Who Said BOVRIL? POWERFUL FAREWELL. SERMON BY DR. CRAPSEY. Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 2.—Dr. Algernon S. Crapsey preached his farewell sermon at St. Andrew's church today. His text was taken from Matthew xxi—5. He said in part: "Jesus was just such a man to the outward seeming as are the millions of workmen who, with dinner pails in hand go forth every morning to their duty. For thirty years he lived as child and lad and youth and man with others of his age and station, and there was nothing to distinguish him from his neighbors. At the age of thirty he entered upon a public career as a Rabbi or teacher in Israel. But still there was nothing to distinguish him from his neighbors. He signs, resigned supreme in his nature. He exerted dominion over every soul just and every base fear. He put to death every unholy desire and every unclean thought. He did what no other king has ever done. And then having himself, by experience, mastered the royal law and found a way of life, he gave the law to the people. He did not hesitate to repeal all ancient law and enact his own. Surely no king of earth has ever put forth such claims as this and had them seriously considered. But the law which Jesus gave has been the law by which countless millions have striven to order their lives, and though countless millions fail they do not cease to see in the keeping of that law the salvation of the world. To find Christ is to find salvation for one's self. To follow Jesus is to win salvation for others. Let those who will, find Christ, let us follow Jesus. Let us dispense any salvation that does not come to us by way of the cross. We will not enter into the Kingdom of Heaven except we may take by violence."

