

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—"As far as the West is concerned, the Hudson's Bay Railway is an accomplished fact," Lt. Col. R. H. Webb, mayor of Winnipeg, told the Canadian Club yester-

day.
"We are not worrying about it. We are not coming to ask you to support us in getting it finished. We have a government at Ottawa whose life-blood depends on carrying out the promises that have put them into power. The reason why the Conservatives are not in power is that they double-crossed themselves in Western Canada on this very question. Charles Dunning is the Minister of Railways. He is from Saskatchewan, and Saskatchewan is going to have the Hudson's Bay Railway finished. That is why he is there. He could not go back to Saskatchewan unless he implements the promises made."



But if expression of Saint John's appreciation be limited by circumstances beyond the city's control, the sentiment of her citizens will be no less deep and true on that account.

Prince George seems destined to be the sailor Prince of his generation. His Royal Father was intended to have held that unofficial title; indeed he did so until the death of his elder brother, the Duke of Clarence, brought him into the direct line of succession. The present Duke of York was intended to be our sailor prince, but unfortunately for him-and perhaps fortunately for Prince George-his health was declared not sufficiently robust to admit of his pursuing actively therefore was entered as a cadet. His naval career has been that of any other, because by the King's expressed wish he has not leen privileged in any way.

Now Prince George is on his way home from the China Station, and through the choice of this route rather than via Singapore, Colombo and Sucz, Saint John is privileged to tender its greetings to a lovable personality and, through him, to his sire, our gracious King. ### A REMARKABLE RECORD

A RECORD of accomplishment unequalled in the past history of the Saint John Board of Trade was refealed in the report of President L. W. Simms at the annual meeting in the Admiral Beatty last evening. It will be conceded universally that, as was pointed out by Mr. George E. Barbour in moving the adoption of the report, is due to the fact that Mr. Simms was its President. But Mr. Simms in turn paid a notable tribute to two other men whose work has been of inestimable value. These two are Mr. F. Maclure Sclanders, who may be described as the working arm of the Board, and Mr. A. P. Paterson, whose work in connection with the preparation of the Maritime case for the Duncan Commission and the Railway Commission is beyond all praise. It is, of course, in its broader aspects that we must view the work accomplished by the Board during the past year, for in that lies the seed of growth which will be of the highest value to Saint John as well as to the Maritimes

in the years to come. That was a remarkable retrospect to which President Simms directed attention, and which covers only sixteen months. It should perhaps he necessary to go back a little farther, for the real awakening to brighter prospects took place while the story of the Maritimes was being told to the rest of Canada. It was after that the Moncton Conference was held, followed by those at Charlottetown and Winnipeg, and the appointment of the Duncan Commission and the reference of the Maritime case in regard to transportation to the Railway Commission. But, beginning with the Moncton Conference and considering what has since transpired, it is not only a heartening but a really amazing record of accomplishment within a comparatively short period. To the Saint John Board of Trade belongs the highest credit that can possibly be given for the work it performed from the beginning of that period to the present time. But for this Board our case would not have been so well presented, and this we know because Sir Andrew Rae Duncan said that no presentation made before the Commission was more clear and comprehensive than that submitted by the Saint John Board of Trade. But it was not alone in the larger field of its

activities that the Board performed great services. Over twenty years ago the City of Halifax and the Town of Dartmouth united in a well-considered printed appeal to Parliament to relieve the ness of steel shipbuilding from the incubus of protective duties which placed the business at a serious disadvantage in competition with British shipbuilding. This was followed by the shippard owners of Quebec, Toronto, Collingwood, etc., offering to build steel vessels if a bounty was given equal to the duties imposed, viz., \$6.50 per ton. At that date the annual consumption of steam vessels in the coastal, protective, harbor, river and canal services equalled 50,000 tons. By standardizing the work, giving each a specialty, the builders had confidence they could create a steel shipbuilding industry; yards were to be established also in Halifax and Saint John. The matter was discussed in Parliament more than once. W. F. Maclean, M. Probably the price of coal—two or three hundred per cent. greater than in the State of Maine beside us—was the most potent cause of hard times here. St. James Street, Montreal, interests obtained control about twenty-five years ago of the Cape Breton coal fields held by the Dominion Coal Company. Previously the price of coal in Halifax was \$3.50 per ton. St. James Street worked both the coal fields and the Maritime consumer to the limit, raising the price from \$3.50 to \$12 per ton, while the low prices in Boston and Montreal remained undisturbed. This increased the cost of living to every family and was destructive to industries depending upon it for heat and power. An increase of even a dollar a ton on a million tons means a tax of a million dollars. As the local consumption was nearly two millions of tons, the enormous tribute paid by the people to St. James Street can be imagined. It was impossible for the coal company to work both the mines and the Maritime consumer with-

hoth the mines and the Maritime consumer with out official protection. As the Government persistently ignored all representations as to local increase in prices, suspicion has arisen that the company in its profiteering had a sleeping partner.

Farmers need capital as much as any other industrial class. Formerly every community possessed one or more moneyed men who made a business of loans to farmers on time generally on mortgage. Short-date banking loans— 60 or 90 days—do not give accommodation to a farmer building a barn, buying machinery, breaking up land, etc. To secure such capital as deposits at 3 per cent. was one purpose of the banks when they established branch offices in every moneyed locality, and many millions that would have been available to farmers have gone to swell the bank deposits at Montreal and Toronto.





If You Desire to Live in Peace and Avoid Wrinkles and Nerves, Never Establish a Reputation for Excellence in Any Particular Line," Says Dorothy Dix; "There's Great Comfort in Mediocrity."

