ST. MARTINS, Saturday, 5th July, 1851.

THE EASTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, convened at the Baptist Chapel in St. Martins this day at 2 o'clock, P. M.: after about three hours spent in religious conference, the Association was organized by appointing the following officers, viz.:

Tuesday, 10 o'clock, A. M.

Met according to adjournment. Preaching by Elder E. D. Very, from Rev. vii. 9. After which the Association resolved into an Educational Meeting, and Elder J. Crandal, President of the Education Society in this Province took the Chair.

The report of the Society was then read by Elder E. D. Very, and adopted, and ordered to be printed in the Minutes.

The Moderator then resumed the Chair, and the Committee on Education presented their Report, which was adopted, [see Appendix C.] and supported by excellent addresses from Elders J. Crandal, S. Bancroft, J. Blakney, I. E. Bill, Dr. Cramp, and Elder J. Chase.

The Committee on the Christian Visitor submitted their Report, which was received. [Appen. D.]

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bmitn. D.) After prayer by Elder Herrit, adjourned to half past 2 o'clock, P. M.

Tuesday Afternoon.

Met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Brother Hughes.

The Committee on Colportage submitted their Report, which was adopted. [Appendix E.]

The Committee on Foreign Missions submitted their Report, which was adopted, [Appendix F.] and the claims of the heathen presented in stirring appeals by Dr. Cramp, Elders R. E. Burpe, and James J. Woolsey, and a collection taken, amounting to £3 4s. 2d., in support of the funds for Foreign Missions.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Association it is advisable that the Financial Agent of Acadia College should visit, with as luttle delay as possible, the Churches of New Brunswick in behalf of that Institution, and that Elders J. Crandal, W. Searw, D. Crandal, and J. Newcomb be a Committee to make arrangements for Educational meetings, and to co-operate with Brother Chase in carrying the design of his agency into effect.

The Committee on the Union Society submitted their Report, which was adopted. [Appendix G.]

The Committee appointed to prepare a resolution relative to the death of Elders A. McDonald, and Edwd. Manning, submitted the following Obituary, which was ordered to be printed in the Minutes.

Resolved, That we cannot allow this Session to close, without taking special note of the Providence of God, which has removed from among us Rev. Alexander McDonald, whose prudent counacl, and whose kind and Christian deportment for several years past have assisted and cheeted us in our deliberations.—We would hereby testify the sincere Christian affection and high respect universally entertained among us towards him, and our deep sense of his many virtues, and especially of his fidelity and diligence as u Minister of Jesus Christ.

We tender our sincere regard and sympathy to his bereaved family, who mourn an irreparable loss, and would hambly and carnestly commend them to a gracious Heavenly Father, who has called our dear Brother to his reward.

We would, in this connection, also express the veneration in

which our departed Father in the Gospel, Rev. Edward Manning, has ever been held by the Baptist Churches in this Province, since he was Providentially directed to plant, our standard more than a half century since, in many places where now we have large and

respectable Churches.

If his naturing zeal for the conversion of souls, if his careful discrimination and regard for Scriptural truth and Gospel order, and his wise forecast and devotion to the cause of Education generally, and especially of Ministerial Education, can now rest with and upon us—thus bearing his fallen mantle, and only thus can we cherish the hope of perpetuating the remarkable success which has followed his labours and of those who were his early associates, very few of whom yet survive, in wonder and gratitude to explain. "Behold, what hath God wrought?"

Resolved, That Elder E. D. Very be requested to superintend the printing of the Minutes; that eight hundred and fifty copies be printed, and that the Articles and Covenant be omitted this year.

Resolved, That Deacons E. Read, J. Bishop, Isaac Gross, Wm. Steadman, Jr., and Eldors W. G. Parker, E. F. Foshay, J. Newcomb, and D. Crandel, constitute the Westmorland and Albert Domestic Missionary Board for this year.

Resolved, that the Norton Domestic Missionary Roard stand as last year, with the addition of Deucon Ammond Fowler,

After prayer by Bro. Very, adjourned to 7 o'clock.

Tuesday Evening, 7 o'clock.

Met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder W. G. Parker.

The Committee on Domestic Missions submitted their Report, [see Appendix I.] which was acaccepted, and in connection, therewith touching addresses were delivered by Elders D. Crandal, W. G. Parter, J. Crandal, J. Bleakney, E. F. Foshay, and G. F. Miles, at the conclusion of which a collection was taken up for the benefit of the French Missions, amounting to £6.4s. 4d.

Resolved, That Elders G. F. Miles, and D. Crandal, be a Committee to visit Brother Knight, and to carry out the design of this Association in reference to the French Mission.

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Resolved, That Brother J. F. Masters, of St. John, be Treasurer for the French Mission.

