tion as a diplomat has always been widespread and there was some who would gain his point with an average council more cleverly. His relations with the press gallery at the hall have always been of the most cordial nature. Mr. Fleming's Career.

Mr. Fleming was born in this city Nov. 23, 1854. He entered into partnership with T. W. Elliott in the coal and wood business, which he subsequently abandoned for the more lucrative business of real estate. His municipal career commenced in 1886, when he was elected alderman for St. David's Ward, which he served for four years. In January, 1892, he was elected mayor, defeating E. H. Oaker, M.P., by 281, representing his success in the following year, when E. E. Sheppard, his opponent, was left 2200 votes behind. In 1894 and 1895 he was unsuccessful against Warring Kennedy, who by 48 votes only, but in 1896 was again elected by 1800 votes over Aid. John Shaw. He is the author of the motion in the council which reduced the number of liquor licenses in 1887 from 228 to 200. In 1894 he presided over the National Prohibition convention, held at Montreal, and the following year was elected President of the Dominion Alliance. Mr. Fleming was appointed assessment commissioner for the city on AUG. 5, 1897. On the death of Commissioner Coatsworth he also assumed the duties of commissioner of property.

TWO NEW ROADS

PLANS OF MACKENZIE-NAIAGARA

Will Have Transportation Line From West to Atlantic—Jockeying Around Toronto.

At the approaching session of parliament the Canadian Northern Railway Company will make application for charters to build two new lines of railway across Ontario. One line is to run from the mouth of the French River on the Georgian Bay, to Ottawa, and Montreal; the other will run from Toronto east, connecting with the French River line near Ottawa. It will connect with the Great Northern, which Mackenzie-Mann have taken over at Hawkesbury. These lines, connecting at or near Ottawa, will carry freight on one line to Montreal, where they will connect with the intercontinental, running to the Atlantic.

A fleet of steamers will be put on the upper lakes to convey the business originating in the west and brought to Fort Arthur on the Canadian Northern in this way the Canadian Northern will have direct connection between Winnipeg and Montreal. The company are in no hurry to reach the present city. Their energies for the present will be devoted to the construction of the James Bay line to the Canadian Northern and to change the name of the Northern and James Bay line.

Now that the James Bay Railway has been located in the Don valley, north of Bloor-street, everybody is guessing how the James Bay system is to be connected with the Toronto and Niagara power line and the Toronto and Niagara Railway, which have one and the same right of way, and which now have a terminal in the city on Davenport-road. There are also a number of people who think that a lot of property which has changed hands in the city recently, which lies immediately north of the city limits, is to be used as the right of way from Davenport along the north of the city to Deer Park, then one of the routes to the James Bay Railway terminal above referred to.

Another significant thing of recent date is that the suburban electric lines coming toward Toronto from the north under the control and management of the York Radial Road, and tickets on the suburban lines are now so marked, as well as the transfer checks.

To Connect Three Lines.

A scheme is said to be under consideration now, and almost completed, on the line above set out, namely, to connect the Toronto and Niagara Railway with the new power house on Davenport-road along the north city limits to Yonge-street. In this way the Metropolitan will be joined with the Toronto and Niagara line and thus have a direct connection with the city. The James Bay Railway can also be brought into the city in the same way, and by a new line built from the new terminal on the Don, via the ravines to the north of the city, to the city limits, which lies immediately north of the city limits, is to be used as the right of way from Davenport along the north of the city to Deer Park, then one of the routes to the James Bay Railway terminal above referred to.

OCEAN CUP YACHT RACE RULES.

German Emperor's Honor—Open to All Nations—Races at Sandy Hook.

Washington, Dec. 16.—The rules for the international yacht race, to be sailed off the coast of New York, under the auspices of the German Emperor, have been announced. The race is to be sailed on the 15th of May. The rules provide that the race shall be arranged by the Imperial Yacht Club at Kiel and shall be open to all cruising yachts of all nations belonging to any recognized yacht club, of 100 tons American custom measurement or 200 tons Thames measurement, and upwards. Before starting, the yachts must remove their national flags, and the race is to be sailed on May 15, from Sandy Hook to Hazard Lightships, the yachts to start under way at 2 p.m. It is required that at least three yachts shall start or there will be no race. The race is to be sailed according to the international rules of the road at sea. On board each yacht shall be the owner or his representative, who shall be a member of the sub-committee who. No members of the sub-committee shall be on board.


