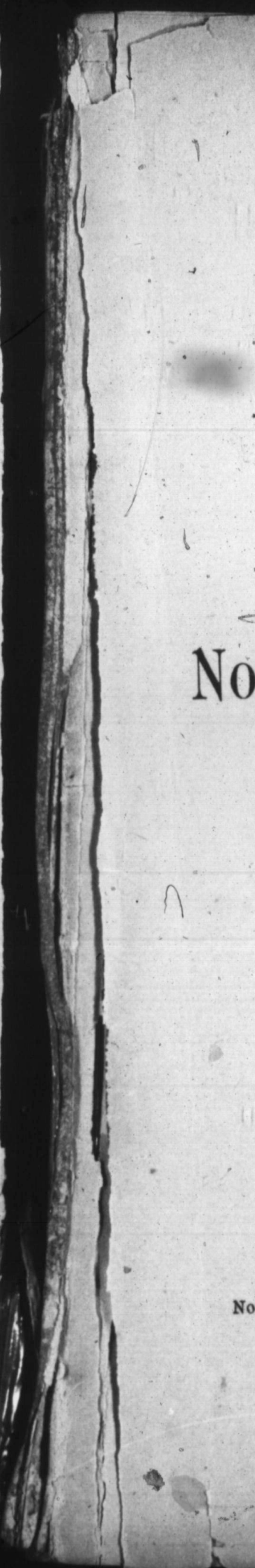
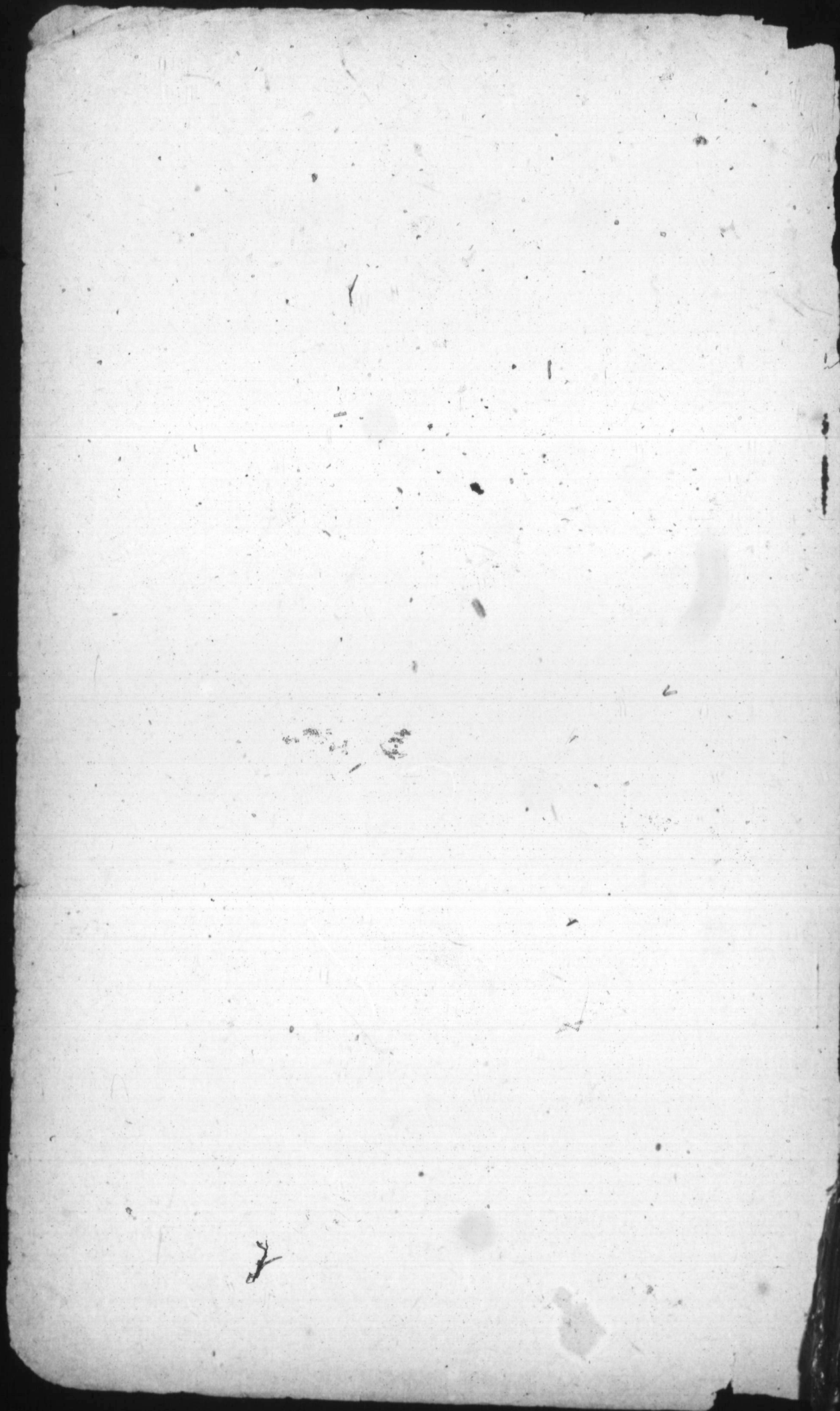

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VI. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

VIII. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number,

who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

IX. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

X. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday of May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XI. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIII. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XIV. At the general meeting, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XV. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday of every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential service to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XVIII. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scripture, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
NOVA SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called **THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES**; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz., to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.

V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

IV. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

SUGGESTIONS

FOR THE COMPLETE

ORGANIZATION AND WORKING

OF A

BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH which, in the past, has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns: one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz: *President, Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*) the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re-cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims and earnestly interested in the work*: for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belong the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the Agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during that month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and, previous to the collector's canvass, the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collector's call.

5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from the pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time, whereas the *loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting, and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.

6. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are *closed on the last working day* of December, it is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.

7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have its DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The Depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depositor should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*

8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality a *few persons* may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

EIGHTY-FIRST ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN

BRUNSWICK STREET CHURCH, THURSDAY, 10th JANUARY, 1895.

The eighty-first Annual Meeting of the Nova Scotia Bible Society was held in Brunswick Street Methodist Church, with the President, MR. J. C. MACKINTOSH, in the chair. The meeting was opened with prayer and the reading of scripture by Rev. MR. LATHERN.

The President, in his opening remarks, alluded to the loss the Society had recently sustained by the death of late HON. S. L. SHANNON, who had for so many years served the Society in several capacities, and who had faithfully presided over its affairs for so long a time. He congratulated the Society that at last they had found a way to obtain a satisfactory audience at an annual meeting, viz., by holding it in the middle of the Week of Prayer, when the hearts of the Christian people of Halifax were warmed to the work. Prayer and work should go together. The British and Foreign Bible Society is the greatest religious organization outside the Christian Church, or rather affiliated with the Church. It is a combination of religion and business, and as such it appeals to business men, by its orderly methods, its business arrangements, its wondrous enterprise, and its aggressive movements. Nothing is left to chance, everything is methodically arranged for.

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It is difficult to present new phases of work every year. The Society is like a great river flowing on its course, ever-deepening, ever widening, ever increasing. The British and Foreign Bible Society was only possible as a Christian British enterprise. Its colportage work, in many countries, could only be carried out with the knowledge that the British power and influence were behind it. Wherever the British flag flies, or wherever British influence is felt, there the colporteur and his books are safe. We hear of annexation, but the British and Foreign Bible Society annexes new languages every year. The Empire annexes countries, and gives them good laws and staple government, while the Society gives the peoples of these countries the good books and the knowledge of the Way of Life. The chairman also gave some statistics of the wonderful growth of the Society since its inception, also spoke of the finances, all of which appears in the abstract of the report. He then called upon the Secretary, the REV. F.-H. ALMON, who read the following report :

The Committee of Nova Scotia Bible Society, in presenting a brief sketch of their report for 1894, would first refer to the work of British and Foreign Bible Society related in their last Annual Report. That Society closed its ninetieth year with the Bible translated, more or less entirely into nearly 320 languages; almost 4,000,000 copies have, since March, 1893, been supplied to the churches or missionary societies, or circulated by the Society's own agencies. In almost all the countries of the Old World, and many of the New, colporteurs, over 600 in number, have been employed, and 400 Bible women have pursued their sisterly work in the zenanas of India and the east. Thus, a band of more than 1,000 Bible missionaries are at work spreading the knowledge of the Word of God.

