Culprit Who Got Three Revolvers Pleads Guilty-Railwayman Injured.

Toronto Junction, Dec. 16. - George Chambers of 13 Dean-street, Toronto, appeared before Police Magistrate Ellis this morning, to answer to the charge of stealing two gold watches and other articles of jewelry. valued at \$100, from Hugh Carson's house, 76 East Annette-stret, a few weeks ago. Thru his counsel, T. F. Slattery, the prisoner pleaded not guilty, and elected to be tried by jury. He was committed for trial at the present sessions. The charge of stealing revolvers from the Toronte Junction police station, preferred against William McIntosh, also came up. The evidence of Chief Royce, Deputy Chief Flintoff and Policeman Peters showed that the John Kelly on Keele-street, on Sept. 14 the former putting a mark on it for iden-tification. The fact that this process of improvement ceased in 1897 is explainable by the change of the government's policy of license law amendment to one of promised radical legislation of a much more comprehensive character.

The previous legislation as well as the recent promises led temperance workers to entertain the well-grounded expectations that have been so harshly dispelled. The manifesto said:

"This expectation was justified by the fact that under Liberal leadership in the past the Ontario legislature had enacted important measures reducing the number of liquor licenses and imposing upon the traffic many useful restrictions of much benefit to the country in the curtailment of the liquor cuit.

The appreciated fact that in the year gone by good legislation was enacted, is no explanation nor justification of the failure to carry out the definite undertaking that was given.

The premier's reply to the recommendations for electoral action is not very strong. The alliance manifesto dees not recommend the formation of a third political party. It simply urges all temperance men to endeavor to secure the nomination and election of representatives who will strive to obtain effective temperance legislation, and who will hold themselves free from party dictation in relation to such legislation. Temperance Liberals and temperance Conservatives will act wisely in making this effort as far as possible in the parties to which they belong. It is utterly incorrect to say that such representatives would be expected to submit to the dictation of the alliance. They are expected to use above, a partisanship and act according to their judgment and conscience on this moral issue.

This plan is not new. As already stated, it has been unanimously approved by large conventions of temperance workers. Even the premier has complained that temperance men will not put their principles above their partisanship, and has urged the sending to the legislature of men who will support temperance measures. He ought not to object to action by the alliance to change a condition that he deplores.

We believe that under the present

deplores.

We believe that under the present conditions in this country the liquor evil can be most effectively met by legislation abolishing the bar and treating system and drinking in clubs, and imposing upon the liquor traffic such other restrictions as shall most effectually curtail its operation and remedy its evils.

The manifesto does not ask any citizen to support or oppose either a Con-

The manifesto does not ask any citizen to support or oppose either a Conservative or Liberal candidate, but it does ask the Christian electors of Ontario to unite in support of candidates who will strive to obtain the legislation mentioned and so secure the embodiment in law of a principle that has been repeatedly endorsed by such majorities as have never been recorded in favor of any other principle or policy, or in favor of any political party.

This action is made more necessary than ever by the failure on the part of the government to rise to the responsibilities which its position imposed. That government neither took such action nor urged the Liberal convention to take such action as would meet the requirements of the situation, the demands of public opinion, and the piedges that have been voluntarily made.

Lower Rate of Interest.

Washington, D.C., Dec. 16.—The senate to-day passed the Philippine civil government bill. The final vote was preceded by the presentation of many amendments, and a general discussion of them as well as of the provisions of the bill. The most notable change made during the day was the lowering of the rate of interest on railroad bonds to be guaranteed by the Philippine government from 5 to 4 per cent.
