ANOTHER HOME RULE REPORT

Glasgow Paper Says Concessions to Ulster Coming

LLOYD GEORGE IN GLASGOW

Chancellor Avoids the Suffragettes By Using Automobile—The Torch Applied to Several Buildings By The Women

(Canadian Press) Glasgow, Scotland, Feb. 4.—Concessions of the most conciliatory description are to be made to Ulster, in connection with the introduction of home rule in Ireland, in the course of a statement to be made by Premier Lloyd George at the opening of parliament, says today's Glasgow Herald. The concessions say the newspaper, are to cover practically everything short of the exclusion of Ulster from the provisions of the home rule measure.

The announcement made by the Herald is regarded in political circles as particularly significant since it coincides with the arrival of David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer in Glasgow, to speak on the land question.

With the apparent purpose of balking the suffragettes, Lloyd George, on arriving here last evening to deliver a land campaign speech today, had the train stopped at Rutherglen, six miles distant. There he entered an automobile and motored to the house of his host in this city.

Several hundred persons, including many women, waited at the central station to see him and were disappointed when they learned that the chancellor had left the train in the suburbs.

Very destructive fires, believed by the police authorities to have been the work of " arson squads" of militant suffragettes, caused considerable damage today in the neighborhood of the Perthshire village of Comrie, famous for its druidical and Roman ruins. The first outbreak was seen in a drawing room of Abernethy Castle. The servants were awakened by the thick smoke and hot flames and rapidly extinguished the fire, but not before some valuable pictures and ancient furniture had been damaged beyond repair.

Soon afterward another mansion named the "House of Ross" which was temporarily unoccupied, was found to be on fire. The flames had started in a strong hold before they were seen and the house, which had been erected only a few years ago, was consumed with all its contents.

Traces found in the vicinity of Abernethy Castle indicated that fires were the work of suffragettes. A third case of arson occurred in Perthshire later in the day, when Saint Fillan's, a fine mansion, was gutted. It was the property of a Mr. James Boyd, whose wife was formerly president and is now vice-president of the Anti-Suffrage League of Great Britain. A copy of paper was found in the grounds, inscribed: "A warm welcome to Lloyd George."

UNKNOWN MAN KILLED TODAY

Arm Torn Off and Face Fearfully Mutilated—Body Found Near Track at Hillendale

The body of an unknown young man was picked up this morning about 200 yards east of Hillendale on the C. P. R., 13 miles from St. John, by members of a section crew. It is presumed he fell from a train, possibly an early morning freight, and was killed in this way. His right arm was torn completely from his body while his head was fearfully mutilated. Part of his clothing was stripped from his body, and his hat was picked up some distance from where his body was found.

New York, Feb. 4.—Detectives are searching for men who robbed two women in the same locality near 5th avenue. Mrs. Margaret Burke had school teacher, of 110 East 89th street, was on her way home when a man stepped out of a doorway just as she was opposite the Union League Club in 5th avenue and seized her arm. Her bag was snatched so violently that the handle came off. Mrs. Burke caught the man by the coat and began struggling with him within a few steps of 5th avenue. He tried to choke her, but she screamed several times.

LIBERATE SOME ANIMALS

Expected to Have Rabbits and Squirrels Running About at Will—The Desirability of Street Railway Extension—An Interesting Report

The annual meeting of the Saint John Horticultural Association was held this afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms. The following reports were presented: Management Committee

The management committee submits this their annual report. Your committee deplore, in common with the members of the association and the community generally, the death during the past year of two prominent members of the association, Senator, Hon. John V. Ellis, long a vice-president of this association and always ready to give to his powerful assistance, and of Dr. George U. Hay, one who at all times took a deep interest in the affairs of the association and especially in its arboricultural branch. By his last will he bequeathed the handsome sum of \$2,000 to his wife's life interest to the association, the interest to go towards the perpetual upkeep and improvement of the park, which was in fact started and carried on by his own efforts.

The committee have to report with regret the death of Andrew S. Stephens, who for some ten years was the faithful head gardener to the association. During the past year he has received a gratuity of \$1,000, which he has given to the association to be used for the purchase of plants and other horticultural material. His falling health necessitated a long absence from his post, and his death was a great loss to the association. John Johnston, who furnished good recommendations, has been appointed his place and so far has given every satisfaction.