The net income of the Society amounts to £141,228 14s. 8d., which is £3,683 13s. 9d. more than in 1893. The sales of Scriptures have yielded £91,740 13s. 11d., which is less than last year by £8,093. 3s. 11d. The total receipts for the General Fund have thus been £234,284 19s. 4d., including £1,316 0s. 9d. for the Special Deficit Fund. The expenditure has been £222,847 12s. 7d., which is £1,890 10s. 11d. greater

than the preceding year. The large deficits of preceding years have obliged the Committee to limit the expenditure where it could be done without serious injury to the work. But no clear call to enlarged operations has been neglected from the fear of funds failing. They have faith in God and His Church to believe, that where He opens a door for the entrance of His Word, the means to enter will be given. The excess of receipts over expenditure is owing to the legacies being much in advance of the average. This does not indicate a sound financial condition. The Committee would be greatly relieved if the ordinary contributors were sufficient to lessen their dependence on this precarious source of income. Still, remembering that the Society commences the new year, not only without a deficit, but with a fair balance of £11,437 6s. 9d. in hand, they record their sincere thanks to the donors, and their deep gratitude to God, who has inclined and enabled them to give, some out of their abundance, others out of their poverty.

The large deficit announced in the report for 1893, although considerably reduced, has not entirely been removed. The Society's working capital is still about £14,000 less than it was five years ago. The work of translation and revision has proceeded vigorously during the year, with an ever deepening and widening rate of progress. More has been attempted and more accomplished than in any previous year. In the east, the great versions of India and China are undergoing revision in the light of advancing knowledge, and in Africa and the Islés new languages are being pressed into the Society's service, and rapid progress is being made with versions already begun. In Korea a new version has been begun, and in Java a new version is being completed. Ceaseless efforts are being made by a great army of devoted scholars to render God's thoughts in the words of all men, and larger numbers of strange peoples are hearing in their own tongues the wonderful works of God. As we look at the achievements of the past and recent years, we say, so mightily grew the Word of God and prevailed.

The returns for Bible women, 402 in number, more or less, maintained by the society's grants, are encouraging. The number of native women to whom the Bible is read has grown to 527 a week more than before, and stands now at 22,014. Out of those who are being taught by the Bible women to read no less than 1,527 native women have attained between the year 1892-3 the power of being able to read the Scriptures for themselves; 15,931 Bibles, Testaments or portions of Scriptures have been circulated by the Bible women this year. The 402 Bible women were thus distributed: India, 291; Ceylon, 69; Syria and Palestine, 14; Egypt, 16; China, 8; Mauritius, 2; Teychelles, 4. The

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reports continue to bear ample evidence of the high spiritual value of their work. Besides its great and growing work in foreign fields of labor the Bible Society aids numerous benevolent institutions in England and offers soldiers and sailors starting for active service copies of the New Testament or portions, and has greatly aided Sunday Schools by enabling them to supply themselves at such little cost with Bibles and Testaments. Remembering how world-wide are its operations, and how many of the human family are still without the Word of God, we ought to support in Nova Scotia the Bible Society, because to it has been entrusted chiefly the great work of translating and publishing the Scriptures in the different languages of the earth, because it is thus the ally of all Protestant Churches in their foreign and home missionary efforts. It is not enough to send missionaries; if ever we are to have intelligent native churches we must give the people the Word of God in their own language, and teach them to read and study it for themselves. This our missionaries are able to do through the help of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Every month supplies of Scriptures are sent out for the great missionary fields of the east and west, and to Uganda alone, where the newly awakened and eager spirit of Bible study is one of the most remarkable facts of the century, some 68,000 copies have been despatched. Because this Society, through its own colporteurs, sends and distributes the Word of God in places where it is not possible for evangelical churches to send missionaries. In France, Spain, Italy, Austria, Prussia, Turkey and Egypt the colporteurs have sold many thousand copies of the Scriptures during the past year, and added their personal testimony to the love and power of the Saviour therein revealed. In India and China these colporteurs with their packs of Bibles have been the first messengers of Christ to many cities, towns and villages, and have prepared the way for permanent occupation by missionaries sent directly from the Churches.

What then are we doing in Nova Scotia to aid the Bible Society in its Christian and philanthropic work?

In 1893 we remitted as a free contribution, £250, and for purchase account, £200 19s. 5d.; in all, \$2,206.05. In 1894, £450 free contribution, and £223 17s. 3d. for purchase account. The Pictou Bible Society also sent the parent society in 1894 £49 12s. 5d. as a free contribution (and a legacy of the late Alexander Rose of £20). This Society is an independent Bible Society. We have thus been able to increase considerably our free contributions to the parent Society. Our last printed report for 1893 shows a very large increase in amounts collected in the city, which amounted to \$629.04, a small increase in amounts collected

in the other branches throughout the province, a large increase in sales at the Halifax Bible Depository, while in 1894 the sales at the Depository amounted to \$819.59, an increase over the sales of 1893, while free grants for poor persons and institutions amounted to \$22.15. Our treasurer's account for 1894 is not closed till Feb. 16th, 1895, so that we cannot yet report our income for 1894, but the Committee hope that our income will exhibit a steady and large increase, aided by a liberal collection this evening. We urge the churches in the city and branches in the country to send in promptly their contributions to the treasurer.

The travelling secretary, Mr. MacKelvie, is assiduous in his efforts to promote the efficiency of all the branches of the Nova Scotia Bible Society throughout the province. He writes: "I have now finished my visitation of the Nova Scotia branches, and in reviewing my rounds I think that I am justified in saying that the Bible Society is still deep in the hearts of our Christian people, and the utmost confidence is placed in the wisdom and integrity of its administration in every department of its world wide work. I am not yet in a position to know whether our income will exceed or come short of last year. Some branches show commendable growth and some decrease owing to failure of some industries. I have formed two new branches at River John and Canso, and hope soon to hear of two new branches at Shag Harbor and New Dublin."

The committee acknowledge with thanks the services of the numerous collectors, and hope that they will persevere and be aided by many others. While the widely extended operations of Christian benevolence have called into existence many new societies, since ninety years ago the Bible Society began its good work, this is no reason for ceasing to support with energy and zeal the cause of Bible circulation, but rather an argument for diffusing more generally that Word of God which by revealing his love gives an abiding motive for all Christian and benevolent efforts, and promotes their efficiency and permanence."

The Bible Society, with other religious societies and the whole community, have to mourn the recent death of Hon. S. L. Shannon, who for forty years was associated with our work, first as a member of the committee, then as secretary, and finally as president. With intelligence and zeal, most cordially and faithfully he discharged his duties as an officer of this Society, and continued in harness as long as health and strength permitted. Though constrained four years ago to retire from the presidency, he followed the work with unabated interest; we had the benefit of his warm Christian sympathies and his ardent prayers. As one by one God's workmen are removed from His church and join the blessed company of the spirits of the just and made

perfect, may we be stirred up to follow them who through faith and patience inherit the promises, and realizing our time is short, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that our labor is not in vain in the Lord.

The first resolution was moved by BISHOP COURTNEY, and seconded by REV. MR. WRIGHT, and was as follows :

That this meeting, devoutly thanking God for the extended circulation of His Word, resolves that the report, a part of which has been read, be received and printed for the information of contributors.