NEXT to a bad reputation, there is nothing that is such a handicap to one's pleasures and happiness as a good one. Indeed, it may be questioned whether a good one isn't worse than a bad one, for while a reputation for being wicked may lead the foolish to regard you as interesting, the reputation for being good elects you to martyrdom.



IF YOU desire to live in peace and comfort, and avoid wrinkles and nerves, never establish a reputation for excellence in any particular line. If you do, you are its bond slave for life. You cannot run away from it, or leave it cannot run away from it, or leave it behind. Go where you will, it will follow you, and you cannot rid yourself

tion for anything has to pay for it, be-cause we have to live up to it.

THE beauty must take much more care of her appearance than the homely woman. She must dress with more lavishness and taste than the woman who has no reputation for good looks to maintain. People expect it of her and they are quick to notice the least fall-ing off in looks and the first sign of approaching age, whereas the plain woman can go through all the gradations from

youth to middle life without any one being the wiser IT IS one of the consolations for never having been a beauty that nobody ever tells you how you have faded.

IF YOU acquire a reputation for conspicuous excellence in any line, it establishes a precedent that you have to live up to, and in consequence you become a shining mark for criticism.

Take the woman, for instance, who is a notable housekeeper. Hasn't Take the woman, for instance, who is a notable housekeeper. Itsale she let herself in for a life sentence of hard labor? Other women may have a picked-up dinner; other housekeepers may draw a blind down hastily to hide where the maid neglected to sweep in the corner; other cooks' cakes may be sad now and then and their bread heavy, and we think nothing of it. We don't expect perfection of them.

BUT no such blessed privilege is hers with a reputation. If BUI no such blessed privilege is hers with a reputation. If everything in her home isn't spic-and-span and done to the minute, we say: "We don't see what people find in Mary Jones' housekeeping to be forever talking about. Of all the heavy, indigestible stuff we ever ate, that angel food of hers, etc., etc." And roor Mary Jones knows that we are going to say it, if there is a single peg in her housekeeping left to us to hammer. So she works herself to death, trying to live up to the blue-ribbon prize standard that she has inaugurated.

IT IS sad to think that we have to guard against our most amiable impulses, but it is a fact nevertheless. A familiar example of this is afforded by the attitude we are forced to take toward children for the sake of our self-preservation. There isn't any one with a heart as big as a nickel who doesn't love little children, but if you are rash enough o let this become known, your life will be made a torment to you.

EVERY time your neighbor gets busy making a new dress, or wants to go off and spend the afternoon playing bridge, she bundles her nursery in on you. "Of course, I wouldn't do this with anybody elee," she says, "but I know how fond you are of children." Fond! Bah! When you had planned a nice restful afternoon with a new novel. You feel like a female Herod. It is your fatal reputation for being fond of children coming home

EVERY one likes to entertain friends, but once get a reputation for hospitality, and you had as well hang out a sign for free entertainment for man and beast. People you never heard of write and tell you they are coming to see you. People you have meat at summer resorts and on railroad trains descend upon you. Relatives who forget you until they see an opportunity to dodge a hotel bill look you up when they come to

"YOU see," say these dead beats, "I am perfectly unceremon with you, because I know how hospitable you are." And there you are, because you haven't the nerve to stand up and repudiate the reputation that is going to land you in the poorhouse.

THEN there is the terrible thing of getting the reputation of being generous. Once give to a poor family, and you have established their claim upon you for life. Henceforth you are merely a dairy that they feel that they have a right to milk at pleasure.

YOU can't give what you can afford to give and then stop. Your pensioner not only feels that it is your duty to support her, but to send her boys to college and to give her girls a debut party. You are slated for life to toil for the lazy and idle and support the shiftless, because of your reputation as a philanthropist.

A FUNNY phase of this subject is that after you once acquire a reputation for doing a thing you never get any credit for virtue in doing it. People seem to think that you have a morbid mania for work and self-sacrifice and that you enjoy it. They actually give themselves credit for gratifying your peculiar taste.

AND the queer part of it is that once you have established your and the queer part of it is that once you have established your reputation for being unselfish and patient and kind and generous, nobody appreciates your self-sacrifice or your goodness. They think you are built that way and can't help it. And they give all of their plaudits and throw fits of gratitude before the people who only occasionally are good and kind or give anything away.

THE moral of all of which is that we have to live up to our blue china, and if we once get a good reputation we have to break our necks keeping up to the standard we have set.

THEREFORE, the only safe and comfortable plan is not to establish a precendent. There is great peace and happiness in mediocrity. DOROTHY DIX



Fruit Juices In Milk Make Baby Stronger

By DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN

AS modern studies of the value of various food substances in nutrition have continued, it has become apparent that milk, the main food ofinfants and children, varies in its vitamin content, according to the kind of food that the cow has received and the kind of life that the cow has lived.

Much depends on whether the cow has been in the sunlight or in the stable, and on whether it has been fed on fresh greens or stored hay. There may be more to the phrase "milk from contented cows" than appears on the surface. A healthful cow is a contented one, and a healthful cow yields

obtain at times in some communities, and frequently are so expensive as not to be easily available to the poor. A number of investigators have attempted to find substitutes for orange juice and have suggested the juices of cheaper fruits and vegetables, including particularly the tomato, cabbage, spinach and carrot.

According to the opinions of these investigators, scurvy in a guinea pig can be prevented by 25 drops of fresh orange juice daily, 30 to 60 drops of canned tomato juice, one-tenth of an ounce of raw cabbage or raw spinach daily. tented one, and a healthful cow yields

JUICES ADD NUTRITION

However, even under the best circumstances specialists in diseases of children have found it advisable to add orange juice, tomato juice, lemon juice, or other juices of fresh fruits and vegetables to milk in order to bring the vitmin content up to a point that will encourage growth and proper nutrition.