Two necessary structures have been erected in the gardens, of slightly appearance, the excellent designs of which were prepared by Garret W. Wilson, architect. (Continued on page 8, first column)

HUERTA SAYS HE IS NOT WORRYING

Declares Lifting of Embargo Makes No Difference

SOME VIEWS IN LONDON

(Canadian Press) Mexico City, Feb. 4.—President Wilson's determination to give both factions in Mexico liberty to obtain war material from the United States will not cause President Huerta to deliver his passports to the American charge d'affaires, nor will it affect his attitude toward the United States or towards Americans in Mexico. This assurance was given by General Huerta last night.

The Mexican president made practically no other comment on the action of President Wilson and he appeared to attach small importance to the matter. Change O'Shaughnessy called on President Huerta last night, but the question of lifting the embargo on arms was mentioned only briefly. They were together half an hour and President Huerta said that President Wilson's revocation of the proclamation of 1912 would not cause him to adopt retaliatory measures. He assured Mr. O'Shaughnessy that he has in the capital, a sufficient number of troops to suppress any anti-American demonstration that might be begun.

UNLIKELY TO GIVE APPROVAL TO PLAN FOR OVERSEAS HOME BORDEN GOVERNMENT REPORTED AGAINST EARL GREY'S SCHEME, AT LEAST NOW WITH HUGE ESTIMATES BEFORE THEM

(Special to Times) Ottawa, Feb. 4.—The government will probably turn down the proposal made by the company organized by Earl Grey for joint action by the overseas dominions in using the Aldwych site in London for a magnificent group of buildings to house the various offices of Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa in the imperial capital.

WANTS NAMES OF ALL PUT TO DEATH ON THE GALLOWS IN CANADA

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—A governmental return giving the names of all persons hanged in Canada since confederation and of those who were convicted and whose sentences were afterward commuted by the governor-general-in-council, is being asked for in the House of Commons by Mr. Wilson, of Laval. He is also asking for details as to reasons for extending executive clemency.

TWO NEW STEAMERS FOR THE SERVICE TO BERMUDDA

Montreal, Feb. 4.—It is understood that the Canada Steamship Lines will add two new steamers to their service to Bermuda. The cost will be approximately \$1,000,000. The ships will be constructed in England.

RUM LADEN CRUISER FOR TORY ORGANIZER

Minister Tacitly Admits Use of Government Craft For Election Work—Patronage Lists—Encouraging Shipbuilding

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—In the house today Mr. McDonald of Pictou, N. S., again brought up the matter of the use of the government cruiser "Alert" being used for Conservative party campaign purposes and carrying men and liquor to a by-election in Victoria, C. B.

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—Before the orders of the day were called, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux drew the attention of the speaker to the fact that obscene literature was being distributed in the member's boxes of the house of commons post office and said he felt sure that the matter would be at once looked into.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux asked what the government's policy was in regard to giving the advantage in building ships to Canadian firms.

A STRANGE STORY

Woman Saw Struggle and Heard Cries—Rosary in Pool of Blood Only Clue

A sensational story is told by Mrs. Gouley, wife of Captain Hugh Gouley, whose home was lying at Southport wharf on Monday night. She says that about 10:30 o'clock she saw three men on the wharf, one of whom was apparently the object of assault from the other two. She thinks he was attired in evening clothes. Mrs. Gouley says she heard him say "You're choking me," followed by her moanings as the other two dragged him along towards the front of the wharf and behind some buildings. A little later the husband returned but there were no signs of the men. When her daughter returned to the wharf about eleven o'clock, two persons dressed as girls rushed her but stopped when she drew a revolver. Mrs. Gouley remembered having seen the two about in the police evening.

The first notice the police had of the affair was yesterday morning when a sailor observed a pool of blood in which were lying a crucifix and rosary, near the end of the wharf. The two articles were given to Sgt. Baxter, who with Sgt. Caples investigated the matter, but were unable to learn anything. No person has complained to the police of having been assaulted, and the question is being asked whether the more serious crime of murder may have been committed.