BISHOP COURTNEY, after moving the resolution, said the statistics furnished us this evening shew that Bibles or portions have been furnished in sufficient numbers to supply about one-seventh of the people on the earth. The British and Foreign Bible Society has been in existence for ninety years, and it has taken all that time, and the energies not only of this but also of all other societies, to accomplish this result. It is a question which this meeting might do well seriously to consider, "How long will it be before every individual upon earth shall have either a Bible or a portion thereof placed in his hands, that he may read therein the wonderful works of God?"

Probably we should all be far more earnest in our efforts to accomplish this end if, instead of having been familiar with the contents of the Bible from our earliest years, we had only recently heard its blessed messages. If to-night in our sorrows, for the first time we read, "I, even I, am He that comforteth you"; "As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you"; "Come unto Me all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest"; we might be more zealous in pushing on this holy enterprise, so that sorrowing hearts everywhere might know the same consolation.

If to-night in our sin, with conscience awakened and alarmed, we heard for the first time the direction, "Behold

the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world"; "Through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sin"; "The blood of Jesus Christ His son cleanseth us from all sin"; or heard Him say to the man with the palsy, and the woman who was a sinner, "Thy sins be forgiven thee,"—gratitude for the mercy bestowed upon us might supply a motive which would urge us to tell the good news from the far country to the thirsty souls fainting in so many lands for this cooling water, and whose tongues are failing them for thirst.

Possibly if we would try to picture to ourselves what our own condition would be if we were entirely ignorant of the contents of the Bible, and contrast it with what our condition is, we might be led so far to commiserate those who are in darkness and the shadow of death as to send to them the knowledge of Him who is "the Light to lighten the Gentiles and the Glory of His people Israel."

But I am desirous of saying a word or two this evening upon the Bible itself as affected by the criticism of the day, for I think it possible that some people are losing their reverence for it as the Word of God, and coming to look upon it as only one out of many religious books existing in the world, and, even if better than any of the others, no more certain and final than the best of them. If this is the attitude of mind of any one as to the Bible, it is out of the question that such a person should feel an enthusiastic desire to further its circulation or give much in the way of money or time to the work.

Now as to Biblical criticism, I would say to you, do not undertake to judge of the value or worthlessness of the results said to have been reached by the critics, unless you have first, by study of the principles of criticism, and the methods employed, furnished yourself with knowledge,

without which you are not competent to come to a conclusion, nor to express an opinion. Either by diligent and painstaking study get the capacity for judging the assertions which from time to time are made, or else leave criticism to the critics. Of some things you may rest assured,—the Bible must run the gauntlet of literary and historical criticism. Whatever blemishes, or inaccuracies, or mistakes, or inadequate statements may be in it, it is to our advantage to have them discovered, that ignorance may give place to knowledge. Whatever of inspiration or revelation there ever was in the Book, is there now, and will be there so long as the world shall endure. And further, I think we are justified in saying that should man at any future time come to the conclusion that there is no inspiration and no revelation in the Bible, then he will be obliged to come also to the melancholy conclusion that there never has been and is not anywhere any breath of God breathed into man, any unfolding to His Spirit of the principles of the unseen world. It is either inspiration and revelation in the Bible, or nowhere!

There is this also to be remembered, that our apprehension of what is truth in the realm of thought, of morals, and of religion has been so formed by the Bible that we judge of the value of the contents of all other systems than Judaism and Christianity by its standard. Hence, while we are willing to admit, as an early Christian father did, that philosophy was to the Greeks what the Law was to the Jews,—“a school-master to lead them to Christ,” and that God not only “left not Himself without witness in that He did good and gave men rain from heaven and fruitful seasons filling their hearts with food and gladness”; but also gave a revelation and inspiration to not a few, so that “thoughts beyond their thought to those high bards were

given"; yet still the Bible stands as the Sun in the spiritual firmament, and all other records of religious thoughts and systems are but like the moon and stars. All who believe the Bible to be the Word of God are willing to acknowledge the human element in it through which that Word was communicated, and by which it has been recorded. It is an old simile, but nevertheless an apt one, to liken the Bible to the mingled light and colours produced by the sun's shining through a stained glass window. In some great cathedral, hoary with the age of centuries, and hallowed by the prayers and praises of generations of worshippers, as you gaze around upon what the genius of man has constructed as a temple of the Most High, you see upon the floor not the light alone, white as it shines in the world without, but varied in beauteous colour by the stained glass window through which it passes. The parable is easy to read,—the Bible is the Cathedral, the human element is the stained window, the inspiration of God is the light, and we are the beholders of the combined beauty, and the entranced listeners to the still small voice, penetrating to the inmost recesses of our being and bowing our heads in worship.

Objection has been made by some to the free circulation of the Bible, because of the mistaken conclusions to which people may come by reading it without guidance. But we ought not to forget that we are living in what we are wont to call the dispensation of the Spirit, and that the New Testament is the interpretor and fulfilment of the types and shadows of the Old Testament. The records of the Bible Society will afford many an instance of the printed Word being "quick and powerful," coming home to heart and conscience, and "able to make wise unto salvation through faith, which is in Christ Jesus." And further, a very large proportion of the total issues from the Societ is taken by

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clergymen, Sunday-school teachers, missionaries, and cate-
 chists; so that the living voice does go with the written
 Word: and besides, the colporteurs who distribute the
 copies are generally wise-hearted Christian men, able and
 willing to guide the purchasers or recipients in their read-
 ing, that they may "understand the Scriptures"; and
 nearly all of them have incidents to narrate of the assist-
 ance they have been everywhere to "seekers after truth. I
 hope that these considerations may serve to make us more
 generous supporters of the British and Foreign Bible
 Society, and more zealous in furthering its work.

The REV. MR. WRIGHT, the seconder of the resolution,
 said it is certainly a matter for congratulation that, gathered
 here to-night, representing as we do so many variant views
 in regard to matters theological and ecclesiastical, we are
 bound together by a common reverence for the one Book
 which speaks to us with a voice whose authority we dare
 not question, which manifests a life so human that we
 exclaim, "My Brother": so divine that we cry out, "My
 Lord and my God"; and which propose for us a trans-
 formation of character by the agency of the ever-blessed
 Spirit proceeding from the Father and the Son such as shall
 fit us for eternal and ever closer fellowship with God. We
 can sing to-night with heart and voice—

"Blest be *this* tie which binds
 Our hearts in Christian love."

This Society, according to the published report, was
 founded in 1804. For ninety years it has been in existence,
 and has thus been almost synchronistic with the century.
 What changes the past ninety years have witnessed! How
 many things have become old and worn out in these ninety
 years! How many things we have left behind us as
 inadequate to meet the demands of the time as new know-

ledge has come, and our horizons have widened out. In how many directions the knowledge of yesterday seems old-fashioned to-day. Take it, for instance, in the lighting of our homes. The organization of this Society would take us back to the days of tallow candles. We would think, sir, that it would be a hardship indeed if we were compelled to dispense with the light in our streets and to content ourselves with candles in the home. And then came the days of burning fluid; and this was succeeded by the kerosene oil; and this by the gas; and now as the result of the march of science we have the brilliancy of the searching electric light. Times have changed. Our demands change with the times. We rejoice in the evolution of a better and more complex civilization as the centuries move on. But how about the light of truth which this Society was instituted to send abroad? We are standing at the threshold of a new century, and perhaps of a new era,—have we got beyond the old light? Are the demands which this ninetieth anniversary make upon Christian beneficence any weaker by reason of the fact that it is but an old-fashioned Bible we have to give the people, and that no new Gospel is forthcoming to take its place in the new century? Plato, in his "Republic" I think, tells us of a torch-light race on horse-back where the contestants, lighting their torches at the altar fire, leaped upon their horses and held aloft their brand. He whose torch kept lighted the longest was declared the victor. The Bible during these last years has come into comparison and contrast with other religious books as never before. It has gone with them to Parliaments of Religions to be catechized; it has been hung with them on the walls of the world's galleries to be scrutinized; it has been laid upon the world's dissecting table to be analyzed; it is the very storm centre of the religious thought of to-day; and yet the fierceness of the

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hurricane but fans it into a brighter blaze, the dissecting knife touches no vital part, the scrutiny is but showing that it is still the Word of God living and abiding forever.

