





### THE WORKMEN'S LICENSE.

There is a general scarcity of labor in St. John at the present time. This applies to all the mechanical trades and to factory help also. It is particularly noticeable in the mechanical trade, where it has been found necessary to bring in men from outside to do the work on the new construction work now under way. In the building trades there is much more work on hand than usual and the outlook is that the demand for labor in these trades will be much larger next spring than it is now. The extensive harbor works in progress naturally give large employment and as there are practically no vacant houses in St. John at the present time, dwellings will have to be provided for the new people who are coming here. The housing problem is not an easy one now. It will be more difficult next spring when the demand for houses at

moderate rents will be made greater than the supply. Some provision must be made and the only way is to encourage men who know how to wield the saw and the trowel to come here and live; there will be plenty of work for them.

At the present time St. John exacts a license fee of \$7.50 on every person who comes to the city to work and whose name does not appear on the assessment list. For several years after its enactment this section of the assessment law was a dead letter. Then when the winter port business began to assume importance, an effort was made to compel those who resided outside the city limits, in the County of St. John, to pay the license. The matter resulted in a strenuous fight in the Legislature and as a result the residents of St. John County were made immune from the law.

mune from the law.

The reason given for such a law was that the average tax of a resident workman in St. John was \$7.50 and therefore anyone coming in from outside to compete should not have any advantage over the native whose name appeared on the assessment roll. This was quite logical at the time, but things have changed. The rates have been reduced so that the workman who formerly paid \$7.50 now pays but \$5, so that the newcomer is handicapped to the extent of \$2.50 and is denied the benefit of the franchise also. In 1910 the city received from business licenses \$1.827.50 and in 1911 \$1,745.50 less what was paid in commissions for their collection.

The responsibility for a condition of affairs which ought never to have existed lies at the door of those who demand the taxation of small incomes. Had no tax of this kind been levied it would not have been possible to get the Legislature to grant authority for the license


