Railway Commission Makes Important Ruling

INCREASE IN THE DEMURRAGE RATE

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The Dominion Railway Commission this afternoon issued an order granting the application of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Grand Trunk Railway, Canadian Northern Railway and Michigan Central Railroad to increase their demurrage on freight cars from \$1 per day to \$2 and \$3.

HOW TRAVEL IN SETTLERS IS DIVIDED

Robert Kerr Tells of Agreement Between Canadian Pacific S. S. Department and Other S. S. Lines. New York, Dec. 2.—Robert J. Kerr, former passenger traffic manager of the Canadian Pacific Railroad and still employed by the company in an advisory capacity, was a witness for the defence today before special examiner Pickett, in the government's suit against the members of the North Atlantic conference alleged to be a combination in restraint of interstate trade and foreign commerce in violation of the Sherman Law.

Berlin, Dec. 2.—Dr. Friederich Franz Friedman, a Berlin physician, after a decade of experimenting has given to the world a tuberculosis cure, which such men as Prof. Schleich, of the Virchow Hospital, declares will mark one of the greatest epochs in the history of medicine.

LIBERAL'S AFRAID TO SHOW POSITION ON NAVY POLICY

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The conduct of the opposition in barring the way against the early introduction of the government naval bill, has developed into a scandal. The plan which is being followed under the direction of Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the simple one of obstructing the debate on the address, so that the naval bill cannot be brought down in time for the Christmas holidays.

ARMISTICE IS NOT EXPECTED BEFORE TUESDAY EVENING

Sofia, Dec. 2.—The plenipotentiaries held a meeting at 8 o'clock this afternoon at Baglioni. It is considered probable that if any definite conclusion regarding the armistice will be reached before Tuesday night or Wednesday. The important point of the armistice have already been settled, such as the retention by the respective armies of direct to the troops at Tchalja.

RUSSIA PREPARING

Vienna, Dec. 2.—It is reported that the Austrian premier has threatened that if his three military bills are not passed without amendment by Dec. 10, the Reichsrath will be dissolved. These bills relate to the supply of horses, the supply to be granted to relatives of soldiers in the event of mobilization and to services to be rendered by private individuals and communes in case of war.

SENATIONAL STATEMENT BY GERMAN CHANCELLOR

Berlin, Dec. 2.—Germany stands firmly with Austria-Hungary in the conflict which has arisen between that country and Serbia, or for that matter, in any conflict which may be thrust upon the vital monarchy. In a brief pointed speech in the Reichstag today, the Imperial chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, made this declaration which is taken to mean unquestionably, a warning to Russia, although Russia was not named.

AMHERST'S ANNUAL BIG SHOW FORMALLY OPENED

Amherst, Dec. 2.—The Maritime Winter Fair is already in full swing with a large attendance from all parts of the maritime provinces. Col. H. Montgomery Campbell, the President of the Live Stock Association, is certainly to be congratulated upon the manner in which he and his executive officers have arranged the machinery of the organization, as not a moment of time is lost. There is something about all the time.

INTENTION OF THE CANADIAN NORTHERN TOWARD THE I. C. R.

Montreal, Dec. 2.—There has been much speculation in railway circles of late as to the Canadian Northern Railway's intention in applying to the Dominion government for authorization to cross the St. Lawrence from point in the city of Montreal. No definite information can be gleaned as to what point in the city the crossing will be made. It was stated today by a Canadian Northern official that the application to the government was purely a matter of form, as it is the company's intention at some future date to connect the Intercolonial Railway and some of the leading American roads.

ACCIDENT ON THE I. C. R.

B., Dec. 2.—About 7 o'clock this evening No. 200, the east-bound Ocean Limited, side swiped No. 24 the westbound freight at Upper Dorchester station with the result that the line was blocked and traffic suspended for nearly three hours. The passenger engine had a cylinder smashed, a draw bar on the baggage car was broken, and the end of a refrigerator car on the freight was stove in.

THE BURDEN OF TAXATION SHOULD FALL ON THE LAND IS A. B. FARMER'S OPINION

Secretary of Ontario Tax Reform Association Lectured Under Auspices of Canadian Club, Last Evening—Interested Audience Heard Him.

An interesting lecture on tax reform was delivered by A. B. Farmer, secretary of the Tax Reform Association of Ontario before a meeting held under the auspices of the Canadian Club in Trinity Church school room last evening. Mr. Farmer said that laws governing land had generally been made by landlords, and hence the landlords had usually escaped their fair share of the public burden. He argued that a public improvement should be placed on land values and that consequently the burden of taxation should be placed on land value. He attributed the remarkable growth of Vancouver to the removal of taxation from improvements to land values.