This is encouraging. We need no new book. The times ahead of the Bible? No, no, but the time is coming when the age will get abreast of the Bible, and then the trumpet will blow and the angels will shout "Hallelujah, the kingdoms of this world are become the kingdom of our God and His Christ." We need make no defence for the Bible. More and more, as the years go by, it is demonstrating itself to be what Goethe called it, not only a national book, but a book for the nations. To-day it is under the severest fire, and I, for one, rejoice in the fact, because I believe in the book, and I have no doubt that the result will be a stronger, because a more intelligent faith on the part of the Church.

Two things the Bible Society contemplates in its work which should commend it to our Christian sympathy. The first is the actual conversion of the individual by the circulation of the Bible and the effort of the colporteur. By His book alone God has wrought wonders of transformation. But probably the strongest motive the Bible Society can urge why it should receive the generous support of the Christian public is the fact that its work lies at the very basis of Christian missions. Pentecost was a prophecy as well as a fulfilment. After the disciples had waited for the promise of the father, and the Holy Ghost had come upon them, and their tongues had been loosened under the influence of that Divine fire, the result was that every one who heard them speak heard in his own tongue wherein he was born. Whether the miracle was in the ears of the hearer or the tongue of the speaker, it meant the Gospel in his own vernacular.

Now what the disciples *began* to do on the day on of Pentecost, the Bible Society is continuing to do in our day,—speaking with tongues, or, rather, enabling the Church to speak with tongues. The sublimest missionary conception of our times is this,—the evangelization of the world in the present generation. Not the conversion of the world, but its evangelization—the Gospel preached to every creature, and possibly a Bible placed within every one's reach. Prophecy tells us that in the last days young men shall dream dreams. As a dream of the enthusiast it seemed a few years ago, but the Church is coming to understand that the thing is a possibility, and many Christian hearts are beating faster as the hope grows stronger that in their own life-time it may be an accomplished fact. And if this be so, if the command of our Divine Lord, “Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature, *teaching them* to observe whatsoever I have commanded you,” is to be carried out, then one of the chief agencies in the accomplishment of this is the British and Foreign Bible Society, in whose interests we are met to-night. If ever we are to have an intelligent native church, we must have a church in which the Bible is printed in their own tongue.

The various churches of this city gave last year \$539.69, and the committee ask this year for \$1000.00. I know that Halifax does much in the way of Christian beneficence. Comparing ourselves with others we have no cause for shame, but comparing our contributions with the needs of humanity, and our ability to do, we may well ask ourselves whether or not we have measured up to the full extent of our obligations. It seems to me that the more we study the matter in the light of the blessed Book, the more we shall be inclined to endorse the words of Matthew Arnold when he says, “For my part the deeper I go into my own

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consciousness, and the more simply I abandon myself to it, the more it seems to tell me that I have no rights at all, only duties." Only duties! It is a blessed thing to be brought under the thralldom of duty, where right becomes imperative for us and the doing of God's will a felt necessity. I trust that we to-night will feel it our duty to show the fullest practical sympathy with the Bible Society in its inspired and inspiring work of sending abroad the living oracles of God.

The second resolution was moved by REV. MR. MCPHERSON, and seconded by REV. DR. SAUNDERS, and was as follows:

That this meeting, humbly thanking God for the extended circulation of His Word, and for the blessings accompanying it, ask Him for the means and the men to enable the Parent Society to make the most of the present opportunity for the furnishing of the Holy Scriptures to larger numbers, and in more languages to meet the world's great need.

MR. MACPHERSON, in moving the resolution, said that a strong case can be made out in behalf of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and that if he could not convince all present of their duty to aid the Society by their sympathy, their contributions and their prayers, it was not because he had not good reasons to present. He would hold up both hands for the Society. The Society claims the practical sympathy of all lovers of the Bible for the following reasons:

1. The worthiness of its object,—to give the Bible to all the people of the world. The importance, the grandeur of its object may be seen when we consider what the Bible is, and what it is instrumental in doing for the world. The Bible is God's message to men. It is a message from our loving Father in heaven telling us of His love to sinful

men, showing us the state of sin and guilt in which all by nature are, and the universal need of redemption, revealing the way of salvation through the mediation of the Lord, Jesus Christ, warning us against impenitence and unbelief, and promising the rich blessings of forgiveness and life everlasting to all who will turn from their sins and accept of the overtures of mercy. It is truly "a light shining in a dark place," like continuous lightning flashes to a man walking along the edge of a frightful precipice on a dark night. It is adapted to the people of all nations—to the most illiterate and degraded as well as to the learned and the respectable. It is a great lever to elevate humanity and effect a glorious emancipation. It smites sin in every form. It touches man's whole life—intellectual, moral, spiritual, social, domestic, political. It is like the sun "whose going forth is from the end of the heaven, and its circuit unto the ends of it; and there is nothing hid from the heat thereof." Infidels who are opposing it are only kicking away the ladder by which they have reached their place of knowledge and advantage.

2. The unflagging zeal with which the Society and its agents carry on the work of furthering its grand object. As the abstract of the report of the Society says, its policy "may be called imperial—it cannot pause, it cannot retreat, it cannot delimit its frontiers; the greatness of its plan and of its duty will not allow it to rest. It already possesses the great national tongues, but there are hundreds of others. It must annex new languages as the great powers annex countries." It does not stop to answer infidel objections, or to reply to the so-called higher critics who are cutting and carving the Word of God to pieces. It just goes on with its work, as heedless of the assaults of enemies as a steam engine with a train of cars moves on

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heedless of all the barking curs that run after it. With unremitting and self-denying devotion its agents go on with their work. The colporteurs are true men of God who love their work and toil hard, and for the most part with great efficiency.

3. The great extent of the work that is being done by the Society. There is a circulation of nearly 4,000,000 copies of the Word per annum. The daily issues are about 12,000, which would make a pile about 1,000 feet high. At the beginning of the century the Bible was translated into 30 languages; now it is published in 320 languages. Six hundred colporteurs are employed, and are at work in nearly every country under the sun. There are also 400 Bible women in the employ of the Society. In three years no less than thirty-seven tons of copies of the Scriptures were sent to Eastern Russia alone. There is no organization that is doing so great a work at so small a cost.

4. The great blessings which it has brought to untold numbers of benighted sinners in every land. No wonder that heathen converts are in many cases deeply interested in the Society, and give very liberally for the furtherance of its good work.

5. The invaluable aid which every branch of the Church attempting to fulfil the Master's commission to preach the Gospel to every creature receives from the Society. It is to the Bible Society that the great missionary churches and associations look for the printed versions of the Word of God which they need. Without its aid they would be greatly hampered and hindered in their work.

6. Through the reports which it presents to us of its glorious work, the Society is bringing to us every year fresh evidence of the truth and power of the Bible, and is

thus reviving and confirming our faith in it as truly the Word of the living God.

7. The Bible Society is a grand meeting centre for all branches of the Christian Church,—a means of lowering the dividing walls by which Christians are separated from one another, so that they may come together and shake hands, and a means whereby we may hasten the glorious consummation so dear to the heart of the Saviour, when Christians shall be all one in Him, and the world shall believe that He is the sent of the Father.

Good reasons then have we to reserve in our hearts a warm place for the British and Foreign Bible Society. Let us esteem it very highly in love for its work's sake. Let us prove the sincerity of our love by responding in a practical manner to its claims. And having put our hands to the plough, let us not look back.

