



Little Boy Dead From Diphtheria, and Other Cases are Reported.

Mary's Catholic Church and a number of other buildings were struck by lightning during a storm late this afternoon. None of the building was burned, but all suffered considerable damage. The steeple of the church was splintered in parts and fire started inside. On account of the lack of apparatus, the firemen had much difficulty in extinguishing the blaze in the steeple but succeeded in getting it under control before heavy damage was done. The cross on the steeple was tipped sideways by the lightning. Mrs. Chas. Holmes was rendered unconscious by a bolt which entered her house on Common Street. She was revived after several hours. A house and a barn at North Brookfield were burned after being struck by lightning during the same shower.




