Further southeast, in northern France, heavy fighting was continuously in progress. Apparently the Germans have the intention of moving their armies from the occupied territory altogether, and are now holding the lines stubbornly in northern France to prevent the cutting off of their armies in western Belgium during their backward movement.

The German Reichstag is apparently debating President Wilson's latest note with great difference of opinions, without coming to a definite agreement, as the eagerly awaited answer of Germany has not yet come forth. What that answer will be, cannot yet be foreseen, but it seems to be the general opinion in the allied countries that Germany, whilst not acceeding entirely to Wilson's demands, will give such an answer as will not cut off entirely the possibility of exchang-

ing notes on the subject of peace.

President Wilson's answer, dated Oct. 19, to Austria's pea offer of Oct. 7, leaves no doubt that nothing short of the total dismemberment of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy will be satisfactory to him and the Allies. He gives the Austrian government to understand clearly that entire independence must be given to the Checho-slovaks (Bohemia. Silesia and Moravia) and to the Jugo-slavs (Carniola, Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegowina), as a preliminary to peace negotiations. In the course of the peace nego tiations, undoubtedly, the Rumanians will claim Transylvania, Bukowina and the Banat, Poland and the Ukraine will claim Gali-Wekerle. The emperor says he shores of the Adriatic and the south half of Tyrol, so that only the strictly German speaking portions of the monarchy with a population of 8, 10,000,000 inhabitants will remain for Austria, and the strictly Magyar portions of Hungary with a similar population for that kingdom.