REV. DR. SAUNDERS said the result of this meeting should be an incentive to a constant and liberal giving to the funds of the Society. The ancient civilizations have all disappeared. The lack of the strength of the civilization that rests on the Bible was their great weakness. They boasted of having men of commanding talents and great genius. They laid plans for perpetuating their greatness and their power. In language, art, law, and war they gave the world models which have never become effete. But all these nationalities have vanished from the map of the world. Had they possessed the Bible and made it the foundation of their institutions, and its laws their rules of life, holding together their organizations and binding themselves to their Maker and Judge, they would have remained permanent. The civilizations under the ethnic religions of to-day will have a similar fate, if they do not receive and accept divine revelation. It is our duty to give it to them.

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There are two voices calling us to this duty. In the first place, our God commands it, and in the second place, the Macedonian cry from their sad condition, both for time and eternity, is a thrilling appeal to us to send them our sacred book. One reason why we do not feel the pressure of this double call to send the good news of salvation to the benighted peoples of the earth, is that we do not realize what it is to be without the Word of God. It is associated with our earliest recollections. The humiliation and crucifixion of Christ was taught us so soon as our thoughts were able to comprehend it. The Bible has always been in our homes, our churches; and our literature is highly seasoned with it. The influence, coming to us from generations of ancestors who enjoyed the possession of the Bible, have fallen upon our lives from their earliest periods.

It is impossible for us to even fancy the state of the heathen world because of the ignorance of God's Word. We can, however, by reading the reports of missionaries, and Bible men and women, get some indistinct conception of the moral darkness of those parts of the earth where the light of God's revealed truth does not shine.

Familiarity with divine word has largely disqualified us for appreciating its blessings. To be without the Bible is to be far from God, to be out of harmony with our surroundings and to be in darkness that will issue in darkness forever. The Bible in the homes and hands of the people is necessary to the defence of its own divine character. The learned do much to silence objectors, but the Bible itself is the greatest power in resisting infidelity in its various forms.

Within the last forty years the attacks upon the genuineness and authenticity of God's word have been made from different standpoints. The mythical theory of German infidelity was the rage for a time. Then an attack, coming

from the same quarter, was made on the atonement. This was followed by the onset of the Philistines of material philosophy. Now the authorship and integrity of the Old Testament is assailed by the Higher Criticism. How shall the religion of Christ be successfully defended against this persistent warfare of the enemy?

The Bible in the hands, homes, and hearts of the people at large has been, and will continue to be an impregnable fortress to successfully withstand these foes. To give the people in their own tongue the Word of God is the mission of this Society, and it merits the prayers, sympathies, and material support of the christian public.

The third resolution was moved by MR. J. BURGOYNE, seconded by MR. E. J. SMITH, as follows:

That the officers and committee be reelected, with such alterations and additions as may be necessary from non-attendance or removals.

All the resolutions were unanimously adopted. The choir of the church was present and rendered several hymns and anthems.

Before the close of the meeting, a collection was taken up in aid of the Society in its work. The meeting was closed with the benediction by BISHOP COURTNEY.

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AGENT'S REPORT.

*To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia
Auxiliary Bible Society:*

GENTLEMEN,—In view of keeping the Auxiliary's printed Report within the one cent postage limit, my report of Branch visitation will be as brief as possible. For the same reason, as well as for lessening the expense of printing, I have, at the suggestion of your Secretary, when copying the collectors' lists, omitted the names of subscribers of less than 25 cents, and placed the sum total of such amounts at the end of each list. My first tour of visitation began on March 10th, and continued when weather and roads permitted until April 30th. I received the usual kind welcome and favor from the friends in Hants County, and through the valleys of STEWIAKKE and MUSQUODOBOIT. During this trip a Branch was formed at River John, but as yet I am not aware of any practical results, but at the neighbouring district of SCOTSBURN and SALTSPRINGS I received a liberal contribution.

My second tour began on August 8th and ended on September 27th. During that period I travelled through the eastern part of Pictou County, Antigonish County, Guysboro, and the Island of Cape Breton. On that visit a Branch was organised at Canso. While at Canso I collected an earnest of future, and I trust, liberal contributions. While in Cape Breton I again followed too closely on the footsteps of the collector for the Book and Tract Society, yet I was, I think, very successful in my collecting work. Indeed I cannot speak too highly of the helpful generosity of the friends in Cape Breton. I would here also call your attention to the handsome contributions from the recently organized Branches of SPRINGVILLE and BRIDGEVILLE, and SUNNY BRAE, Pictou County. For the first time

I visited the scattered community of BLUE MOUNTAIN and GARDEN OF EDEN, but the absence of the pastor at that time was unfavourable to my purpose of forming a Branch. I hope, however, yet to have that honour, and from what I learned of the people they will enjoy the privilege of taking a share in Bible circulation.

My third tour began on October 9th, and was finished on December 8th. The meeting at DARTMOUTH on October 8th was held in the Church of England School Room, and was pleasant and hopeful. The estimable ladies who manage that Branch merit our warmest thanks for the large contribution again rolled up by their efforts.

I deeply regret to see a falling away in the annual gift from WINDSOR, but perhaps that Branch has not yet finished its canvass.

I was greatly cheered by the successful meeting at WOLFVILLE. A new committee was then formed, and each name on the board is a guarantee of successful administration.

The little district of SOMERSET still leads as the Banner County Branch of the Auxiliary. To the mere tourist other places may present greater attractions, but in the eyes of the Bible Society agent Somerset is indeed as a luxuriant Oasis.

BRIDGETOWN has done well this year; so has our most friendly Branch at ROUND HILL; both have advanced handsomely. ANNAPOLIS shews a slight decrease. DIGBY has again advanced; thanks for this are due to the kindness of Rev. Mr. Priestwood and activity of Mrs. England.

WEYMOUTH still maintains her good record, while the generous hospitality and favours of St. Clair Jones to your agent are ever present in his memory.

YARMOUTH ladies deserve great credit for their assiduous efforts on behalf of our cause. My own canvass there was not, however, as good as on las yeart.

BARRINGTON has advanced, for which we are indebted to the personal exertions of our friend Professor Arnold Doane.

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SHAG and WOOD'S HARBOUR were visited, and I hope will soon be enlisted as a Branch. So also, I trust, will Clarke's Harbour. My route and visits to these places were planned and promoted by the Bible Society's generous friend and life member, the Rev. C. Weston of Yarmouth.

LAHAVE shews a falling off, so also does Bridgewater, due to adverse times in that region. The meeting on Sunday night at Mahone Bay was the best ever held there, and the contribution the largest yet obtained.

LUNENBURG, in her subscription list, again tells her own grand story of increased affection and praiseworthy liberality, while the last annual meeting was by far the best in the history of the Branch. A new feature in the way of a musical entertainment was there introduced which, if embodied in the programme of future meetings, cannot fail to draw crowded assemblies. The delightful music then rendered testified to the beauty of its arrangement, and to the classic taste and genius of Mr. A. K. MORASH. LUNENBURG may well be proud of such a QUARTETTE, and long may the Bible Society enjoy the favor of their skill at the annual meetings.

Notwithstanding the heavy storm when at BRIDGEWATER, the meeting was fairly attended, and was addressed by five ministers of the town. It was then decided to hold the next annual meeting on a Sunday night, and for that purpose the services in the various churches will be brief and held also at an earlier hour than usual.

In closing this brief report I may add that a perusal of the subscription lists will give evidence that notwithstanding the continued business depression, the cause of the Bible Society is not forgotten by the children of the Kingdom, while also your agent has reason to be grateful for the many favors extended to him by these friends; and while he recognizes such as having been done for His Name's sake—the Name which is above every name, they are for that very reason all the more appreciated by

Extracts from Abstract of Report of Parent Society.