Resolved, That Elder W. G. Parker, Brethren N. Lawrence, J. Anderson, and Frederick Sears, be a Committee of Arrangement for the Association at Sackville next year.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association are hereby tendered to the brethren and friends of St. Martins, for the marked attention and hospitality extended by them to the Ministers, Delegates and Brethren during this Session.

After singing, and prayer by the Moderator, the Association adjourned to meet with the First Baptist Church in Sackville, the Saturday before the third Monday after the 20th June next.

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CIRCULAR LETTER,

TO THE CHURCHES COMPOSING THE WESTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

DEAR BRETHERN.—In presenting you this annual epistle we would impress on you the necessity of Activity in the cause of God.

Christian bretaren—useful activity is the medicine of life; it is adapted to benefit the affect himself as much as the objects of his benevolent attention. No idle man can be either healthful, happy or morally prospectors. To be stagnant is to be miserable, as well as useless. The principle which applies so universally and essentially to our intellectual and physical structure, is no less applicable to our spiritual life. A torpid inactive Christian cannot be a prosperous one. The deciple of Christ cannot if he would, live to himself without injuring his own soul. He must get out of himself if he would attain moral health and comfort. He must take a deep interest in his Master's kingdom, and desire and seek to promote it; he must love his fellow men, pray for them, labour to promote their hoffness and happiness; in a word, be daily emplayed in doing

This is necessary not merely for the benefit of society, but for the spiritual health of the individual himself. Wherein consits the real health of the soul, but in spiritual sensibility, and in the daily exercise of all appropriate and commanded graces toward our Father in Heaven, toward the Saviour and his kingdom, and towards all our fellow creatures? What is true of individuals is true of communities. A torpid, prayerless, inactive Church, however large or wealthy, cannot be a prosperous Church. Nay, however rich, extended, and outwardly flourishing it may be, if the spirit of active well-doing be extinct in it, it is a dead Church, and cannot fail of speedily becoming a mass of spiritual patrifaction. But on the other hand, that Church which, in her collective capacity is constantly employed in planning and labouring for the promotion of the great interests of knowledge, virtue, evangelical holiness and salvation, is taking the most direct method to secure her own enjoyment, growth and prosperity.

The great design of infinite wisdom in the institution of the Church, was that she might be everywhere instrumental in promoting the reign of truth and holiness amongst men. It was no doubt intended that she should constantly seek the spiritual improvement and welfare of her own members, but also that she should labour to communicate the blessings of salvation to every part of the human family within her reach, with all the zeal and officacy of united effort. And in all ages, the Church of God has invariably flourished, in regard to her best interests, just in proportion to the degree in which she has devoted herself to the hallowed work of active Christian Benevolence. It ought to be the nuceasing care of every Church of Christ, not only to have light and purity and order ever shining in their own dwellings but also to hold forth the word of life for the benefit of those who are without, and to send it forth far and wide to every creature within her reach. If this be so, then every Church ought to consider it as equally her duty and her interest. Not merely to support within her own bosom, all the divine'y instituted ordinances of religion, not merely to watch with fidelity over the purity and edification of her own members, but also to be indefatigably active in extending, as widely as possible to others the true religion, with all its blessed concemitants and benefits. She ought to regard it at once as a primary duty and precious privilege, to be constantly employed in spreading the glorious gospel from the rising to the setting sun. Then each Church should pray for and cultivate a missionary spirit. If so, such questions as the following would constantly arise. What can be done to promote the reign of pure and undefiled religion in the midst of us? What to secure the best interests of our children and vonth? What to render our Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes more entensive? What to promote the cause of Temperance?

What to rouse among the people a spirit of active Christian benevo-

lence? What for contributing our portion of means, according as

the Lord has prospered us, towards the evangelizing of the world?

- Anunated with this spirit, and intent on such objects, every

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Baptist Church in our Province would be engaged in sending the word of life and the herald of salvation to the destitute and the perishing; and every one who united himself with such a Church would feel that he was becoming a member for life of a body perpetually consecrated in its very nature, to the great work of doing good to mankind. Animated with this spirit, our hearts would be filled with brotherly love, with enlightened zeal for the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom, and ready to forego every consideration except those of Scriptoral truth and order, for the sake of doing good? Such is the picture of the Buptist Church, which we have sometimes imagined to ourselves, and which we have often prayed that we might see realized. What a glorious spectacle would such a Church be! How happy in itself! How honourable to the cause of religion! What a blessing to our Province and to the world! And is it too much to hope that we may one day see it realized, the same grace which crowned the ministrations of his servants with success, is still treasured up in Him whose throne is for ever and ever, and may be manifested in as amidst all our weakness and unworthiness. Under whatever cloud the glory of our Zion may be in a degree obscured for the present, He can cause her to shine forth with more beauty than ever, through his own comeliness put upon her. If we would be thus blessed we must pray for and cultivate a missionary spirit. If we wish this great plan of doing good to be completely successful it is indispensible that it bears two characteristics. It must be systematic, and it must be consecrated with much fervent prayer; it must be systematic.