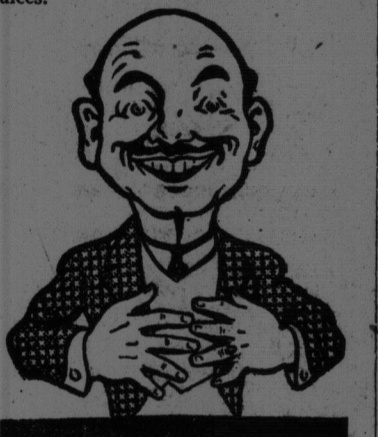

Several rural members from both western and eastern constituencies expressed the opinion that a reduction in the duties on agricultural implements was both desirable and expedient. The discussion was not encouraged by the ministers, however, and the proposal was strongly opposed by such representatives of the protected interests as W. F. Cockshutt, of Brantford, and others. Though the latter element predominated nothing definite was decided upon as to the policy which the government was likely to pursue.

SEVENTY YEARS ON THE STAGE

(Times Special Correspondence) Paris, Jan. 23.—At the age of eighty-one Mme. Daynes-Grassot, who was the favorite actress of Napoleon III, has just made a great hit in "La Belle Adventure." The writer has had an interview with the old actress and she told him many interesting reminiscences of her seventy years on the stage. Madame Daynes-Grassot, with a sweet, time-lined face of benevolence and kindness, in speaking of her experiences in the theatre under the patronage of Emperor Napoleon III, said: "My first serious engagement was at the theatre Camp-de-Chalons which Emperor Napoleon had instituted to procure innocent amusement for his soldiers. The emperor was keenly interested in the physical condition of his army. In providing a theatre for their diversion his principal reason was to turn them from the temptations of the cabarets. Of course this entertainment, as free Army soldier applying for a seat was given it gratis. Naturally, the theatre had to be subsidized by the government. Mme. Daynes-Grassot then added: "I played at this theatre three years. When my contract ended I was given a gala performance with a check for \$100. In those days this was a magnificent sum. Rarely was such an amount given to any actor."

PRESIDENT IS POISONER

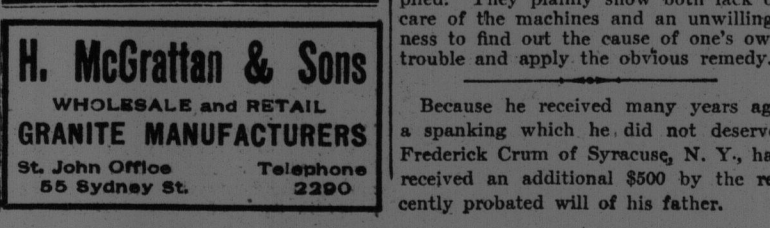
Reigns of Government in Peru Taken by Leader of Former Revolutions Lima, Peru, Feb. 4.—The president of Peru, Guillermo Billinghurst, was taken prisoner today by military revolutionaries, who attacked the presidential palace and the leadership of Colonel Bonavides. General Enrique Varela, premier and minister of war and marine, was killed in a sharp fight which ensued. A civilian was killed by a bullet. Auguste Durand, has led several revolutions in the republic. President Billinghurst is the son of an Englishman, but was born in Peru, about 1860. His mother was a Peruvian woman.

TRAVELS LONG DISTANCE JUST TO TIGHTEN A BELT

(American Machinist.) The time was when almost anybody in the shop, except the boys, could run any new machine tool brought in. The idea of sending for a demonstrator or calling upon the builder of the machine for help never entered anyone's mind. The sturdy native independence of everyone was opposed to this. No one was willing to admit that he could not run any machine that the other fellow could build. But times change, and it almost seems as if the men in the shop had changed. It is a common thing today to send for a representative of a machine-tool building firm, even on the most trivial pretext. Operators have been sent hundreds of miles to find nothing to do but tighten a driving belt or replace an insignificant helical spring, or point out to the superintendent that he was failing to get production because of poor crane service. Expensive machine tools have been found stuck because of a lack of oil in important bearings. In others an attempt has been made to feed heavy grease through a long small pipe intended to convey this spindle oil; the present-day operator believed that the brass oil cup was a compression grease cup. 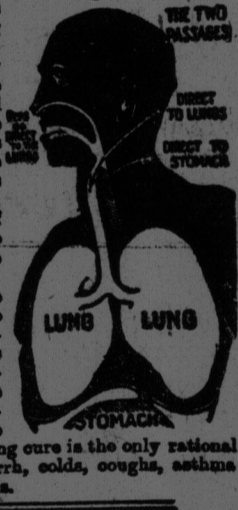

NO MORE FEEDING NUTS TO THE BEARS

(Continued from page 1)

A small tool shed which has proved of great convenience has been constructed between the barn and men's outhouse.