Our journey begins with FRANCE, and there, at the outset, we already feel the icy influences, which—like east winds in summer—so often chill the spirits of the colporteurs. 'In France,' says M. Monod sorrowfully, 'we work on deliberately hostile ground. As in other countries all the forces of the natural heart are against us, but here also all the forces of the dominant Church, with its thirty-five millions of nominal adherents, are leagued against us:—and what are we?' And yet in spite of all there has been advance. The colportage circulation is indeed lower, because the force is less, but the total circulation has been unexpectedly high.¹ 'Never indeed,' says M. Monod again, 'have there been, in any time, so high sales.' There is even better evidence than this. 'If we are but careful observers,' he adds, 'we shall find that He who comes not with observation is coming and does not tarry. Numerous are the evangelical churches in France—created, founded, and progressing—owing to the sole reading of the Scriptures circulated by our colporteurs; more numerous still the small gathering of working people around a Bible, perhaps the only copy in a village, imported by one of our good labourers.' How much does this mean!—and how much also that piteous inquiry of a poor man who imagined that his mass book was the Bible:—'How is it that our priest has never told us to search the Scriptures?' One of the most regrettable facts of the year, in France, has been the reduction of the colporteur force by almost one-fifth, and if the men no longer at work were like Guerin of Lyons, the loss has been very grave. This good man died in the fall of the year, and the words of his widow—written in the unreserved confidence of a letter—at once picture by a single touch the noble life of so many of his class, and open the springs of natural tenderness. '*We have not yet had courage enough to go to the Gard and see the place where my poor husband ended a life so useful and so filled with labour. You cannot imagine the conflict in which he lived—conflict with men's spirit and with the elements. Neither rain, nor wind, nor snow, nor storm, could induce him to take a moment's rest. In winter, in summer, he was off by daybreak, and returned only at night, often drenched through and through. And now it seems to us he is on tour again, and we expect him home—but he does not come! We shall go to him, but he shall not return to us.*'

Much of this might be repeated for SPAIN: there also the colportage circulation is lower, for the force has been reduced: but there also the general circulation has been increased.¹ In Spain also we hear of Associations of Bible Readers—those popular *Collegia Pietatis* which have been so often, in days of lost or decaying spirituality, the beginnings of a new Reformation, and the schools where many have found and loved the Wisdom of Christ. About the prospects of the Society's work in this land of many a disappointment, Mr. Jameson is naturally reticent, but he indicates something of the eagerness of his belief and desire in one emphatic sentence—'This I can positively assert: that in Spain the conditions for the circulation of the Scriptures are being prepared as they never have been before.'

In ITALY, the third of the great Latin nations, the same record curiously repeats itself. Here also the colportage circulation has been reduced, and for the same reason: but here also the total issues for the year are higher.² They are indeed higher than ever before, and it may well stir one's hopes to hear that for the Italian race in and out of Italy,—for the Italians who but yesterday were under the rule of the Vatican—for Italy in which the Bible was proscribed and all but popularly unknown—the total supply has been close upon 200,000 copies. Even as to the colporteurs' sales it is full of suggestiveness to note that while France with a population of 38,000,000 has had, from this source, but 60,000 copies, Italy with a population of only 31,000,000 has had 87,000. Sig. Meille in his elaborate report naturally discusses the Encyclical of November last, but points out—and English Christians may perhaps require to be reminded of it—that in this characteristic deliverance all the old positions of the Papacy, as regards the popular diffusion of the Scriptures, are unchanged. But there is one sentence—it is quoted from Jerome—which strangely enough is reproduced in the Encyclical and of which Sig. Meille justly says: 'I would have it inscribed in brilliant letters in every Roman Catholic, nay in every Protestant, Church:—'To be ignorant of the Scriptures is to be ignorant of Christ'—'*Ignoratio Scripturarum est ignoratio Christi.*' And he supplies—what the Encyclical withholds—the natural inference—'If the Scriptures are of such paramount importance—if he who does not know the Scriptures cannot know Christ, the only Saviour of mankind, how is it possible to keep the Scriptures from the people?'

Such seem to be the most remarkable aspects of the Society's work in the three great Latin countries. What is to be said of the

neighbouring group of Germanic nations in which the Reformation has made its home? The answer to this question may be brief: it will also be felt to be full of encouragement and of promise. It is—that among each of these peoples—among the Swedes and Norwegians, the Dutch and the Danes, the Germans and the Swiss, the work of Bible circulation has passed, or is rapidly passing, into their own hands, and that it is deepening and widening year by year. From Sweden and Holland the Society's agents have been already withdrawn: Norway is approaching similar autonomy; with Switzerland the Bible Society is related only as a friendly source of assistance and supply: and in the German Empire its work is primarily directed to the Roman Catholic population and practically limited to them. And there can be nothing more pleasant than the evidence which shows that the German Societies are themselves steadily rising to the measure of their great influence and responsibilities.¹ In 1881 the total circulation was 172,000 copies: in ten years it had risen to 313,000: in 1892 it was 326,000: last year it was 338,000. Within the Society's own special sphere there has also been advance, and its colportage circulation has risen from over 51,000 to over 60,000. This is the work of thirty men, and the accounts of their experience given by Mr. Watt are full of inspiration. The interest is perhaps greatest in the extreme East, where the emotional and susceptible Poles—some of the Romanist, some of the Reformed faith—have shown their deepening interest in the Scriptures by more than doubling the issues of 1892. But here also, as in the case of France, the peculiar quality, the intensity, the tenderness of the colportage work seems embodied in a personal narrative, and, like that other, it is one of death. Few of its servants have served the Society better than Colporteur Eydam, and his last duties were painfully trying, for he was stationed in Münster, in the very centre of an intolerant Romanism, the monasteries and convents of that Papal city overshadowed his path everywhere. Like his French brother, Guerin of Lyons, he was attacked with acute illness on a journey, but, unlike him, he was able to reach home: his wife was beside him, and his children, when he died. His latest words, and all his thoughts as he neared the end were of his work and of his untroubled faith; and the last sentence which he feebly articulated was that chosen by the Society in its *Specimens of Languages* as the completest expression of the love of God and the hope of man.

Of AUSTRIA-HUNGARY little can be said in a review so rapid as this, not that there is any lack of matter in that narrative which, constantly the same, is yet constantly varied and continually impressive, but because of the very copiousness of it, and the com-

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plexity and the fulness of the populations in this great Empire.¹ It is
 not indeed easy to pass, though it is impossible to particularize,
 the story which Mr. Millard tells with so much spiritual sympathy,
 —for every example of success holds him with its charm ; and
 whether he speaks of Hungary, where the 'increasing circulation
 is a marvel' to him, or of Bohemia, where 'our work is greatly
 blessed,' or of Moravia or Roumania, he lingers on every illustra-
 tion—and they are many—of the usefulness of the work of his
 men. For them indeed he has nothing but praise. 'Our colpor-
 teurs are doing their best to bring the Word of God to every
 home and every hamlet in our Empire : we find them in the miser-
 able huts of wood fellers, climbing over high rocky mountains, or
 in solitary cottages on the plain : here seeking entrance to splendid
 mansions, there at the sick-bed of the poor : colportage is indeed
 the very backbone of our work.' If one sentence only must be
 chosen to summarize the results of labour so devoted, none can be
 better than Mr. Millard's own—brief, but limitless in meaning :—
 'Christ's cause in Austria-Hungary is gaining ground year by
 year.'

