Canadian, British and Foreign.

[To the Associated Press.] New York, Sept. 17, p. m. The President-to-day ordered three vessels of war to New Orleans.

It is believed in official quarters that the white men's League for aggressive purposes are widespread in the South, and more serious than any suppose, and require prompt attention, especially in Louisiana.

MILITARY NEWS BY LOUISIANA. The news from Louisiana this morning indicates the rebellion to be practically ended.

The Insurgents have complied with the demands of the Federal Government, under protest, surrendered the State property to Gen. Knolly, and ordered the disbanding of their forces.

Brevet Gen. J. R. Brooks has been put in temporary command of the city of New Orleans. It is understood that the orders for despatching troops and men-of-war to New Orleans have been countermanded.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17. The Premier-to-day informed a deputation from Pontiac, who waited on him to request an examination of the north shore of the Ottawa river before granting a subsidy to any line to connect with the Pacific; that the Government did not intend to subsidize any railway north of the Ottawa river; that the eastern terminus would be a considerable distance north of Lake Nipissing; and that the Government would subsidize no railway more than one hundred miles east of the terminus. This is a blow in the face for Quebec, which is a province will not forgo.
