





Members of Canadian Institute Addressed on the Ontario Corundum Belt by G. D. Mills.

HOW THE MINERAL IS WORKED.

many Ways From Inferior Abrasives.

was that on Saturday evening by Samuel D. Mills, mining engineer of this city, upon the corundum belt of Ontario. Dr. Coleman, president of the Institute, occupied the chair, and in introducing the lecturer congratulated those present on having an opportunity of hearing a discourse upof the existence and development of one of the province's richest resources forming an industry of the greatest importance within a remarkably short period. Mr. Mills explained that the belt in Ontario extended from Monmouth Township on the south side of the Irondale, Bancroft & Ottawa Railway in a northwesterly direction to the Townships of Carlow, Ragian and Monteagle in Hastings County.

The Corundum Belt.

The Corundum Belt.

This extensive region was known as the corundum belt, but that did 1.ot infer that corundum was to be found in all parts of it indiscriminately, but merely as a belt because corundum might be searched for there with some probability of finding it. His lecture was the result of a two week's trip thru the district, one of the main objects of the trip having been an examination of the Craigmont works, the property of the Canada Corundum Company, and the largest developed corundum property in Canada. He quoted freely from the geological survey reports and also from the reports of the Bureau of Mines, and at the same time called attention to the immense work being done by these dif-

at the Craigmont works under the management of Mr. Bartlett, and directorship of Benjamin A. C. Craig of this city. The process of mining was described as being simple quarrying. described as being simple quarrying, the rock being blasted out, broken into convenient sizes for handling and hauled direct to the mill. There it was first put thru a Gates crusher, thru sizing screens, after which it was passed thru a series of rollers, reducing it still finer; it was then jigged, by which means the light rock material was separated as waste, the heavier portion consisting of corundum and a small portion of magnetic iron being subsequently reground on high speed rollers and passed over a magnetic separator whereby the iron was extracted. The pure corundum as it. Mr. Mills explained that corundum U.S. Ambassador Bellamy Storer Mr. Mills explained that corundular cocurred in crystals varying in sizes from small bird shot up to four or five inches in diameter, enclosed in a matrix of felspar rock. The rock, although the hetter termed a corundum por known as syenite, might for the most part be better termed a corundum porphyry. It differed from emery, in that the latter was intimately mixed with iron, which destroyed to a certain extent its cutting properties, and therefore made it an inferior abrasive.

The lecture was illustrated with views of the scenery of the belt in question. Specimens were also shown of corundum in its crude state, and in manufactured products, such as abrasisve wheels, corundum cloth, etc.




