CONFERENCE PROVES ABORTIVE ORLANDO LEAVES FOR ROME

Premier Orlando in Statement Rebukes Wilson and Asserts Claims

Paris, April 24.—A statement issued by Premier Orlando today gives Italy's case concerning Flume and the Dalmatian coast and does not appear in the form of an ultimatum.

Premier Orlando declares that President Wilson's proclamation is an attempt to place the government in opposition to the people. "He is treating the Italians," adds the premier, "as if they were a barbarous people, without a democratic government."

The premier rebukes the president for addressing himself to the Italian people over the head of the Italian government, and says he never considered America bound by the treaty of London, but that Italy's case is based rather on right and justice.

The premier says he has never denied that the pact of London did not apply to Fiume, but the Italian claim was based on the principles of President Wilson's fourteen points.

"Italy," says Premier Orlando, "requires for her safety not only the northern boundary of the Alps, but also protection on her eastern flatk by the occupation of the line of Mont Nevoso. The right of self-determination should permit the population to have their wish to enter the Italian kingdom and to characterize Italy's aspirations to the Dalmatian coast, over which for centuries heretofore it has spread.

"The reconstruction of the Italian kingdom would contain within its boundaries fewer non-nationals than any other new state."







They invariably promised that when they had money they would vote it liberally. But food, clothing and other necessaries came first, they said, so he had set himself to the discovery of a link between education and wealth.

He finally worked out a formula which


The first term was the natural resources of the country, climate, soil, and other conditions. The second term represented the natural ability of the people, whether they had heads three-storeys high, with mansard roofs, or were just ordinary, humans. These two terms, x and y, could not be altered. The third term, z, represented the acquired ability of the people, or education. This term could be varied infinitely, and if these three terms were multiplied upon each other, it was the increased value of the third term that increased the ultimate total. If x equaled 6, and y equaled 4, and these factors were constant, then, if z equaled 3, the total would be 72; if z equaled 5, the total would be 72; if z equaled 5, the total would be 120; if 10, the total would be 240.

Chicago, April 24.—Corn soared today to the highest price ever known for a future delivery, May, \$1.71 a bushel. The political crisis in Europe was largely responsible. Closing quotations were unsettled, ½c net lower to 1½c advance, with July \$1.63% to \$1.63%, and September \$1.59% to \$1.60. Oats finished ½c to one cent down, and provisions unchanged to 87c higher.

Aithe May corn at \$1.71 was a new top record price for any future contract, corn for immediate delivery has in times past reached far higher, namely, \$1.85, in January, 1918, and \$2.36 in August, 1917.

Today's advance promptly brought out increased country offerings and also heavy profit-taking sales. These factors togother with late reports that a break at Paris had been halted, forced a rush of selling after mid-day. Previous to that time, however, buyers in their eagerness, had carried everything before them, owing not only to the critical situation abroad, but also to persistent strength of hog values here and evidence of greatly quickened demand for rye and barley to substitute for wheat.


