Ontario's field crops are big. We gaze in wonder at the hundred million wheat estimates of the west, but in grain crops alone Ontario's production is no small granary-full.

The latest Dominion crop estimate places our theat at 18,164,000 bushels, oats at 111,888,000 bushels, barley, mixed grains and other cereals at 46,064,000 bushels, or a total of nearly 177 million bushels.

Add to this the value of our five million tons of hay, our potatoes, our fruits, our dairy products, our live stock and other farm branches and Ontario's annual farm revenues run away up into the millions. 


