More About Banking and Mergers.

The Bank Act is worthy of the consideration of the Canadian people and the Canadian newspapers. The Montreal Gazette, however, has undertaken to lead off the discussion by some cheap references to those who are discussing it and have something new to suggest.

When The Gazette says that the Bank Act is practically in no need of any kind of revision, and when it speaks of those who suggest improvements as meddlers and amateurs it is injuring the cause of its clients.

The Mail newspaper in its Saturday issue has something pretty much on the same line. It is publishing special correspondence, dated Regina, and deals with the cheap money movement of the grain growers of Saskatchewan.

Nor has The Gazette anything to say about bank mergers. Apparently it is delighted at the prospect of more of them; but perhaps The Gazette will take a little time and read Mr. Wilkie's references to bank mergers, and especially this sentence which we now propose to quote.

New this is the way the Traders were absorbed by the Royal. The directors who were in possession of the boxes of the shareholders, in order that they might carry on the business of the bank, used these proxies to wipe the whole Traders Bank out of existence.

We do not for one moment see how the Minister of Finance and the Borden cabinet at Ottawa can sanction the purchase of the Traders Bank by the Royal, and when the government ascertains the facts attendant on that transaction they should receive such a shock as will prevent any sanction whatsoever.

Earlscourt Fire Caused Heavy Damage

Papers and Patents Worth \$22,000 Were Destroyed When Charles Twigg's Cottage Was Destroyed—Owner Tried to Jump Into Flames—Firemen Delayed by Roads

When Charles Twigg's two-story frame dwelling, half a mile north of Earlscourt, was burned to the ground about 10.30 last night, five sections of the fire department were given the hardest rush in years.

The damage to the house, which was located at Nairn-street and Kymnouth-avenue, did not amount to much over \$1000, but Charles Twigg, the owner and occupant, an old man, who had lived in the neighborhood all his life and had worked on inventions, was distracted over his loss.

PEOPLE SUFFER FROM COLOR BLINDNESS

Rev. Moffat Gautrey Says Public Evils Are Permitted on That Account—Clericalism Denounced at Sixty-First Anniversary of Cooke's Presbyterian Church.

Denunciations of clericalism featured the dramatic sermon of Rev. Moffat Gautrey, M.A., president of the Brotherhood Association of Great Britain, at the morning service of Cooke's Presbyterian Church yesterday.

"Would to God that all the Lord's people were prophets," the wish expressed by Moses in the Book of Numbers, formed the text.

Friends of Moses were indignant because two unordained members of the Israelite camp were giving patriotic orations in addition to the seventy regularly appointed elders, he said.

Moses told his indignant followers why he longed for all the people to be prophets—because there is no vision that the people perish.

It was the same in Toronto to-day as in the days of Moses. Vice and intemperance were not evil of a mushroom growth.

The Christian prophet must have a magnanimous heart. Magnanimity of heart was the only patent of nobility.

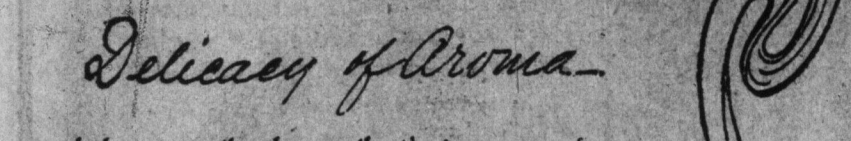

PROFITABLE PUBLIC OPERATION

After deciding a few months ago that its street railway system should be privately owned and operated, the City of Brandon, Manitoba, will be asked to reconsider the matter. The decision of the city council to take advantage of the withdrawal of Mr. T. D. McGregor from the field and to take immediate steps for the construction and operation of a municipal system, has met with general public approval, and there is little doubt that the bylaw to be submitted on June 13 will be carried with practical unanimity.

Some Canadian newspapers opposed to the principle of municipal ownership and operation of public services and utilities are resurrecting an old complaint of its enemies in Great Britain, that the municipalities of that country do not set aside enough for depreciation. It has been shown year after year from the accounts of the city undertakings and from those of private franchise holding companies, that the municipalities set aside amounts for depreciation from two to three times greater than the companies do.

