

MINUTES OF CONFERENCE,

AKEN IN

NORFOLK STREET CHURCH, IN THE TOWN OF GUELPH, ONT.

Organization of the Conference, June 6th, 1877.

THE Fourth Session of the LONDON ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church of Canada began in the Norfolk Street Methodist Church, Guelph, at 9 o'clock a.m., on WEDNESDAY, June 6th, 1877.

The Rev. GEORGE R. SANDERSON, D.D., President of the Conference, in the Chair.

The Rev. WILLIAM S. GRIFFIN, Secretary of the Conference, read the 53rd chapter of Isaiah; the PRESIDENT gave out Hymn 747; and the Revs. ASAHEL HURLBURT and WILLIAM WILLOUGHBY led in prayer.

The coll was called, and One Hundred and Seventy-One answered to their names.

The Rev. JAMES GRAY was elected President of the Conference, and briefly addressed the brethren.

The Rev. JOHN B. CLARKSON, M.A., was elected Secretary, and briefly addressed the Conference.

On nomination of the SECRETARY, the Rev. JOHN WAKE-FIELD was appointed Assistant Secretary, and the Rev. GEORGE H. CORNISH, Journal Secretary. The SECRETARY also nominated the following as Assistants on Statistics, viz. :-- 6

Who have died?

CLAUDIUS BYRNE.

Rev. Claudius Byrne was born in the City of Dublin, Ireland, on the 12th of May, 1793; converted to God at the age of thirteen years, under the labours of a Wesleyan Methodist school teacher, and joined the Wesleyan Church at the age of sixteen. The Spirit of God gently strove with him and consoled him with the persuasion that he was a child of God; that all was right through faith in Christ.

The world, its charms and youthful vanities, became worthless in his estimation, and at no period of his subsequent history did he find pleasure in its frivolities.

Shortly after uniting with the Church he became a Sunday-school teacher, afterwards a licensed prayer-leader, and at twenty-two years of age his name was placed upon the local preachers' plan, and for several years he laboured in union with the "Strangers' Friend Society," established by Dr. Adam Clarke. In 1824 he was called to the full work of the Christian ministry, and was known thereafter as a vigorous, pithy, practical preacner of the Gospel, remarkable for his unwavering attachment to and defence of the doctrines and polity of our honoured Church, and eminent for his adaptation to the work of visiting the sick, and his great kindness and usefulness in that important department of ministerial toil, no storm or darkness, moral condition or Church relationship, preventing his prompt and loving attentions to the sons and daughters of affliction.

In 1848 he was transferred from the Irish to the Canadian branch of the Wesleyan Church. In this country he laboured effectively six years, and twenty-two as a supernumerary minister, in which relation he was very helpful to the brethren on various circuits of the Brantford District, and greatly beloved and honoured by the people.

The piety of Father Byrne was simple, intelligent, progressive, until he secured, by Divine grace, a meetness for an inheritance of the saints in light; for, like the Apostle Paul, he forgot the things that were behind, and, reaching forth unto those things which are before, he pressed towards the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus. He rested from his labours and sufferings on the fifth of October, 1876, and passed peacefully from his couch on earth to his crown in heaven.



REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee is more than ever convinced that the traffic in intoxicating liquors is the prolific source of nearly all the crime and a large portion of the poverty existing in our country.

We are gratified to find that, during the past year, the ministers and members of our Church have exerted a very strong influence in promoting the passage of the Dunkin Act in several municipalities, and in advocating the principles of total abstinence, and would encourage them to still continued and increased effort wherever the Dunkin Bill may be submitted for adoption.

It also rejoices us to recognise a growing sentiment in favour of prohibition, yet, we cannot overlook the fact that the people of this country are called upon to-day to meet a more thoroughly organized opposition than ever before, and we would especially at this juncture, urge upon all our ministers, office-bearers, Sabbath-school authorities, and members generally, fidelity to the position to which, as a Church, we are committed by the resolutions of the General Conference.

Our attention has been specially called to the good work which is being done by the several Temperance organizations of this province, and we desire to express our sympathy with their efforts in promoting the work of total abstinence and prohibition, and pray that they may be made still more useful and successful in the Temperance Cause.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE, 1877.

The Rev. W. W. Shepherd, Secretary of the Sabbath School Committee, presented the following Report, which was adopted :---

Your Committee have reviewed with much care the Sabbath-school work within the bounds of the Conference, and are pleased to find a marked improvement in many respects.

