There were calls for Mr. Davin when Mr. Trux and down, but the usually talkative member for Assinibois had nothing to say until later, when he spoke only a few words. After a pause Mr. Trux called attention to the presence of Sir Donald Smith. "My hon. friend," he said, "closed a session upon in a very interesting way, and I think he ought to close the present session."

This allusion to the stormy close of the session of 1875, when Sir John Macdonald declared, among other things, "That fellow Smith is the biggest liar I ever met," caused a general laugh, but Sir Donald was talking, with some other people who did not notice the being frequently called for by him and spoke a few words.

Mr. Davin had just concluded a three minute speech when the first of the expected knocks sounded upon the door, announcing the presence of Black Rod. This functionary was admitted, and entering, made his usual obeisance, and announced the desire of the Governor-General that the members should repair to the Senate Chamber, where the majority of the visitors had assembled.

The bills were then assented to after which the speech from the throne was made as follows:—Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons: In terminating the present session of Parliament I desire to record my appreciation of the earnestness and industry which have shown in the performance of your public duties.

The measure for the ratification of the Fisheries Treaty agreed upon at the opening of the present session, the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie's plenipotentiaries and those of the United States, to which I have given the Queen's assent, will, I trust, be met with satisfaction by the people of the whole Dominion as affording a crowning proof of Canada's constant desire to arrive at just and honorable settlement of all questions arising out of the interpretation of the Convention of 1818. I venture, with some degree of confidence, to hope that the several authorities on both sides of the treaty is necessary to its operation may not be incommensurate to the great advantages to both countries which are calculated to entail.

The arrangement under which the Canadian Pacific Railway Company had relinquished the exclusive privileges granted by its charter in article 15 of the original agreement between Her Majesty and the company will, I believe, be met with general acceptance, and by increasing its financial strength, enable the company to keep pace with the ever-growing requirements of the vast region which it traverses.

The extension to the people of the Northwest Territories of a large measure of self-government, which has been enjoyed in a satisfactory evidence of the rapid development of that important portion of the Dominion, and which has been attended with beneficial results. The prospects for a large immigration this year, of a desirable class of settlers, are, I am glad to believe, exceptionally good.

The various amendments to the laws relating to the Inland Revenue, railways, the Civil Service and to other acts affecting the public interest, which have been introduced since the opening of the session, have all been passed with commendable promptness.

Fatal Case of Nias Bleeding. Says the Fredericton Capital:—Halifax, N. S., May 28. Mrs. Charles Parsons, resident, took to bleeding at the nose on Monday, as in the case of nose-bleeding.