Nor can any detailed account be given of the Society's work,
 done in the face of peculiar difficulties, in the *TURKISH AGENCY*,²
 though these regions must always have peculiar interest to minds
 of classic culture. To them it is almost indescribably suggestive
 to watch the influences of a new faith, a new literature, new forms
 of thought falling, softly as the early blooms of summer, on the
 old homes of Greek civilization ; to watch the colporteurs at work
 in Macedonia—solitary men, found here and there, but the repre-
 sentatives of a power far mightier than that of Alexander ; to
 meet them in Mitylene—the Lesbos of Sappho, of Alcaeus, of
 Terpander, the very center of the flower of ancient Hellenic luxury ;
 to learn that in the schools of Greece itself, and in an ever-increas-
 ing degree, the New Testament is being introduced. To attempt
 to estimate the significance of all this is the less necessary, for in
 one awakening sentence Dr. Thomson sums up the resultant of the
 forces at work. 'In Bulgaria,' he says, 'and in other lands of the
 East, the circulation of the vernacular Scriptures is producing at
 present changes which may almost be compared with the Reforma-
 tion in England and Scotland, and other countries of Western
 Europe.'

This generalization leads us into the EGYPTIAN AGENCY,¹ for it refers largely to Muhammedans, who still surround, though half-conscious they cannot much longer be defended, the sacred places of their faith. And Mr. Weakley's judgment points in the same direction. 'The mood of the Muhammedan is being altered, he receives the colporteur without the malignant scowl of earlier years; it is no longer strange to hear him give as his reason for declining to buy that he already possesses a copy of the *Injil*.' Indeed, it is largely owing to the fact that so many of those who can read have been supplied that the issues of last year are hardly as high as those of 1892. It is interesting to know that since this became a detached Agency ten years ago, over 100,000 Scriptures have been circulated in Egypt itself, and among the streams of ocean travellers who crowd the Suez Canal. Wr. Weakley notes that among the vessels most open and friendly to the colporteurs are those of RUSSIA, and that name, so much more expressive every year, leads us into the great Empire which borders at once along their eastern and northern limits both the Agencies we have left.

The journals which lead us first through Northern Russia to the utmost shores of Eastern Siberia,² and then by the South into the heart of Asia, are full of glimpses of unfamiliar scenery—ever-varying, bright with changing colour, strangely suggestive of many things in the past and the future—full also of incidents which awake the deeper sympathies of the heart. We see and hear all this as page after page is turned—we feel as if we were ourselves visiting those distant places with the writers as our guides. Dr. Nicolson leads us to the great factories near Moscow and shows us the people crowding round the colporteur—those 'Russian people' whose character he bids us notice—'so receptive, so generally full of respect for things connected with religion, so thankful for an interest shown in their spiritual welfare'—as elsewhere he speaks of them as bringing 'minds kept fresh and simple through direct intercourse with nature to the Word of God, and when they understand it, straightway attempting to bring their lives in accordance with it.' Then he enters the prison. There also the Gospel is welcome: the library sent by the Bible Society is in full use, and the prisoners 'express their thankfulness for the edification and comfort it affords them.' He directs us afterwards, as the narrative passes on to one of the sunniest parts of the Agency—the broad valley of the Volga; and at the season—it is the month of April—when the skies are intense blue, when the great river, 'as if rejoicing in its escape from winter,' covers whole stretches of the lower lands with its flood; when the steamers speed from port to

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port—those steamers in which the colporteurs, through the courtesy of the Directors, travel free; and when every deck and every pier is crowded with passengers. Among these crowds the men ply their friendly trade. 'Now,' says Dr. Nicolson, 'it is a Polish merchant who is induced to look into Bible in his own language, and after making proof of its contents, declares that the book shall be his constant companion; again it is a Russian priest who makes himself specially useful in inducing the passengers to buy, by telling them that the English Bible Society in all countries seeks to induce the various nations, tribes, and tongues to purchase the sacred volume; again it is a Russian soldier, who, welcoming the Bible as so many of his comrades do, clasps it with fervour, and with audible prayer to his heart.' But it is impossible to do more than watch the rapidly passing panorama: we enter Siberia, guided in the Western Sub-Agency by Mr. Davidson, in the further East by Mr. Keay. We notice, as they do with wonder, the immensely rapid progress which is being made: the towns growing into cities, the steamers multiplying on the rivers: great industries planting themselves: but everywhere we find the colporteurs—those 'Apostles of the Nineteenth Century' as Dr. Nicolson calls them—and see with what endurance, and with what success they everywhere pursue their toil.

Full of interest as all this is, the interest is deepened in the South.¹ Here Mr. Morrison reports the largest total hitherto excepting the previous year, and 'of single copies sold to single individuals and bought to be read, absolutely the largest ever known.' It is indeed full of significance to notice that adding the issues of the Southern to those of the Northern Agency, we reach a circulation of above half a million copies, and find that the Russian people receive almost one-seventh of the entire issues of the Society for the whole year. When we remember what lies behind these figures, and when we see, revealed from time to time, the details of the work they represent, the impression is very much deepened. At a large establishment near Kharkov, as the colporteurs passed the doors of the workmen's cottages he heard little but the rudest language and the sounds of dispute and quarrel. He was not unsuccessful in distributing copies, and when the day's work was over he again passed the doors. A great change had come: the unkindly voices were silent: one man with a Gospel was the center of a group who listened as he read; while from an open window a voice was heard: '*Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judæa.*' A little further on there was another group similarly engaged, and as the colporteur passed he heard the words which, true of his great Master, are also true of the company to which he himself belonged: '*He went about*

through cities and villages, bringing the good tidings of the Kingdom of God.' We see in such an incident a picture of the elevating work which is going forward everywhere. One of the colporteurs, worn out by ceaseless labour, has recently resigned. Mr. Morrison, in bidding him grateful farewell, remembers that he has been the means of distributing probably 25,000 copies of the Scriptures on the Dnieper, that historic river up which the Heralds of the Cross sailed when they visited Russia for the first time 1,000 years ago. One of his colleagues, aided by a free pass on the steamers of the Russian Steam Navigation Co., is hardly less busy:—'Ever travelling from port to port, visiting the seamen in Sevastopol, the pleasure-seekers in Yalta, the Greeks of Theodosia, the artillery men of Kertch, the picturesque mountaineers of the Caucasus coast, the men of the volunteer fleet, the new recruits drafted off to the army, the time-expired men who are leaving the Caucasus for their homes.' Near Simferopol we get a picture of colporteur life and endurance which cannot easily be forgotten. 'He had not long left till it began to snow. The snow fell heavier and heavier, the road became blocked, a strong north-west wind howled along; at last the horses cannot move; the colporteur and the driver are gradually drenched to the skin; they push the cart from behind hour after hour; finally they reach a roadside inn, completely exhausted, but the brave man's only remark is, 'It is dreadful weather, however it will soon be spring, and I thank God for permitting me to work continuously.' This however is nothing exceptional. Another colporteur, breaking up fresh ground, visited the Cossacks of the Ural who, with the Kirghiz, a helot race, inhabit 'a bleak, raw land, where clouds of salty dust blow about all day long, and where the scanty vegetation is something that only camels can eat.' Few parts of the Agency are more interesting than the Caucasus—that historic territory, so picturesque in itself, so various in its populations, so full of the movement and progress of the present. From this old land comes a voice which will be welcomed wherever lovers of the Word of God hear it; it is that of the newly appointed Armenian Katholikos, who in a recent sermon said to the people who are so dear to him: 'I bless you, my beloved Armenian people; I ask you to read the Gospel and to teach its precepts to your children; love one another and live together in harmony. If you have the love of Christ in your hearts all will be well, for the source of all that is good is love.' Mr. Morrison's report appropriately closes with a picture of the Colporteur-Translator Aveteriantz sitting in the Hindi Serai of Kashgar, on the edge of the great Gobi wilderness, a case of Scriptures behind him; in front of him a desk, and on it the MS. of the Gospel which he is translating into the language of the people, who come sometimes to watch him, with indefinite curiosity, at his work, sometimes to possess themselves of a copy of the Scriptures to carry into their distant homes.