One thing which has given your Committee much pleasure is the number of conversions reported in connection with the Sabbath-schools, the total for the year being 1,971, while 5,274 are reported as meeting in class, which shows an increase in the classes of 477. The total number of schools in connection with the Conference is 503; scholars, 40,259.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the growing efficiency of the schools is largely due to increased attention on the part of the teachers to the study of the lessons, and they

note with pleasure that a larger number of the schools, than ever before, are holding regular weekly teachers' meetings for the study of the lessons, and would most heartily recommend every member of this Conference to establish such study meetings wherever practicable.

While your Committee rejoice in the increased circulation of the Sunday-school periodicals of our Church, and strongly recommend them to the sympathy and support of all our schools, they would, at the same time, recommend that, with increase of circulation, the publishers will, at the earliest possible date, reduce the price. Also, that every effort be made to maintain a style of execution and illustrations, quality of paper and general excellence, that shall enable them to compete on the most favourable terms with any similar publication in the world.

An application having been made to this Committee for help for a destitute school on the Muncey Mission, your Committee beg to remind all whom it may concern hereafter, that all such applications should be sent direct to the Secretary of the Sunday-school Board of the General Conference (Rev. A. Andrews), that Board having established a system of gratuitous helps to such schools, and having, during the year, assisted several schools throughout the various Conferences.

Your Committee, knowing that of the 40,000 children attending the schools of this Conference, less than 6,000 are studying the catechism, would strongly urge upon the members of the Conference the necessity of calling the attention of the schools to this important part of the Sabbath-school work.

We present the following tabular statement, and suggest the name of our Secretary as the corresponding member of the General Sabbath-school Board.

the Confer-Methodist amount of Committee for disbursement, this Conference deems it desirable that an annual report be furnished the Conference by the Society as to the number of missions, &c., and of the state of the work of God thereon, and also that the Treasurer present a financial report to be read at the Conference Missionary Meeting.

Members of Committee of Finance and Consultation,

Resolved,—That having noticed the large preponderance of members of the Committee of Finance and Consultation appointed by the Central Board belong to the Toronto Conference, even to a majority of the whole, this Conference would direct attention of the Central Board to that fact, and ask for a proportionate representation on that Committee, and that the members thereof be nominated by the representatives of each Conference.

Chairmen and Property Titles.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts be instructed to inquire at the next May District Meeting into the condition and security of the titles to church property on all our Circuits, and to take prompt action in correcting whatever errors or imperfections may be discovered.

The Bible and Public Schools.

Resolved,—Inasmuch as the Bible may be used by public authority in our public schools, and as it is desirable that it should be used in all our schools, we recommend our membership and adherents to use their influence to secure its use in all schools from which it is now excluded.

Removal of Ministers during the Year.

That in the event of a brother removing from any Circuit, District, or Conference to another Circuit, or District, or Conference during the year, he shall be required to obtain a certificate of removal from the Superintendent, Chairman, or President, according as the removal may be to the Conference or District; but in every case the examination of character, belief in our doctrines and the like, shall be held in connection with the name as it stands in the printed

Resolved,—That a deputation be appointed to carry our greetings to the Congregational Union now assembled in this town, and that such deputation be the Revs. G. R. Sanderson, D.D., Chas. Lavell, M.A., and Alex. Langford.

In return for this courtesy, the Revs. W. H. Allworth and H. D. Powis were cordially welcomed by the Conference as the deputation from the Congregational Union. After these esteemed brethren had delivered suitable addresses, the Conference unanimously passed the following resolution :—

Standing Resolutions.

Order of Connexional Collections.

Resolved,—That the Connexional Funds shall be taken up in the following order, viz.:—

- 1. CONTINGENT FUND-In the months of September and March.
- 2. SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND-In the month of October or November.
- 3. EDUCATIONAL FUND-In the month of February or April.
- 4. SABBATH SCHOOL FUND-Any time during the year.

Collections for Connexional Funds.

Resolved,—That it is the judgment of this Conference, that when collections for Connexional purposes are appointed to be taken in any of our churches, the whole of such collections throughout the day shall be appropriated to the respective Funds to which they are related, without any deduction for the Circuit, or any Trust or other Fund.

Treasurers and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock P.M., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference, it is—

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities. (2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairmen to the above resolution.

Sabbath School Reports.

Resolved,—That Superintendents of Circuits shall report in making up their schedules of all Sabbath Schools held by our people in connection with our work, whether they are governed in accordance with the published Constitution or not.

Ordination Sermon.

Resolved,—That it shall be the rule in this Conference in the future, that the retiring President shall preach the Ordination Sermon.

District Secretaries.