The question was often raised—would not a tax on land values amount to confiscation. It would if the landlords' tax was made equal to the value of the property. Cities now were confiscating a large measure of the value of a man's property created by his own labor. In most cases the old tax system confiscated 40 per cent of the value of the home. The city might use the money for improvements. A company refused the gift of land in Clinton where there was a high tax on buildings and paid \$40 a foot in Toronto, because of the low tax rate on construction there.

Continuing the speaker said the best method to get at the value of land was the former plan in use in Cleveland; the best man on earth would not get good assessment results with the present method of valuation. The speaker said he would not urge the exemption of improvements all at once, but that legislation should be secured permitting a reduction of taxes on improvements. So long as you penalize the erection of houses by putting on a municipal mortgage of 40 per cent, then you will have to go on erecting tuberculosis hospitals. One of the principal factors in the solution of various social problems was to establish a tax system which would favor the erection of healthy homes.

In concluding his remarks, Mr. Farmer said he would be pleased to answer questions bearing on the principle of the tax on land values.

Our System "Misericable"

A. H. Hamilton said St. John had a miserable system of taxation, and it would have to be reformed before the city could expand.

In reply to a question as to what would be done about leasehold property, Mr. Farmer said the only question was the adjustment of the lease and the lessor would pay that was a matter for the lawyers.

Mr. Farmer—There is a reason why the change should be gradual. In England the land tax was made an Imperial measure, because the landlords could not contract out of their taxes. If the change is gradual the process of readjustment of the incidence of taxation should not be difficult.

To another question Mr. Farmer said the system of business licenses was based on the principle of protection for the local man, and was intended to favor the eastern manufacturer and wholesaler.

Mr. Farmer—People in St. John are not so progressive putting paint on their buildings as in other places. That shows the assessor keeps his eyes open.

J. B. Jones—The assessors deny that they raise the assessment on painted property.

Mr. Farmer—Then they don't obey the law.

Ex-Ald. Potts and others took part in the discussion.

President Bullock briefly thanked the lecturer on behalf of the club, and the gathering dispersed.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRADE WAS HELD YESTERDAY

At the annual meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon J. M. Robinson was elected president for the next year; Joseph A. Likely was selected as vice-president, and the following were chosen members of the council: J. B. M. Baxter, M. P. P., F. C. Clements, J. W. Doherty, W. W. Hallamore, A. E. Marsie, J. L. McAvity, F. E. Schofield, Louis Simms, J. A. Tilton, W. H. Thorne.

H. C. Schofield presided at the meeting, which, at the opening, was one of the largest annual meetings in the history of the board in point of attendance.

Following the adoption of the minutes of the preceding meeting the annual report was received and adopted.

The president called the attention of the members to a number of communications received relative to the proposed Trade Mission to Europe, which has for its object the visitation of the trade centres of Europe by representatives of the Boards of Trade of the Dominion, and in which St. John is invited to participate. The matter was referred to the new council for their consideration and the matter left with the incoming council was the trip to the West Indies league.

The president announced that W. F. Hatheway had forwarded to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries a report on the matter of Navigation in the Bay of Fundy.

As two of the nominees for the office of president, withdrew previous to yesterday's meeting, the question of changing the constitution so as to give members the opportunity to select other nominees in similar contingencies in future was brought up by J. Hunter White. Accordingly Mr. White gave notice of a resolution to change the constitution relating to the section dealing with the election of officers.

The balloting was then proceeded with.

The annual reports were received and adopted by the meeting.

The financial report showed that whereas the Board began the year with a surplus of \$1,732, there is a deficit of about \$140 at the end of the year, making a total deficit of about \$2,122. From this amount there is to be deducted the sum of \$786 owing the Board by the Board of Trade Building Company.

Of the deficit \$240 was caused by the Commission campaign. On the Norton Griffiths banquet there was a shortage of \$75; the Old Home Week banquet caused a deficit of \$356; the Back to New Brunswick campaign caused another shortage of \$912 while there was an expenditure of \$883 for new furnishings for the new building of the board.

Deducting the \$786 due from the Board of Trade Building Company, the incoming council will have a deficit of about \$2,400, or an actual overdraft of \$1,400 to be financed.

Following the reception of reports the elections took place with the above results.

