

When Your Child Goes to School; What it Should Eat

By CAROLINE COE

It is quite necessary that the child's body shall be perfectly comfortable and adequately nourished to allow its mind to adjust itself to this great change, and it is the mother's duty to see to this.

Breakfast for the Child in School Should Be Hearty

Many children are allowed to form the light-breakfast habit, because it consists of food that is easiest to prepare and which lacks variety. But if your child has been up an hour and been bathed and dressed carefully it will probably be hungry.

Serve oatmeal, rice, cracked wheat with fruit. Oatmeal can be bought in bulk, cooked ten minutes in a doule boiler and then put into a fireless cooker the night before it is served. It can be eaten plain one morning and warmed up iff the double boiler with stoned dates or raisins the next morning.



THE B. C. STRIKE TROUBLES

Vancouver, Aug. 18—With no further rioting and with more than 1,200 armed men comfortably distributed among the coal mining towns of the Vancouver Island strike zone, the residents had a chance for quiet nerves over Sunday. The chief excitement centred in the bringing in of twenty-five refugees from the hills, where they had been driven on last Wednesday by the rioters. Fourteen were women and children. The privations they had suffered were terrible. They had almost nothing to eat, and their hands, faces and clothing were cut in their travels in the woods. They were first given the freedom of a Nanaimo restaurant and were then looked over by a doctor to see they had no permanent in-

doctor to see they had no permanent injuries.

J. J. Taylor, vice-president of the mingers' union and a prominent official of the B. C. Federation of Labor, is in jail, along with John Naylor, president of the Cumberland union. THE END OF THE SLUMP?

Easier Financing in London and Optimism of British Business Men Turn the Tide of Capital-Some Strong Recommendations For Us

(Times' Special Correspondence) London, Aug. 5-With the prospect of the gold exports from the Rand resum the gold exports from the Rand resuming their normal flow, the passing of the fear of international complications arising out of the Balkan war and the assurance of good harvests on your side of the Atlantic, confidence is returning to the London money market.

Even when things were at their worst the leading Canadian financiers resident in London and the increasing number of principals in British banks and financial firms, who have seen, on the spot, Canada's capacities of recuperation and latent expansion, never lost heart. On the contrary their opinion has been given with a frankness not entirely appreciated in some quarters, that in the long run the recent tightening of the money market would be a healthy if drastic factor in establishing a sounder business basis to the interest of Canada itself.