Resolved,—That each District Secretary be instructed to forward to the Superintendent of the Circuit where the Conference is to be held, the name of the member of the Stationing Committee, and all other ministers who purpose attending Conference, at as early a date as possible, and that only those whose names are forwarded shall be provided with billets.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make enquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions. 1877.]

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Preachers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Preachers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connexion and their ordination are thereby deferred.

Relating to the Book-Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher, is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward, at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those Funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the Brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Probationers.

Resolved,—That any Probationer, assisted by the Educational Fund, who, within the period of ten years after Ordination, may wish to withdraw from the Conference, shall be required to refund the amount of aid given him before receiving a Certificate of standing; provided always that this requirement shall not apply to those who retire from ill health.

Visiting the Public Schools, &c.

Resolved,—That the Conference earnestly recommends the Ministers of this body to avail themselves of the facilities afforded by the Council of Public Instruction, to visit the

Public Schools as frequently as possible at the times prescribed, for the purpose of communicating religious instruction.

Registration of Baptisms.

Resolved, —That the Conference re-affirms its resolution of 1843, on the Registration of Baptisms, viz.:—

1. That it shall no longer be required to keep Registry Books on the various Circuits, but that there shall be kept, at the Conference Establishment in Toronto, one General Registry of Births and Baptisms for the whole Church.

2. That the General Registrar shall be the Book Steward for the time being. The Registrar shall furnish each ordained Minister yearly with a small ruled blank-book, for convenient and uniform entry and return of Births and Baptisms. The Minister shall return the said book, with the entries, to the Registrar at the Conference after. The returns shall be copied into the General Registry Book, which book shall be kept in the custody of the Registrar.

The Board of Examination report the following :----

That in the preliminary course one hour be allowed for each paper on the subjects embraced in the course.

That we strongly disapprove of the practice of taking more subjects than those embodied within the year's course, except in the case of those who are taken into the work by the Chairman during the year, who may take the preliminary and first year's course.

The Meeting of the Board, for the examination of Probationers and Candidates, shall be held in the Methodist Church, Paris, at 9 a.m. of the last Wednesday in April, 1878. JOHN A. WILLIAMS, Secretary.

MODE OF EXAMINATION.

Candidates for our ministry and probationers shall be examined by means of printed papers prepared by the respective examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person before being received as a full Local Preacher shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as a Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

ed on trial Meeting, before the ne District The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents, and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meetings shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed in our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.

PUBLIC SERVICES IN CONNECTION WITH THE SESSIONS OF CONFERENCE.

1. The reception of the young men to be ordained was held on Friday evening, June the 8th.

Seven of the brethren to be ordained gave an account of their conversion to God and call to the ministry; when it was moved by the Rev. J. A. Williams, and *Resolved*, "That the young men whose names have been read be received into full connexion with the Conference and ordained." The Rev. E. H. Dewart spoke to the resolution. It was seconded by Rev. H. Johnston, B.D., and supported by the Rev. E. Ryerson, D.D.

It is with great satisfaction that we avail ourselves once more of the opportunity of conveying to you our words of customary greeting and counsel. We should exceedingly regret if at any time this our annual address of salutation and suggestion should take the place in your esteem of a merely formal and perfunctory service, one to which we have attended, on our part, as simply a matter of Conference routine, and which by you might, therefore, come to be regarded as wanting in all the definiteness and force of a loving and earnest Christian purpose and aim. Brethren, receive from us, we beseech you, the assurance once again that ye are in our hearts to die and live with you. It is with humble and thankful adoration to Him who holdeth the seven stars in his right hand and walketh in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks, that we would acknowledge the tokens of His presence vouchsafed to us as a people during the past year. In the enlightening, comforting, and sanctifying operations of His Spirit in the hearts of believers, and also in making the word preached effectual to the salvation of sinners, we have found a fulfilment of that gracious promise : " Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." With great joy we inform you of an addition within the territorial bounds of this Conference of more than two thousand souls to our Church membership. This, as you know, is far from representing the aggregate number of conversions with which we have been favoured during the year, the sum of actual additions to the Church being heavily discounted by the offset of deaths and removals. Thankful for the distinguishing mercy that has crowned our labours, we are at the same time deeply humbled at the thought of the yet vaster capabilities of effort and of the wider opportunities of growth which have not been overtaken by us. Entering on the responsibilities of another ecclesiastical year, we would gird ourselves anew to the conflict, hopeful and strong in the conviction which has possessed us, and never more commandingly than now, that

The world cannot withstand Its ancient Conqueror; The world must sink beneath the hand Which arms us for the war.