LABOR TAX UP IN COUNCIL DECIDES

Mayor Frink Points Out that Montreal Collects More Special Taxes than St. John—Suggests Reduction from \$7.50 to \$5.00 for Incoming Laborers.

LABOR TAX UP IN COUNCIL DECIDES

At the meeting of the common council yesterday the mayor protested against raising the labor tax.

The mayor brought up the question of the labor tax. He referred to the memorial of the Shipping Federation protesting that the by law had outlined any conditions that may have justified it, and that in view of the government money apportioned here the port should be thrown open to all Canadian laborers.

He referred to the circumstances under which the tax was adopted, the uproar and turmoil caused by bringing laborers here in car loads. No doubt, he said, men coming here to work would contribute to the rates. Things may have changed, but the principle of the tax remains the same; the city who share in the benefits of the city services should pay for them.

What Montreal Does. His Worship said he was tired of hearing that Montreal did not impose a tax, and that Montreal was a sort of mecca. The fact was, if Montreal did not tax people going to work on the docks it put a charge on everything else. Montreal last year collected \$317,000 in license tax, while St. John only charged \$7,000.

His Worship read a long list of the license fees exacted in Montreal, which was nearly double that of St. John.

Continuing, the mayor said the Metcalf Connection Company were complaining that they could not get money because of the labor tax, but it was the men leaving the city because they did not like the conditions of the work. Mr. Hodde, the superintendent, wanted a license fee of \$5.00, and some men left without paying taxes at all. A man could hardly expect to come here and work without paying the toll to the city.

Objects to "Head Tax" Term. Com. McLellan said that the C. P. R. and steamship companies were behind the move to abolish the tax. He objected to the tax being called a head tax, and suggested that it be called a license fee.

Many business men would kick if outsiders were allowed to come in and compete with them without paying a license tax. He thought the city should impose a license tax on many classes of business now exempt. Many of the superior people were only paying one-tenth of their property, but the wage earner was taxed to the limit.

Objects to Editorial. Com. Agar took exception to an editorial in an evening paper, criticizing a recent motion to issue bonds for the street cleaning and improvement instead of permanent work.

He was surprised that anybody had formed such an incorrect idea of the purpose of the bond issue. Of the total issue \$14,000 was for the permanent improvement of Charlotte street; \$10,275 for the granite pavement on King street; \$11,000 for sewers, always a subject for a bond issue; \$5,550 for the March Bridge abutment; a permanent work, and \$6,500 was to pay for the improvements on the Gordon lease, and \$4,300 for improvements on the Sleeth-Quinn lease; and \$2,140 was for work on Roddy's ground, which there was already a bond issue of \$61,000. Of a total issue of \$59,000, only \$24,000 was chargeable to the streets, and \$4,300 was \$25,000 repudiated work authorized by the commission. The balance was a legacy.

School. School. The public should know that \$21,000 of bonds were retired this year. We have only increased the debt by \$4,000.

The council adjourned.

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BOOM IS ON IN WEST

Winter Port Business Opens Up well—360,000 Bushels of Grain now in Elevator—The Empress' Cargo.

The winter port business on the West Side has commenced to boom in earnest and a large amount of grain was placed in the elevator yesterday from western points. Up to date 360,000 bushels have been received.

United States goods, such as canned meats and lard are coming forward in large lots. All along the C. P. R. from Winnipeg eastward freight cars are standing loaded for St. John West. The Royal Mail steamer Empress of Ireland, which left this port last Friday, took away a cargo valued as follows: Canadian goods, \$39,828; foreign goods, \$48,192, total \$248,020. In her freight were 24,000 bushels of wheat, 1193 boxes canned meats, 1000 tons lard and 173,283 feet of spruce deals.

The C.P.R. steamer Montrose, scheduled to sail Wednesday for London and Antwerp, will take away a heavy cargo including 88,000 bushels of grain.