Little can be said of CHINA, for the river of visible life, of picturesque detail and incident, so open to the light elsewhere,

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buries itself here largely out of sight; we have brief summaries, statistics and general statements: it is only here and there we see the spiritual world which lies behind and is above all mere returns, or listen to the voices of the heart. Yet these statistics are full of significance.¹ Despite the depression which has followed flood and famine; despite the very partial access yet gained into some important provinces, the circulation has been unusually high; it approaches a quarter of a million copies and exceeds that of 1892 by more than 50,000. About 160 native and six European colporteurs have been engaged, and they are exerting an influence which must ultimately be revealed. How deep this influence is, how steadily it is spreading, there are not a few evidences. 'The Gospel,' writes one of the missionaries in a significant sentence, 'has at length begun to find its way from the uneducated multitude to the literary classes, and among them it is affecting the life and views of thinking men.' Even more significant perhaps is the declaration of a native of some education and reflection—a declaration full of that awakening sense of change—that pathetic lament over a departing order of things—that confessed recognition of the approach of a new and mightier power, which was heard once when Christianity won its first great conquests, and which we are beginning to hear in many heathen lands again. 'These men,' he said, 'have come into our beautiful country; they build chapels, and the sound of their bells is heard far and near. The alarming sound enters even into our ancestral halls, and our family graves. Even our incense loses its power, our sons and daughters will die; and the foreigner and his faith will triumph.'

That voice we may also hear in INDIA: we have already heard it; for there also the sky is slowly being filled with the light of a new day, and many eyes are watching how it is flushing all the spaces of the east. To India indeed there can be in this outline but a reference; for of the six Auxiliaries at work there, only three have as yet sent their reports, and those are comparatively brief. But in every case there has been advance. Even in the apparent exception of Bangalore, the centre of the Kanarese-speaking people, the actual circulation has been less only because the demand exceeded the powers of supply, and the exhausted stock could not be at once replenished. Never has the Madras circulation, except in one case, been so high: fifty-two colporteurs have distributed 75,000 copies, and the demand for vernacular Scriptures here, as everywhere else, is steadily growing. Steadily indeed, as all missionary work also reports; but not too steadily nor too swiftly: not too soon can English Christianity blot out, in the evangelical devotion of the present, some of the painful memories of the past. There was a time—it was before the Christian conscience was awakened about India—when for eighty years there was no

church at Calcutta, and such service as there was was held in a private house; when the only recognition of Sunday was the hoisting of a flag; when one of the oldest and best inhabitants of the city could say that he was not sure that he could produce ten righteous men there, but thought he could produce five; when outside the capital there was no assembly for religious worship, nor any evidence that Englishmen had ever a religious instinct; when natives could speak of Christianity as a religion of the devil.¹ These days are gone—they are perhaps forgotten—yet they may well be recalled if their sorrowful memory may quicken the spirit of thankfulness for the present, or may at all deepen the conviction that the debt England owes to India is incalculably great, that it is all the greater from the unfaithfulness of the past, that it should be paid without stint, without hesitation, without delay.

Little also may be said of Persia,² where good work is being done, or of JAPAN, for the record of the year is uneventful, and the progress of Christianity seems to pause before the absorption of the people in their new political passions and cares. But there is one fact which illuminates the story with a light of its own, a light sufficient indeed to illuminate many a year of otherwise discouraging labours: it is the history and the yearly record of the Scripture Union,—that Union which already numbers 13,000 members with their 300 local secretaries; which has already done some of the deepest and happiest work of the century; which is planning and attempting more; of which the personal memories are among the most beautiful and the most touching of those of any Christian community.

Already we have surveyed some of the aspects of work carried on in half a world, but so wide is the Society's field, that there yet remains another hemisphere—continents yet unvisited, great movements to which no allusion has been made. Nor can anything beyond an allusion be made to them now, or in pages which do not so much summarise the larger Report as form, in relation to it, a kind of prelude outline. But in that fuller History it will be seen that the first lady colporteur sent out by the Society has found her work among the thirty millions of MALAYSIA,³ that to the same great field have gone four young Englishmen to join their countrymen there, and to continue the work they have so worthily and successfully begun: that in the WEST INDIES and in CENTRAL AMERICA the Society's operations are being more fully organised and developed; that the political revolutions in the Southern Republics, in CHILI and PERU, in the ARGENTINE, have not

hindered, nor even lessened, the circulation of the Word of God, and that in CANADA, as in AUSTRALIA and NEW ZEALAND, the Society has proved for another year how deep the fellow feeling, how indispensable the assistance of its faithful friends who are there. To AUSTRALIA, so important is the Society's work there, a special deputation has being sent, and it is hoped that, as a result, the union between that great colony and home may be more close and more friendly than ever. It will also be found that for AFRICA new versions are being prepared year by year; that, in connexion with the Agencies of Morocco and of Algiers in the North and the South African Auxiliary at the Cape, much good and enlarging work is being done; that supplies of Scriptures for the great missionary field of the East and the West are constantly being sent; that to Uganda alone, where the newly awakened and eager spirit of Bible study is one of the most remarkable facts of the century, some 66,000 copies have been despatched ¹; that while sections here and there of the continent are being painfully won over as political annexations of the European powers, the whole is being added, slowly indeed but surely,—not with bloodshed, but through sanctified learning, through the devotion of many noble lines, through the tender ministries of Christian women—added race by race, language by language, faith by faith, to the Kingdom of Christ.

It is a survey which cannot but suggest many reflections, many and varying according to the minds in which they arise. But there are two which—so obvious are they and almost inevitable—will probably be awakened in all.

The first is that of *the multiplicity of languages*. How great that multiplicity, how perplexing, how obstructive to the spread and apprehension of thought, not the most experienced colporteur knows, scarcely the most erudite linguist, not even the far-wandering traveller who, like the old Greek wanderer, has seen many cities and many nations of men. With us in our island home how dimly felt: but there are forty languages needed in the Turkish Agency, forty in the South Russian. The colporteur must carry many books he cannot read, and there is a tender heart in every language which none can touch or understand but those in whom it was born. How numberless the rooms in the strange house of human life!—how many closed doors—how impossible to reach the inhabitant within unless one has the golden key—the knowledge of the mother-tongue!

The second reflection is that of *the world-wide unrest of thought and faith*. It is among ourselves,—that profound insecurity of

conviction—in the West: wrought partly by the new science, partly by the new literature, partly perhaps by the very fixity of posture we have long had in traditional beliefs: even more by the working of that great silent law of change which all human things obey. Even in the East,—the still home of an everlasting yesterday, in India, in China, those who know them best mark portentous changes in the historic systems of faith which had lived millenniums before Christianity was born,—point out seams of cleavage in the great masses—assure us, not so confidently that they will soon fall suddenly as overturned towers, but quite assuredly that they are already crumbling to their end,—that the fatal day has reached them,—that the places which know them now shall know them no more for ever.

These two reflections very naturally arise: And as they impress themselves on the mind, may they not awaken a third—and with it a strange sense of Divine purpose in human affairs—a reflection as to the *position in which, in this polyglot transition time, the Society finds itself, half unconsciously, placed.*

For, from the first, *translation* became the most necessary of all its duties, a duty which has continued and grown more necessary ever since; until now the Bible has become itself polyglot—a wonder of translation—has learned to speak in new tongues, and instead of being an incomprehensible book in this myriad-languaged world is fast becoming intelligible in them all. And this many-languaged Book is in the Society's hands.

Also, this Book *alone*. Not a Creed, nor a Theology, nor any system of elaborated thought, but the Divine Book only, without comment,—the original source to which perplexed thought must return; from which new Reformations have started; out of which living influences have flown like rivers;—the expression of that divine truth which everywhere finds out the heart, which explains man to himself and reveals God,—which will exist and be new and vital when the old idolatries, when the new philosophies, have passed away.

Let us be steadfast, let us be hopeful, let us rejoice in that possession, let us envy no other. How blessed we are to have received it!—but let us give it to others, to every language, to every nation. It is more blessed to give than to receive.