The shed for vehicles back of the barn was found to be too small; the roof sloping one way only, gave it a homely look. An addition has been built entirely by the park hands—a counterpart of the original set against it on the north side, doubling the capacity and generally improving its appearance—the addition being 19 x 36, the whole area is now 88 x 86 feet.

Picnic Tables.

Acting on the suggestion of Mrs. G. A. Knitting, picnic tables with suitable seats were constructed for use by picnic parties and were frequently used and much appreciated during the summer.

Roads.

The hill on the north of the south side of Lily Lake has been in part cut away, giving a view of the lake from the drive-way, the material being used for filling up the lower spots on the road. Much additional work has been done on the drive ways.

Toboggan Slide.

Acting under the authority given at the last annual meeting of the association, a double toboggan slide has been constructed. Trees were cut down, stumps, limbs and boulders removed and the ground levelled off by a plentiful supply of peat. A bridge was constructed across the Allouez playground towards the end of the slide—also a second one as well as a separate path for returning tobogganers—all of which is the work of the park hands.

The slides are pronounced to be excellently adapted for the purpose.

Animals.

Early in the last summer Frank E. Williams kindly donated to the park two pairs of red foxes and a wild cat. J. Whitfield Keirfield followed with a raccoon. Rev. Mr. Sampson gave a large tortoise, John T. Benson of Franklin, Paris, Boston, four gray squirrels; W. Benton Evans, of Minto, a young deer; Moses Callahan, an owl. Later Harry H. Tibbits, of Andover, contributed a pair of European, commonly called Hungarian partridges, and several young people brought in white rabbits, etc., and the last gift was from Daniel J. O'Neill—two pairs of native hares. The animals to the wild animals of the park as acquired from time to time created so much interest that the committee decided to make such further additions as their means would permit and as opportunities from time to time would present. Without any artificially heated buildings the selection was naturally confined to native animals accustomed to a northern climate.

Including the above gifts, the remainder having been secured by purchase, or exchange, the additions to the wild animals and birds in the park during the last year are as follows:

- Red foxes (vulpes fulvus).
- Raccoon (procyon lotor).
- Wild cat (felis catus).
- Turtle (chelonia virgata).
- Bush wolf (canis nubilus).
- Coon (canis latrans).
- Prairie dog (ynomys ludovicianus).
- European partridge (perdix cinerea).
- Great horned owl (bubo virginianus).
- Bald eagle (haliaetus leucocephalus).
- Porcupine (erethizon dorsatus).
- Gray squirrel (sciurus caprimulgus).
- Red squirrel (sciurus hudsonicus).
- Squirrel (sciurus hudsonicus).
- Therax (mus caninus).
- Spanish rabbit (lepus cuniculus).
- Hare (lepus americanus).
- Belgian hare.

Besides the above the animals and birds which the park had previously thereto consisted of bears, deer, golden pheasants, silver pheasants, peacocks, swans, wild geese, and ducks—the whole making a very respectable list, comprising over a hundred specimens of twenty-five different species. The addition of pheasants added to their number by hatching out a young pair.

To give an idea of the value of some of the association's live stock it may be mentioned that golden pheasants are quoted in price lists at \$20 a pair, and white swans, of which we have four, are listed at \$75 a pair.

The wisdom of adding to the association's zoo has been shown by the large increase in the number of visitors to the park—hundreds frequenting it compared with scores in previous years. It is estimated that about 5,000 people visited the park on several single Sunday afternoons in the last summer. At times the crowds surrounding the cages were so great that those who desired could not get within viewing distance. If the street railing extended its lines to within reasonable distance, it is probable that the rolling stock would be at times inadequate to convey the people to the park.

It is hoped that further additions to the animals may be had during the coming year by gift or otherwise.