OBITUARY

Rev. Ver. James McDonald. Very Rev. W. F. Chapman, V. G., administrator of the diocese of St. John, has received news of the death of the Right Rev. James Charles McDonald, Bishop of Charlottetown, P. E. I., which sad event occurred on Sunday evening after a lengthy illness. Bishop McDonald was the fourth Bishop of Charlottetown, his predecessors having been Mgr. Bernard Angus McEachern, died 1835; Mgr. Bernard Donald McDonald, died 1859; Mgr. Peter MacIntyre, died 1891. His Lordship was born at Allisay, St. Andrews, P.E.I., on June 14, 1840, so that he was in his 73rd year. He was educated at St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, and the Grand Seminary, Montreal. Father Chapman was a fellow student in both institutions. Ordained in Charlottetown, he served as professor in St. Dunstan's College for some time, and was rector from 1884 to 1890. The health of Bishop McDonald was failing. Father McDonald was named coadjutor, and on Aug. 28, 1890, he was consecrated with the title of Bishop of Iona. In the following year Bishop MacIntyre died, and on May 1, Mr. McDonald became the Bishop of Charlottetown. The deceased prelate was a member of the Council of Public Instruction for Quebec, and he was Governor of the Catholic Church Extension Society in Canada. He was zealous and vigorous, one of his aims being to bring the scholastic system in Charlottetown to a scholarly man, he was deeply interested in education generally, he was a devoted administrator, who was beloved by his flock and who will be very deeply regretted by all.

A meeting of the Archbishop and Bishops of the Maritime Provinces was held recently at Halifax and it is believed recommendations will be made to the Holy See for the appointment of a Coadjutor Bishop for Charlottetown. The action taken at Rome, if any, has not been announced.

After a long illness, Daniel Mott of Waterbury, V. G., passed away on Nov. 25. Mr. Mott was for a number of years an agent and collector for the firm of Messrs. Harris & Co., who he severed his connection with that firm he, with his son, started a general store under the firm name of D. Mott & Co. Besides his widow, he leaves four sons and three daughters. The sons are: Edith H. of New York; Rev. Marshall E. of North Adams, Mass.; Clarence H., at home, and William W. of Carleton, Me. The daughters are: Mrs. Edith H. of Waterbury; Mrs. Robert A. Wasson, of Bartlett, N.H.; and Miss Mary E. of New York; Dr. John C. and H. H. Mott, of St. John.

Joseph Quinn. The death took place yesterday morning at his residence, Main street, of Joseph Quinn, after a brief illness. Mr. Quinn was a carpenter by trade, and had a wide circle of friends in the city. He is survived by two sisters, Miss Agnes Quinn, and Mrs. Fitzpatrick both of this city.

PROSECUTION AGAINST POLITICIAN IS DROPPED. Toronto, Dec. 2.—The prosecution of Hon. A. G. MacKay former liberal leader in Ontario and now of Edmonton, by W. H. Haines for alleged alienation of his wife's affections was dropped when the case was reached before Justice Litch at the Milton Assizes today. Mrs. Haines, an inmate of Toronto Asylum had been subpoenaed to give evidence but the asylum authorities would not consent to the lady doing so.

CRUELTY IS CHARGED AGAINST POLICEMEN. Toronto, Dec. 2.—Police Commissioners will probe charges of brutality it made against three policemen today by Henry Lomas, manager of Tyrrell's bookstore. The alleged victim was a one-legged youth, Gordon Lockett, aged seventeen who was taking a drunken companion home when the police interfered. Mr. Lomas stated that the three policemen dragged Lockett along the street shaking and beating him, and that after he was handcuffed he was slapped in the face, thrown down and again beaten.

HAD THREE ACCIDENTS IN 48 YEARS ON ROAD. Toronto, Dec. 2.—After forty-eight years of railroading in the Grand Trunk service, conductor Richard Boudry, of 106 Beattie street, made his last trip on Saturday from Port Hope, a trip he has covered since when the Port Hope and Peterboro Railway controlled that section of the Midland division of the Grand Trunk. Despite the long service Mr. Boudry has only figured in three wrecks. The last one was at Agincourt 16 years ago.