We in Ontario can look forward with confidence to the hydro-electric policy of Sir James Whitney and Hon. Adam Beck, to bring to our relief the "white coal" of Niagara power, which is being preserved for the people and not for the trusts.

LATEST BRITISH BY-ELECTION

Altho South Hackney by-election has resulted in the return of the Liberal candidate by 523 to 436 votes, it can scarcely be regarded as encouraging for the Asquith Government. At the last general election Mr. Horatio Bottomley, whose bankruptcy created the vacancy, running as an independent Liberal, headed the poll with 5068 votes, the Unionist polling 3243 votes, and the straight Liberal candidate 126 votes.

For some time Mr. Bottomley has largely filled the role of a parliamentarian. He is a man of high standing in the Liberal party, and his influence accounts to some extent for the drop in the Liberal majority.

SAND FILTRATION

In a memorandum recently prepared by the engineers of the Edinburgh and District Water Trust (a public body representing the corporations of Edinburgh and Leith) an instructive comparison is drawn between the cost of the ordinary sand method of filtering and mechanical filtering. It is based on the actual working tests at Alnwickhill and Fairmilehead and shows that while mechanical filters are cheaper to install in the first instance, they are rather more expensive to work than sand filters on a fairly large scale.

Indeed, the cartoonists practiced by them were and are so outrageous as to suggest a sinister motive such as such an aversion disposition.

is said to be only an "experimental twist," and large orders are being solicited and freely given on prospect of further increases before the end of the summer.

The recent increase in the pay of the miners is the excuse for the present raid upon the consumer. That raise was five and one-quarter per cent, and if the figures of the coal trust are to be believed, increased the labor cost per ton of its product from two dollars to less than two dollars and twelve cents.

As a matter of fact, the cost of the coal at the pit-mouth, including investment, royalties, upkeep of machinery, care of live stock and cost of labor and superintendence combined, does not exceed what is claimed to be the cost of the mere labor employed, to wit \$2.13 per ton. The coal can be transported from the mines to Lake Ontario ports, with only a fair rate charged, at sixty cents per ton.

The lion's share of the princely profit goes to the eight railway companies which purchase and transport the output of the mines. Roads like the Lackawanna, the Reading and the Lehigh Valley are piling up surpluses and dividing dividends in a manner which suggests the failure of railway regulation to bring about the beneficial results which would undoubtedly accrue to the consumer from public ownership.

As a matter of local interest, we may observe that anthracite coal can be carried cheaper than any other freight. This was the contention of M. K. Cowan, K.C., in resting the recent application to the Dominion Railway Commission for an increased freight rate upon anthracite coal, and it is fully sustained by the elaborate investigations recently made by the United States Government.

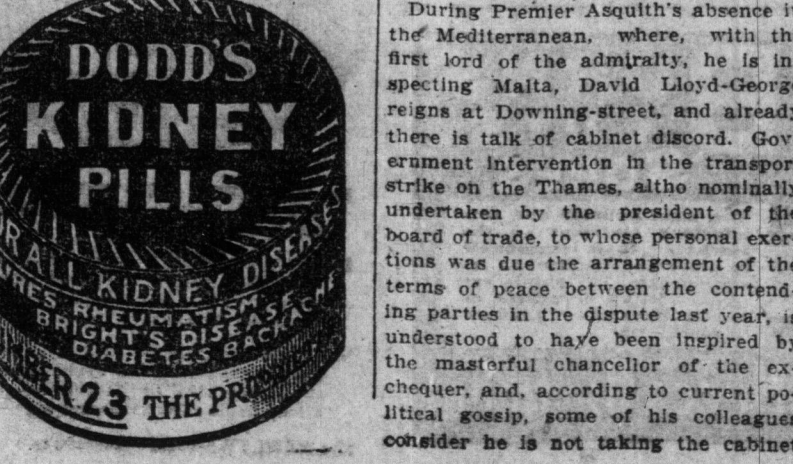
WILL DEPORT LEPER