We would recommend to our Churches the objects embraced in the Union Society. But our endeavours must be consecrated by prayer. We must walk humbly with God; even in labouring for him. The more profound, then, our sense of our atter unworthis ness to be employed as fellow workers in Christ's kingdom, the deeper our impression of our unter inability, with any amount of men or funds, to accomplish any important good by our own wisdom or strength; and the more humble and importunate our continual supplications for Divine guidance and blessing in all our labour, the more reason we have to hope that those labours will be crowned with success, and that our own souls in pursuing them will be refreshed and edified. In this great work we want co-operation. We plead for the co-operation of practical whole-hearted Christians in heart and soul, in prayer, in contributions, in efforts, in toils, in struggles for the entvation of their fellow men at home and abroad If we would labour with success in the cause of God, we must draw all our strength for war or warfare from Christ, and present all our duties to God in Christ's name. In all the actions of life let us set the Lord before as. We must spend much time in secret prayer and converse with God. Let prayer be the key to open the heart to God in the morning, and lock it against all his enemies at night. We ought to spend every day as it were to be our last. We have no continuing city, nor certain abode here, therefore let us always be ready to use and depart. And if we would labour with success

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in the Lord's vineyard, we must have Christ in our hearts and heaven in our eyes, and the world under our feet. We must take God's spirit for our guide, God's word for our rule, God's glory for our end, his fear for our guard, his people for our companions, his praise for our recreation, and his promises for our cordials. We must make religion our business, prayer our delight, holiness our way, and heaven our home. Then let Christ be always, precious to us, the word sweet, sin bitter, the world a wilderness, and death welcome. Let Christ's will be our will, Christ's dishenenr, our affliction, his cause our concern, his anocess our joy, his day our delight, his cross our glery, his sufferinge our meditation, his wounds our refuge, his blood our balm, his righteousness our clothing, and his presence our heaven. Then let out hearts burn with love to Christ, let us love to think of Christ, love to hear of Christ, love to read of Christ, love to speak of Christ, love to speak for Christ,

love to speak to Christ. If we would be happy and useful we must seek an increase of faith, love, heart purity and humility. Wheever is sich in grace now, will be rich in glory hereafter; for what is grace but glory begun, and what is glory but grace perfected? Who then would not love grace, seeing it is glory begun, and a certain pledge of complete glary. As the professed children of God, it is our duty to testify against what is dishonouring to him by abstaining from all known sin, by reproving sin in others, by keeping up family religion even in the midst of business, and banishing all known vice from our dwellings, such as minced ouths, rash jusing of God's name, idle walking or talking on the Lord's day, backbuting, evil wishes, revengeful actions, and unnedessary pastines. It we would be useful in the cause of God let us he zealous for Sabbath holiness, be meek and lowly, in our carriage, command Christ to others, speak for the borour of religion before those who disregard it, show special regard to those who are stamped with God's image, though mean or despised, be ready to forgive wrongs, and reader group for avil. If we would be happy and useful we must guard against prides, passion, hasty and unguarded words. We must put great respect on God's word and ordinances, we must be concerned for the enlargement of Christ's kingdom, practice self-denial, and never venture on known sin for the sake of worldly gain. We must endeavor to feel the power of Godliness in our hearts, and to have our practice in all respects corresponding to our profession. We should remember that Israel cannot conquer while Achan is in the camp. If we have not a a Missionary spirit, we have reason to fear that we are destitute of union to Christ: if any man has not the spirit of Christ he is none of his. Let us all then, my Christian Brethren, with one consent benceforth address ourselves to this great work of doing good, To this let us daily give our thoughts, our hearts, our prayers, and our best efforts. Let this be our distinction as Baptists, that we belong to a Church peculiarly and pre-eminently devoted to doing The Bu

They have learned with great satisfaction that the Academy at Fredericton is prospering, under the excellent management of Brother Spurden, as will be fully set forth in the Annual Report of that Institution, to be presented at this Meeting.

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important Resolutions, which demand the serious attention of the Denomination at large. They relate to the appointment of a Professor of the Greek and Latin Languages and Literature, with a view to enable the President to devote more time and attention to the Theological Department; to the opening of the College to Students who may be desirous of foining any of the Classes, and passing through partial courses of study, whether Secular or Theological; and to the desirableness of creating Scholarships by individual benevolence, and thus laying the foundation of a College endow. ment. These Resolutions have been published in the Christian Visitor. Your Committee commend them to the serious consideration of the Bantists of New Brunswick.