AWFUL SCENES IN WRECK ON RUTLAND ROAD WHEN THREE WOMEN LOST LIVES

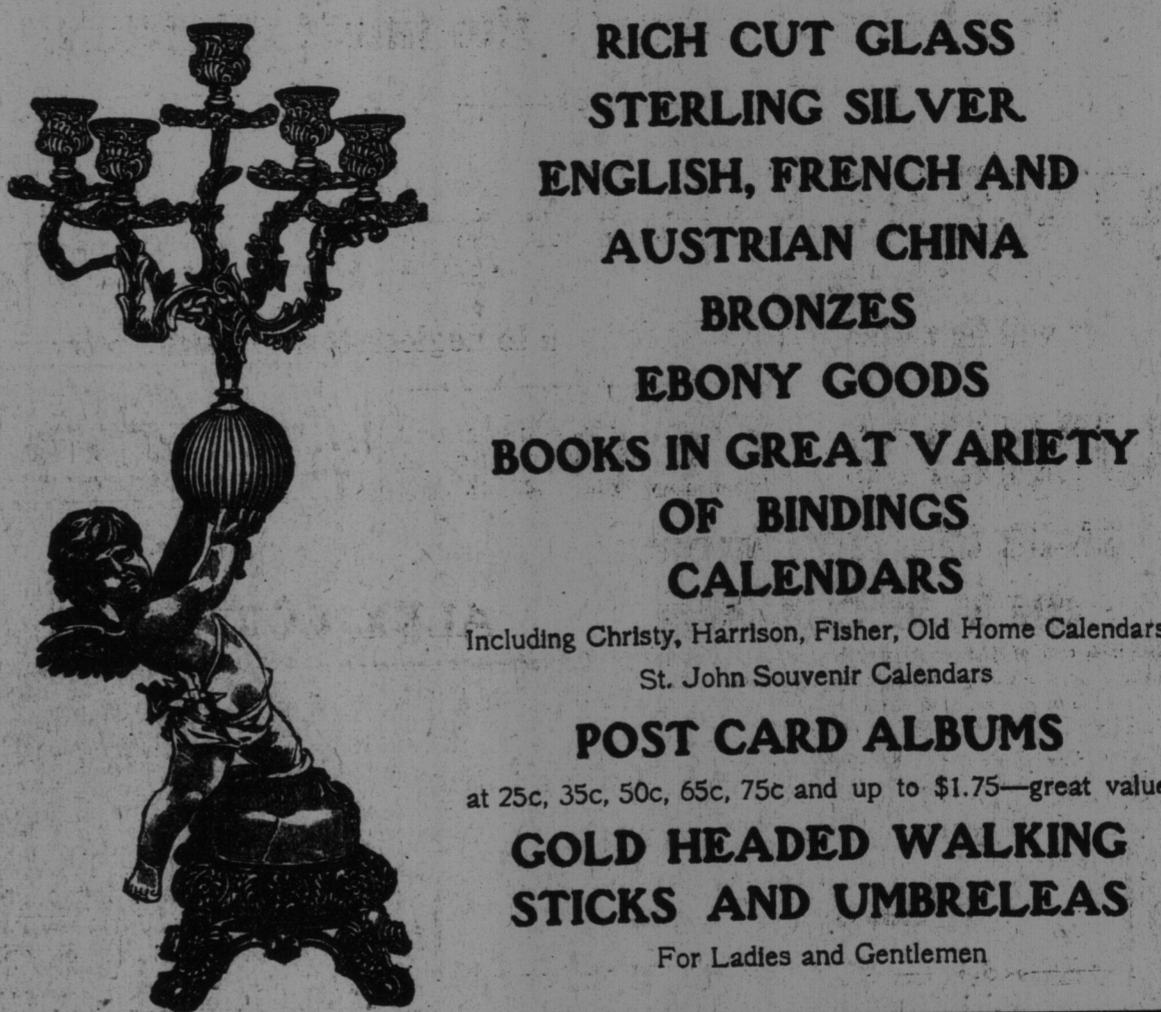

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Guy Chase Van Alstyne, a broker, faced a jury in the supreme court yesterday before Justice Leveatrit to defend the action of his wife, Isabelle W. Van Alstyne, for a divorce, and in doing so not only refuted her accusations as to his relations with Mrs. Katherine B. Newman, also known as Mrs. Allison, but told that differences had resulted in a separation between himself and his wife.

He was in the witness chair several hours. His examination was conducted by former Judge A. J. Dittenhofer. He is boarding at the house of Mrs. Newman, No. 1922 Dumas avenue, Flatbush. At the time he and his wife parted an agreement of separation was entered into, setting forth that because of the "unhappy differences" that had arisen between them they would live apart and he would contribute a regular sum toward her support.

Van Alstyne testified that he first met Mrs. Allison in Salt Lake City in June, 1901. He next saw her in this city in November of that year, while she was at the boarding house of Mrs. Rice, in West Thirty-third street. Until January, 1905, he said he had never taken Mrs. Allison out to dinner or to the theatre alone. When he went to board with Mrs. Allison, in Argyle road, Flatbush, he had his little boy with him, who was then a month. He and the child occupied a room on the third floor. Being questioned about the "parrot room" in the house, which has been referred to by a negro nurse as Mrs. Newman's room, Van Alstyne declared that he slept there only when he returned home late, so as not to disturb the baby boy.

"Did you ever have your pajamas in Mrs. Newman's room?" inquired Mr. Dittenhofer.

"I never did," he replied.

"Did you ever hear of them being found there?"

"Not until this trial," was the response.

He testified that he always had his clothes in his own room and had never taken breakfast in Mrs. Newman's room, neither had he ever been in her bed.

"Did you ever buy a piano for Mrs. Allison?" asked the lawyer.

"No, sir," he said.

"Did you ever promise to buy her a piano?" was asked.

"No, I did not," he said.

"When questioned as to Mrs. Rice, who testified in favor of Mrs. Van Alstyne, saying that she came to court because she believed it her duty to do so, Van Alstyne asserted that he gave her \$50 and a note for \$450 from Mrs. Avant to cover her claim for \$500 against Mrs. Avant and Mrs. Allison for breach of a contract to keep the room with her for two years. On Tuesday morning he said he received a message from Mrs. Rice asking if she could have the money for the note. He was then in consultation with a lawyer and replied to her that it would not be possible for him to let her have the money.

BOWLING AND GOLFING IN THE DOMINION

An Interesting and Entertaining Article on These two Scottish Games in Canada, by a Well Known Nova Scotia Writer.

(By J. MacDonald Oxley)

So far there is only one bowling green in Canada with a real ditch, to wit, that of the Westmount Club of Montreal, which was prepared under the direction of a wealthy Scot from Saugham, James Brown, a veteran bowler, capable of high rotation in Old Scotia, where he organized the Scottish Bowling Association, and was the secretary for many years, and who saw that everything was so far as possible, fashioned after the manner and model of the mother land.

The Canadian bowler, no less than the curler, likes to play the game in comfort, and a cozy clubhouse with dressing rooms, lockers, and so forth, stands beside every green. In many cases the lawns lie in immediate proximity to the curling rink, and from a part of the club's property, so that the same interior accommodation serves for the players of both games. That they should ever be called upon by both in the same day seems hardly credible, and yet it is a veritable history that on Christmas in the year 1889 there was a bowling match on the green in the afternoon, which assuredly illustrates the wonderful possibilities of the Canadian climate.

Not content with the opportunities for playing afforded by daylight, the enthusiastic Canadian has passed the electric light into his service, and a number of lawns are thus illuminated after dark, enabling the game to be continued an hour or two beyond the natural limit.