We regard our Church economy as admirably adapted by the blessing of God on its provisions, to conserve the results of previous toil, and to multiply successes in the future. May we urge you, dear brethren, to encourage the converts of the past year in the use of their newly gained opportunities? By your example and by your words of loving counsel and cheer endeavour to bring them into the closest possible association with the Church. Take them by the hand to a prompt and cheerful attendance on her ordinances, lead them in paths of Christian activity and enterprise.

shipwreck of faith is inevitably to make shipwreck of a "Let no man, then, beguile you of good conscience. your reward, intruding into these things which he hath not seen, vainly puffed up by his fleshly mind." Rather, brethren, let us as pastors and people stand fast together in one spirit, striving together for the faith of the Gospel. New Testament example and authority nowhere depreciate definitiveness in our apprehension and declaration of those things which from the first have been most surely believed among us. We are required to hold fast the form of sound "If," said the pre-eminently loving apostle, "there words. come any unto you and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house nor bid him God-speed." These are not words to justify the spurious and belauded spirit which, to superficial thinkers, condones its eccentricities and errors because it chooses to advertise itself as broad. Rather. brethren, consider Him who, for the truth's sake, endured the contradiction of sinners against Himself, who sealed His testimony with His blood, and who has bequeathed this testimony to us, an heritage for ourselves and for the ages that are to follow, and who expects of us that we be no more children, tossed to and fro and carried about with every wind of doctrine by the sleight of men and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive ; but speaking the truth in love may grow up into Him in all things, which is the Head, even Christ.

Disclaiming all wish, as we disavow all right, to influence your preferences in the sphere of civil politics, we cannot at the same time suppress our earnest conviction that this fair country of ours has reached a period in its development when the suffrages of all Christian people should be brought to bear on the abatement and suppression of the accursed traffic in intoxicating drinks. We do not venture any opinion as to what form of combination is required to meet the exigency that is upon us by reason of this almost unchecked evil. But so definite and so distressing is the conviction we have of the unmeasured and unspeakable disaster that is accruing to all our interests,—material, social and spiritual,—from the cause we name, marking the scroll of our

country's record with mourning, lamentation, and woe, that we cannot do other, from this watch-tower where God hath placed us on the walls of His Zion, than sound an alarm in your hearing, to rally, if we may, a spirit of patriotism and philanthropy, of loyalty to human nature and to God, that if it be so you shall rise up in this your might and swear by Him that liveth for ever and ever, that amongst us this foul leprous spot shall be found no more at all.

Lingering thus in spirit with you, beloved brethren, many suggestions arise which we have no space to enforce. From year to year you are urged to a liberal sustentation of our various Church schemes. Of these, let us specially commend to your intelligent sympathies our educational work. The claims of this movement are coming into a prominence they have never heretofore assumed. Their interests are vital, and a true and abiding denominational prosperity is conditioned on the regard in which they are held by us. \mathbf{It} was most cheering to have the testimonies of our young brethren of the ordination class to the warm atmosphere of piety which they had found in our theological halls. Their attendance at our colleges had been blessed to them not only in the acquisition of a more advanced intellectual and literary outfit for their work, but also in the quickening of their souls to a deeper and healthier spiritual life. Located within the bounds of our Conference are two institutions of whose efficiency we must make special mention. These are the Wesleyan Female College, in Hamilton, and the Dundas Wesleyan Institute. Here your sons and your daughters will find educational facilities combined with a healthful moral supervision such as ought to have a general and a generous patronage. We are glad to report an advance upon last year in the contributions to our Educational Fund.

Our denominational literature we also remit to your generous support. Particularly do we ask that our weekly organ, the *Christian Guardian*, edited with an ability that commands unstinted admiration and respect, shall find its way into all your homes. Our monthly *Magazine* is also an able periodical, and deserves a wide and growing circulation.

Any growth in its income for the past year has come from the increased contributions of the ministers. A large percentage had to be deducted at this Conference from the appropriations made to the claimants, and no class of men make a juster demand on our sympathies and help.

And what shall we say of our missionary work? Brethren, rally to its extension. Unpropitious as the times have been, the falling off in our grand aggregate of subscriptions for the past twelve months has been but slight. Should we be favoured in the good providence of God with a bountiful harvest, we look for this lack of service to be more than met through the coming year. The missionary enterprises of Methodism have been our glory and boast. There must be no abatement in the enthusiasm of their support.

Brethren, we must close. Not, however, until we have again besought you to guard jealously the interests of personal piety.
