

WELL HANGS OVER CHINESE INSURRECTION

The Scantiness of Authentic News With Reference to the Situation Still Continues and Anxiety Exists.

Consuls at Shanghai are Making Efforts to Re-establish Communication by Wire—British Admiralty Do Not Believe the Report of Admiral Seymour's Death.

London, June 22.—(3.30 a.m.)—The United States gunboat Monocacy was two miles up the Pei Ho River when the international fleet began the bombardment of the Taku forts.

Tien-Tsin Bombarded. The scantiness of authentic news with reference to the situation continues. Admiral Kemp's despatch to the Navy Department at Washington was prominently used by the London papers, and commented upon as indicating a change for the worse.

Do Not Believe the Report. The British Admiralty does not believe the report of the death of Admiral Seymour, commander of the international relief column, and semi-official assurances are given that there seems not to be the slightest evidence to back such a report.

Have Fears Still. A despatch to the Associated Press from Shanghai, dated yesterday, says: "The consuls met today to consider the situation, which, in the absence of news from Peking, is looked upon as particularly menacing. Grave fears still exist as to the safety of the Europeans in Peking."

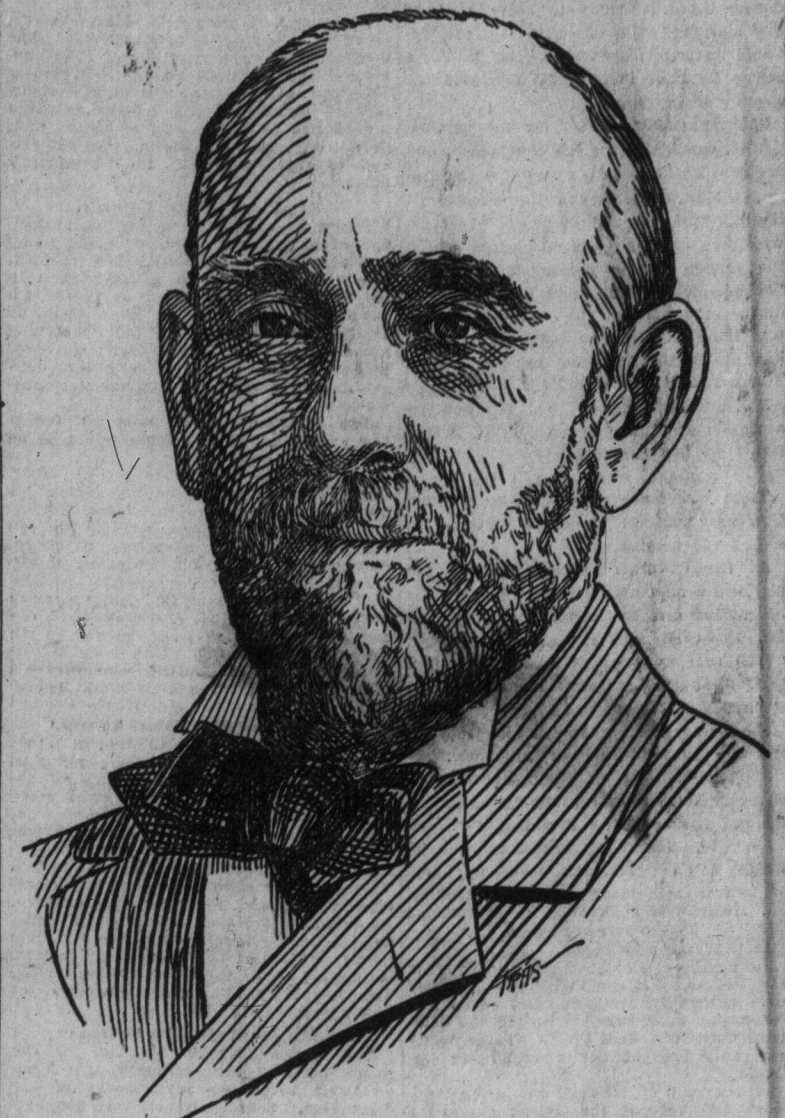

ANOTHER \$50,000 IS NEEDED TO FEED THE WHOLE ELEPHANT!

An Extra \$11,500 Added to the \$47,778 For the St. Lawrence Market Extra Cost—And This is the Way the Money Goes.

More Bylaws, Amounting to \$459,460, Will Be Put Before the Ratepayers—Money to Be Spent on Waterworks—Is Asphalt a Monopoly?—\$15,000 For a Cage For Prisoners Wanted.

The Board of Control held its longest continuous sitting of the year yesterday afternoon, starting at 1.15 and adjourning at 6, to meet again this morning at 11.

Toronto's White Elephant. The result will not increase the deficit of the city. A \$50,000 expenditure bylaw will be submitted to the people for the furnishing of offices on the county side of the new municipal buildings; and even after Mr. Lennox had got this much he could give no promise that the end of money bylaws for the completion of the plan is yet in sight.

Then \$11,500 was added to the \$47,778 for the St. Lawrence Market extra; and last but not least, an item of \$40,400 loaned up for new waterworks services.

Here is another proposition to the city debt of \$500,000. Not were extra appropriations on the current year's expenditure wanted. Altogether there was more than enough to make the ratepayers open their eyes.

The Blanche Monument. Mr. Thompson, president of the York Pioneers, and Mr. Doel, the Vice-President, along with Mr. Hennie and others from the Historical Society were a deputation to ask the Board of Control for an additional grant along with the \$1000 given a few years ago towards the proposed Governor Simcoe monument, in consideration of the committee in charge placing the monument in front of the City Hall.

Mr. Hennie unfolded his case in the following way. The Provincial Legislature had granted \$3000 towards the monument, on condition that it should be placed in front of the Parliament Buildings. The City Council had granted \$1000. Mr. Condy had informed the committee the other day that the money in the city treasury. The committee had collected in the last four or five years \$200, but they wanted between \$500 and \$600 together. If the Council would give more money the statue might be placed in front of the City Hall.

Not at That Price. The Mayor: I would not wish to get it at that price. Mr. Hennie: I would like to see the committee would give more money than they are willing to give. The clothing should bear the union label, but the President of the union had agreed, if the Board of Control would consent, to put on the label the work was done by non-union hands.

Question of Street Lights. The Mayor mentioned that he had consulted Mr. Park and Mr. Brown with regard to an examination of the lights upon which the contract had been put in for street lighting. Mr. Brown: We want a scientific man, thoroughly conversant with the subject of lighting, and not merely an electrician. The principal of the school of Practical Science is to my mind the man. The Mayor: He is out of town. Mr. Brown: He could name a capable member of his staff if he were commended with.
