Disposed of \$20,000,000 Stock in Enterprise Since 1919—Some Costly Investments Followed by Distress-Action Taken Under "Blue Sky" Law.

### JEWISH ATHLETE CAN SEVER STEEL CHAINS WITH HIS TEETH

(Canadian Press Cable.)

London, March 22—That a Jewish athlete named Breitbart, thirty-four years of age, six feet, three inches in height, and weighing 210 pounds, can bite through steel, is vouched by a medical correspondent of the Lancet.

Breitbart's performances astounded a committee of physicians, engineers, smiths and presidents of athletic corporations who saw him sever with his teeth several iron and steel chains one-fifth of an inch thick, bent into a circle iron rods half an inch square, using his mouth as a fulcrum, bend over his head a rail four inches thick by two and a half inches.



Fredericton, N. B., March 21—The report of the Board of Liquor Commissioners of New Brunswick for the year ending on Oct. 31, 1922, tabled in the Legislature this afternoon by Hon. P. J. Veniot, Premier of the province, shows a net profit on transactions of the commission of \$340,489.12. This is reduced by \$35,000 written aff far the purchase of the Queen hetel property, until recently used as a warehouse by the commission, leaving a balance of \$305,489.12.


The total indebtedness incurred by the commission during the year is set down at \$999,437.87, the largest items therein being \$541,845.88 for customs charges and \$416,113.07 for purchase of liquors.

On the credit side the total is \$1,-389,926.99 and is made up of \$1,290,-383.22 in receipts from vendors and small refunds, \$1,400 rent from the Queen hotel property and \$48,193.77 inventory, accounts receivable, etc.





# SAYS COMISSION HAD AUTHORITY TO RAISE ESTIMATE


Secretary in Chippewa Enquiry Claims Act of 1919 Permitted Increase to \$65,-

(By Canadian Press.)

Toronto, March 22.—The Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission had the legal power to increase the estimates for the Chippawaa Canal Development from \$25,000,000 in 1919 to \$66,000,000 in 1922, Secretary W. W. Pope of the Hydro Electric Commission, told the Gregory Commission at the enquiry here yesterday into the expenditures in connection with the Chippawa Canal undertaking.

"If you will examine the act of 1919," Mr. Pope said to N. W. Rowell, K. C., counsel for the commission of enquiry, "you will find that the board had power to go on with this work. It also made the municipalities responsible and allowed changes on the request of the municipalities. Therefore it was not considered necessary to to the government for authority for every move in connection with it. I think that was the conclusion reaches.

SUFFRAGE CALLED GREAT
ASSISTANCE TO JAPANESE Missionary Tells of Advances Made in Nation Since Washington Confer-

Canton, Feb. 25.—(By Mail).—Dr. Sidney L. Gulick has reached Canton on his first visit to China, although he was for twenty-five years a missionary in Japan. He points out a number of significant indications of a new Japan, as he has seen it since the Washington conference. Universal suffrage, which is bound to come soon, will cause a sweeping transformation, he declares, for property qualifications will be removed, and workers will be in the great majority. There is a strong movement for the reduction of the army, as well as the navy.

As an instance of the rising tide of democracy, he says, the people, on the return of the Crown Prince from his visit to Europe in the summer of 1921, for the first time in history shouted "Banzai" in his presence. An age-old tradition had been shattered by the moving pictures taken of the Prince in England.

Syracuse, New York, March 22—
Judge John R. Hazel of Buffalo, in Federal Court here declared that prohibition agents have absolutely no right to enter a home without a warrant and asserted that "such methods must be discontinued at once."

Judge Hazel characterized methods of prohibition agents attached to the Syracuse office as "extraordinary procedure in flagrant violation of the Constitutional rights of citizens," and directed the preparation of papers in a motion to punish William Brennan, in charge of enforcement in the Syracuse district, for contempt of court.

Judge Hazel's action followed a hearing on three Utica cases. He ordered the immediate return to Gus Pucci of Utica of sixty-four gallons of liquor seized in a raid upon his home without a warrant by Federal officers. He also ordered the return at once of four trucks seized from Eli Cramer and John Falvo, both of Utica, previously ordered returned by formal order of the Court.

By actual count more visitors came into the islands to sojourne for an indefinite period during January, 1923, than in January, 1922, and the management of the great Moana hotel on Waikiki beach reports business for the month of February, 1923, the best in its history, and this despite two facts, that hotel rates have not been increased, and that this resort does not by any means receive all visitors to Hawaii, a large number taking a furnished apartment overlooking the sea, a blossom-banked cottage in the helghts, or quarters at one of the many cozy

ished apartment overlooking the sea, a blossom-banked cottage in the heights, or quarters at one of the many cozy residential hotels.

The tourist búreau claims that Hawaii's increased popularity is due to three things; first, a universal longing to go to Hawaii; second, the first time that ample steamer transportation both to and from the island has been available, and, third greatly increased display advertising.

For many winter seasons the constantly growing complaint about Hawaii from travellers has been that they could not get the kind of ocean transportation to the island they wished when they wanted it, and once in the territory they had to take a chance on getting out again. To meet this demand additional steamer services were placed in operation to and from Hawaii from the Pacific coast late in 1922, so that there are now direct sailings to Honolulu from the four cities of Vancouver, B. C., Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles, which the bureau terms in its display advertising "The Four Ports to Paradise," all the steamship lines are now enjoying a flourishing business with indications that it will extend through the even more delightful spring and súmmer season, all because the islands have something good to sell and are not keeping it secret.






