

COLLAPSE OF A BUILDING

NEWPOL!, R. I., July 10—Both Forts Adams and Greble repelled the attacks of the enemy today in the mimic warfare which is being conducted by the war department in Narragansett Bay and it was the opinion of good military judges tonight that no hostile fleet could get past the forts which protect the communities bordering the bay, or could steal unawares upon the forts themselves and effect a landing for an attacking party. 