With all these advantages, nevertheless, it must be confessed that the bowling greens of Canada fall far short of those of the Old Country. They lack the perfect leanness and the velvet-like smoothness. The fierce winters and the fervent summers of the Dominion probably render turf of the same fine quality as is possible in Scotland a hopeless achievement. The teams of Canadian bowlers that ventured across the Atlantic last year by no means did so well as did the Scotch curlers, to whom reference has been made, for whereas the latter succeeded in winning almost 50 per cent. of the games they played, the former barely won ten per cent., and one of the main reasons of their poor showing was the perfection of the lawns, to which they had not time to become accustomed.

Within recent years a Dominion Bowling Association has been formed, which holds a tournament in Toronto every mid-summer, with the usual programme of competition. The two best greens in the city are chosen for the play and several hundred keen bowlers participate, the scores of games occupying a good part of the week.

Before passing on the subject, a further remark is made that occurred in the Ontario Bowling Association tournament of 1897 is worth noting. After the first end, and down to and including the seventh end, each of the rival teams won unbroken letches of four ends at a rate, and from that time on to the finish the ends were won alike 4-4.

At the conclusion of the tournament each end each alternate rink had won ten ends by twenty points, and on each side the twenty ends were made up of one 4 end, three 3 ends, one 2 end, and five 1 ends. The game was finally won in the twenty-first end by one shot.

Golf was the chief feature of the three games to find a firm foothold in Canada, but it

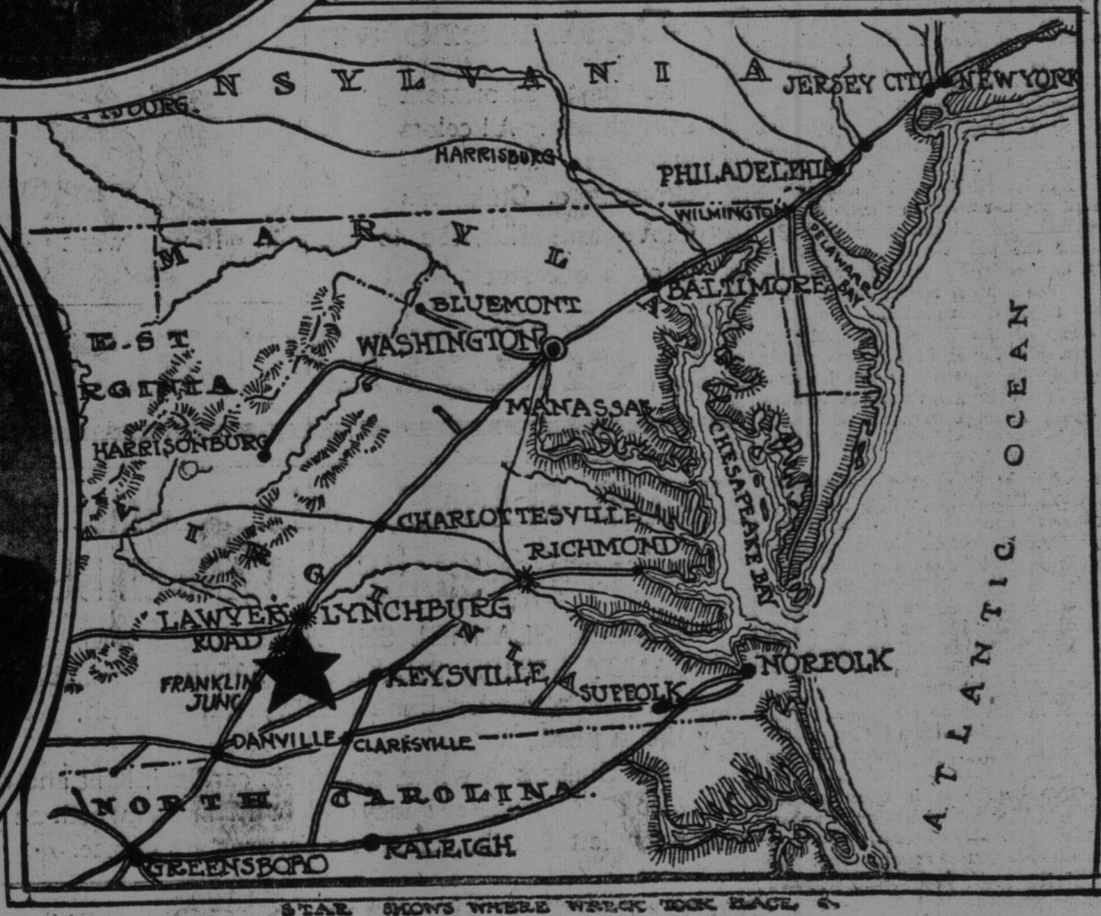

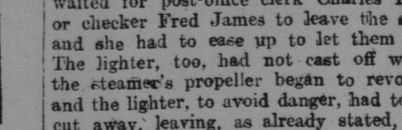
