening Post says:

LONDON, May 25.—What we hear by cable of Wall street's endeavors to accept with calmness Roosevelt's success at the various state primaries, and to adjust its views acquiescently to the new situation, occasions some skeptileism here. We are not able wholly to forget what your important people said in 1997, nor your marked it is not considered that a prospect of Mr. Roosevelt's re-election would necessarily curtail industrial activity and expansion; but people closest in touch with American finance believe that it may result in preventing due reflection of such expansion in the price of stock exchange securities. These, we suspect, would probably be affected by constant political pinpricks, and by recurrent apprehension of legislators yielding to demagogic pressure.

As I have foreshadowed in previous cables, the recent reduction in our bank rate has been followed by increased rather than decreased stringency in the open money market, where private rates are now actually above what they were when the bank reduced its official minimum on May 9. This is partly explained by the unusual magnitude of the government's balances at the bank, and by further borrowing on treasury bills.

The firmness in money is likely to continue here up to the end of June: At Berlin, the prospect of a keen demand until after the July settlements amply explains the refusal of the Imperial Bank to follow the Banks of France and England in lowering its 5 per cent, official rate.

Next week's stock exchange settlement here is awaited with much anxiety. The trouble chiefly arises from the slump in Marconi shares, but many other departments are affected, and the settlement will possibly be the most difficult experienced for more than a year. Some further stock exchange failures are almost inevitable; indeed, they are desirable it lightletter.