MARKET BREAKS
FOLLOWING
VERDICT
New York, N. Y., Dec. 2.—The
supreme court's decision in the Harri-
man case upset the stock market
today after a listless morning session.
The announcement from Washington
was followed by an outburst of selling
with Union Pacific as the especial ob-
ject of attack. There were large sales
of Southern Pacific as well and virtu-
ally all of the favorite stocks including
industrials as well as railroads shared
in the movement. Union Pacific broke
2 1/2 points. Southern Pacific 2 and
Reading, Steel, Amalgamated and other
prominent shares a lesser amount.
The market met with support at the
lower levels and prices quickly rallied.
The decision was unexpected to many
persons, and the effect of the Harri-
man decision was to bring the market
back to a point of equilibrium. The
court's ruling would necessitate a
distribution of Union Pacific's holdings of
Southern Pacific. Some of the Harri-
man bond issues also advanced in the
belief that their retirement might be
made necessary as the part of ad-
justment which must now be made.
Southern Pacific collateral four at
one period registered a gain of 6 1/2
points, and Oregon short line four of
three points. The court's decision, how-
ever, opened up so many possibilities
for speculation as to the effects of the
readjustment, that one trading ele-
ment was confused and movements of
securities were erratic. Before the
close the market became heavy again.
The effect of the unfavorable bank
statement of last Saturday was shown
in the continued tension in the money
market. Call loans rose steadily from
an opening at 10 per cent. to 12
per cent. was reached. Later the rates
fell back to 6 per cent. Engagements
of a large share of the South African
gold offered in London today by New
York bankers did not serve to quiet
apprehensions as to the future course
of money rates. Stocks were unaf-
fected by money conditions, prices
having held firm until market was up-
set by the announcement of the Harri-
man decision. The chief influence of
high money rates was to reduce specu-
lation on the stock exchange to a
minimum.
Some of the specialties developed
market strength in the early part of
the day. Rubber rose to the high point
touched in the movement last April,
and tobacco issues were buoyant.
Aside from the Harri-man issues, the
general bond market was firm although
there was a shading in values in a
few isolated instances. U. S. bonds
valued at \$2,500,000. U. S. bonds were
unchanged on call.

LONGSHOREMEN WILL FIGHT ANY CHANGE IN TAX Official Says they will Oppose Suggestion to Reduce \$7.50 Rate on Laborers Coming into City. Mayor Frink yesterday strongly condemned the cry being raised by some parties that St. John is a mediocval city because it requires strangers to take out a license to work here. He showed that quite a number of city merchants are protected from outside competition by the regulation requiring persons coming to the city and engaging in the same line of business to take out a license. He also showed that Montreal imposes many times the number of restrictions upon trade that St. John does and read over a list of about 150 trades and employments which are subject to a license tax in Montreal. Com. McLellan intimated that he would probably move next year to have the license system revised so that people would have a chance to pay the same kind of license taxes they do in Montreal. An officer of the longshoremen's union called at the Standard office last evening and said the trade unions of the city were prepared to offer vigorous opposition to any reduction of the labor license at the present time or the establishment of any precedent for the issuing of blanket licenses. He said it was well known that the longshoremen, whose wages had remained stationary for the past five years, though the cost of living was increasing, intended to ask for more wages next fall, and the shipping federation were trying to get the privilege of bringing in anybody so they could resist the demand of the longshoremen.

THEY "PUT THE AN AGGRESSIVE CAMPAIGN PIPE" IN LOCAL MASHEE SHOPS FOR A GREATER ST. JOHN. New Officers of Board of Trade Plan to have High Salaried Publicity Expert and to Raise \$125,000 to Make Our Advantages Known Abroad. President, J. M. Robinson. Vice-president, Joseph A. Likely. The above list of officers selected at the annual meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon shows that the younger element which has grown to a considerable strength during the past year has been busy, and the election indicates that there has been organized work on the part of the younger members resulting in the election of what may be looked upon as their own ticket. With their own representatives now in office the younger element is expected to introduce an aggressive policy in the affairs of the board. Among the matters which it is understood are on the carpet, is the raising of the sum of \$2,000 annually for five years, which is to be devoted to the employment of a secretary to the board. In addition to performing the duties of secretary to the Board of Trade, the new official will also act as industrial commissioner, and publicity promoter and in making a list of the duties of the board. The prevailing sentiment is that by securing new industries for St. John not only the city but the whole province will be benefited. Accordingly it is hoped to persuade the provincial government to work in conjunction with the Board of Trade in bringing about this result. In the event of this proposal receiving favorable consideration, the government may later on be asked to aid in a material way, by helping to defray the additional expenditure.

CONSTRUCTION COMPANY IS NOT BLAMED TO WELCOME NEW BISHOP. Construction Company in Courtenay Bay not Responsible for Death of Harry McKenzie—Inquest Concluded. The inquest into the death of Harry McKenzie, who was drowned on Tuesday, Nov. 19th, and died in the hospital on the following day, was concluded before Coroner D. Berryman in the court house last evening. The evidence taken on a previous sitting was read over to the witnesses and signed, and only one witness was examined last evening. The jury brought in a verdict that death was due to shock caused by a stone accidentally falling on the man at Courtenay Bay, breaking his legs, and they further found that the construction company is in no way to blame and that every precaution had been taken to prevent just such an accident.
