C. P. FAST EXPRESS HURLED WORKMEN TO THEIR DEATH

Three Killed and Twenty Injured Near Port Arthur Thursday

Men Stepped from Behind Construction Train Just as Flier Was Passing--Toronto Girl Leaped from Hospital Window and Was Killed--Former Treasurer of Toronto Fair Arrested on Fraud Charge--Victim of Swedish Mate Found.

(Special to The Telegraph.) Port Arthur, July 30.—Three members of a construction party on the C. P. R. fifty miles west of here, were killed this morning by No. 2 East bound transcontinental train. The men were foreigners. They were working on a siding and stepped on the line from behind a construction train, just as the express swept around the curve. At least twenty were injured. The gang numbered sixty men and the train threw them right and left.

Philip O'Brien, a laborer, of Green Point, saw a covered wagon drive to the dump at dawn yesterday. Two men got out and lifted from the wagon, what the witness supposed to be only an old mattress. He saw the men pile a heap of brush on the mattress, pour oil over it and then set fire to the bundle.