While still somewhat in the experimental stage the animals look exceedingly well. Too much praise cannot be given to John Henry, the head keeper of the park, and his assistants for their kindness and intelligent attention to the care of the animals, and for the general excellence of their work.

Funds.

By the treasurer's report will be shown the receipts and expenditures of the year. Some curtailments in expenditures have been necessary in order to be in a position to carry on some extra work necessary in the coming year as hereinafter outlined.

Acknowledgements.

The thanks of the association are due to the above donors of animals—also to Messrs. G. & E. Blake for plumbing work; John Johnston & Son for painting some of the new signs; John Mager for material for the signs; Garnet W. Wilson for plans drawn; Solomon McConnell for conveying food and animals to the park; James McEade for an excellent large ball bearing squirrel wheel; to the city press for extended notices, and also to others who have rendered gratuitous services.

The drain from the public gardens, which was never more than a blind drain and is now stopped up, made it compulsory to turn off the water from the large fountain in the gardens during the whole of the summer. It is recommended that a new drain be laid connecting the fountain with the public sewer in Seely-street. It is hoped that

The work may be in part done by the jail prisoners, otherwise the cost will be more than the association can well afford.

A large supply of water coming from a spring partly percolated through a bog then through a poorly constructed wooden pipe and thence to the main drinking place near the barn. For hygienic reasons, as well as for greater convenience, proper water pipes should be laid down, this means fresh flowing water could be laid down in each of the cages for animals.

Frequently spruce and other trees as they die are cut down and sold as logs. Later on lumber had to be purchased at a great difference in cost. Trees being cut down for the mill to be cut into boards and dimension stuff, thus affording a great saving.

A proper shed for storing this lumber should be constructed so as to have at all times a supply well and ready for use.

There is a regulation prohibiting dogs, except when on leash, from being taken through the cage of the coyotes with the result that the limbs badly lacerated. It is recommended that a regulation be passed prohibiting the entry of dogs, under any circumstances, into the park.

In time it is hoped to be able from natural increases to liberate in the park some of the animals, such as rabbits, hares, and squirrels. The Park should be a haven for all harmless wild animals.

The very sight of dogs annoys and terrifies many of the wild animals. It is impossible to keep dogs at all times from barking and this sets up a confusion and turmoil, most injurious to the animals. On one occasion some boys, were accompanied by a dog under leash, except when on leash, through the cage of the coyotes with the result that the limbs badly lacerated. It is recommended that a regulation be passed prohibiting the entry of dogs, under any circumstances, into the park.

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NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY

At the monthly meeting of the Natural History Society last evening an interesting paper was read by Dr. George F. Matthew on the "Research Work of the Natural History Society in the Past Thirty Years." The president, W. F. Burditt, was in the chair.

Professor William F. Ganong, of Smith College, Northampton, Mass., was elected an honorary member. B. B. Jordan, John R. Hooper, and W. A. Simmonds were elected regular members. Mrs. J. R. Hooper, Mrs. W. A. Simmonds, Mrs. Bertram Smith, Miss Ada Emery and Miss Laura Emery were elected associated members. Miss Ada M. Finley a junior associate member.

Mrs. John A. McAvity donated a pair of beaded Malleole moccasins. A large number of books were received from various donors.

Dr. Matthew in his paper showed that during thirty years 2,226 pages had been contributed to the bulletin. The chief contributors were W. F. Ganong, Dr. Matthew, the late Dr. G. U. Hay, Professor Bailey, Professor Fowler of Queen's University, William McIntosh, the late John V. Ellis, and S. W. Kain.

Most of the articles were identified by Mr. Paterson. He said everything was in order when he left the premises on Saturday night.

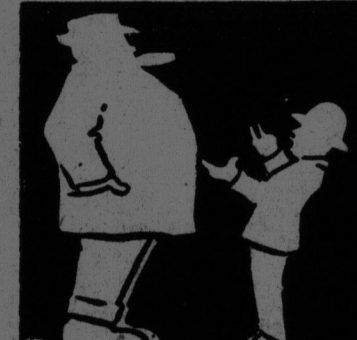
The prisoner was remanded until Saturday morning when other witnesses will be called. Asked how he felt this morning, he said that his feet were a little better though his head was still very painful.