The Committee are of opinion that the time is now come to make a vigorous effort in order to place Acadia College in such a position as the state of Society and the wants of the Churches demand. This cannot be effected without an enlarged annual income. They earnestly entreat the Members of this Association to meet

the demand with corresponding liberality.

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They most cordially approve of the recent appointment of Dr. Cramp to the Presidency of the Institution, and they rejoice to know that in this connection the rising Ministry of the Churches will be favoured with the instructions of one so thoroughly competent to aid them in their researches after Spiritual truth, and to furnish them with such stores of useful knowledge as may, with the Divine blessing, qualify them to be able Winnsters of the New Testament. The Committee are encouraged to believe and hope that the zeal hitherto manifested will continue and increase, and that whatever funds may be required in order to carry on the operations which have been already commenced, will be cheerfully

furnished.

Brother Burpo's health, they have to report with gratitude, is considerably improved. Arthur Crawley, a young brother now at the Newton Institution, whose term of study will expire next fall, has also offered himself, the Committee understand, for Missionary service. They beg to recommend that the Board of Foreign Missions be requested to take steps whereby the leadings of Providence may be ascertained in relation to these brethren, so that, if it be judged proper to send them, they may travel and labour together.

[I.] LOMESTIC MISSIONS.

The Committee on Domestic Missions beg leave to Report:

That they consider this object to be of wast importance to the growing interests of the Redeemer's kingdom in our Province, and have to regret that so little has been done the past year in this good work in connection with this Association, and when we consider that thensands of precious souls are destitute of the preaching of the glorious Gospel within our reach, particularly among the poor neglected French. We therefore recommend to the brethren the importance of having at least one Missionary on the Gulf Shore as soon as possible, and also that a suitable Missionary be procured to labour among the French in the Eastern part of the Province, and

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as we are informed that a brother Knight, who in a great measure is qualified for the work, has his mind engaged on the subject, that a Committee be appointed to procure that Brother, and that means be provided to enable him to prosecute the work, and recommend to all our Churches that they take a deeper interest in our domestic Missions than we have hitherto done.

EDUCATION SOCIETY.

In presenting their annual report, the Committee are gratified in being able to state that the attendance at the Seminary during the year has been satisfactorily sustained. From the accompanying list of Students and Pupils it will appear that fifty-three had been in attendance either the whole year, or part of the time, of whom thirty

six were present at the annual examination in June.

The friends of the Society will rejoice to learn that two esteemed brethren, Messrs. Emerson and Hughes, Licentiates for the Ministry, have availed themselves of the opportunities afforded by the Institution for prosecuting their studies during the week, and on the Sabbath day have been engaged in preaching the Gospel in the vicinity of Fredericton. If young men of active disposition, who, possessing the essential pre-requisite of piety, are also gifted with a talent for communicating their thoughts, were encouraged to acquire knowledge, and secure for themselves that mental discipline and culture which are requisite for the enforcement of truth and conviction of error, it would not only be a lasting benefit to the rising ministers themselves, but would eminently tend to the edification of the churches, and their consequent establishment in the faith. And where a settled Minister cannot be supported, which ought not to be neglected without the most urgent necessity, the next most eligible method of supplying the deficiency is to secure the service of some pious young man on the Lord's day, and cheerfully allow him to pursue his studies in the interval, and at the same time provide him with the requisite means of defraying the expences that he must of necessity incur. Certainly such an arrangement seems far preferable to the plan of relying upon chance supplies, or allowing the meetings for worship to be almost if not entirely neglected.

The Committee received from the Treasurer of the General Union Society the sum of £20 9s. 13d. as appears from the cash account; and in accordance with suggestions often made by valuable friends of the cause, they appropriated £5 from the general (and for the purpose of enabling Brother Hughes to continue his studies at the

It is expected that the usual legislative grant will be received thus year as heretofore, but the accounts have been made up before the warrant has actually been issued, in order that they might be in time to be presented at the Eastern Association. When the cash account is finally settled, it will appear that a reduction of more than £12 has been effected upon the debt of the Society since last year.

The new arrangement for supplying the Steward's department

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took effect during the year, and the Committee desire to express their entire satisfaction with the manner in which Mr. and Mrs. Gunter have fulfilled the duties of that office, and they can with confidence invite Parents to make trial of the boarding establishment for their children in connexion with the School.

The Committee cannot close without adverting to the favourable position occupied by the denomination in reference to education, if they continue united in their efforts to promote it, and but evince as much zeal as the momentous nature of the subject demands of them; it does appear as though the divine approbation had not been altogether withheld from the exertions they have hithertow made; this ought to be a ground of encouragement for the fature, and a powerful stimulus to renewed and more concentrated, endeavours to redeem the pledge which the existence of the Society affords of the interest taken by the Denomination in the progress and improvement of the youth of the country.

The above Report having been submitted and adopted in connection with the Financial Report of the Seminary, it was unanimously
