The Local Legislature.

FREDERICTON, MARCH 8.

Mr. LaBelle presented a petition from 133 residents of Restigouche, praying that the bill to render valid the county valuation for 1883 may not become law.

The House met again in the evening and considered the grant asked to make up the deficit in the exhibition account.

Mr. Wetmore contended that the administration had acted unconstitutionally in allowing a large commission to control the exhibition instead of leaving it in the hands of the Board of Agriculture, who were, he contended, vested by statute with power to control the exhibition.

The speaker would not examine validly the grant asked to make up the deficit in the exhibition account.

Mr. Adams contended that the grant asked to make up the deficit in the exhibition account was a large and important one, and that it was the duty of the Government to deal with them so that they may be conserved and contribute to the financial welfare of the country.

Mr. Adams denied that grants were made as charged by the Attorney-General and was prepared for any investigation.

House adjourned at 11.55 p. m.

FREDERICTON, MARCH 13.

Mr. Whetten introduced a bill to amend an act relating to the regulation and qualification of physicians and surgeons.

Mr. Landry said he had not certified the bill, and another one that he had not recommended it.

Mr. Hamilton said he thought the bill was extravagant and should not be passed. The bill was certified by Mr. Marshall, but after the Government had been defeated.

(Mr. Hamilton had the floor on adjournment.)

Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, MARCH 11.

Mr. Burpee (Sundbury) moved for copies of all correspondence between the Dominion Government and the Government of New Brunswick relating to the claim made by the latter for a balance sheet of the Intercolonial Railway known as Eastern extension since May 1878.

He explained that when the Eastern extension was first undertaken the Home Secretary agreed that it should be a portion of the I. C. R. If they were to give a guarantee of interest on \$3,000,000 sterling, as the British Government had agreed to do under arrangement; that the Canadian Government refused to take it as a portion of the road unless at a sum of \$894,000, being \$24,000 per mile of the I. C. R. in New Brunswick; that under a threat of building a parallel line, which would destroy the profit of the road, they were compelled to accept the offer; that since that time it has been ascertained that the I. C. R. costing \$24,000 per mile is actually costing \$40,000 per mile, entirely destroying the base of the road.

He showed that the New Brunswick had to pay the contractors Clarke, Austin & Co., \$444,000 of that sum, leaving only \$250,000 for New Brunswick, although New Brunswick had to pay the contractors \$400,000 of interest on \$3,000,000 sterling, as the British Government had agreed to do under arrangement; that the Canadian Government refused to take it as a portion of the road unless at a sum of \$894,000, being \$24,000 per mile of the I. The dragons and Graham's staff officers had many narrow escapes. At sunrise a Gardner gun and a 9 pounder were turned against the rebels, who were 1500 yards off the British and afforded an excellent target. The Arabs were soon compelled to return to their main position. Stewart's cavalry arrived at half-past six and took up their position on the British left, so as to turn the enemy's right. The engagement soon became general. The infantry and artillery completely routed the enemy from their pits and trenches. The battle had not lasted over half an hour when the victory of the British was made certain.

RECAPITULATION.
LONDON, March 15.—A dispatch from Graham, dated Camp Dignat Camp, 11.40 a.m., says:—The camp of the enemy has been taken after hard fighting. Over 70 British were killed and 100 wounded. As the British advanced, men sprang up sometimes within two hundred yards of them armed with spears and brandishing high shields. These would charge upon the British at breakneck speed until the latter's bullets laid them low. The British stormed the works where the rebels were in force. The blacks held out their shields and spears against the bullets and bayonets until the trenches were like one grave. It is reported that over 1,000 rebels were killed.

The British forces advanced in two brigades which were in the form of squares. A series of encounters followed. Soon after leaving Zariba a great body of rebels charged the leading square, spearing many of the British. The sailors inside the square immediately closed upon them and the rebels were repulsed with great slaughter. The advance was again resumed, when immense hordes rushed upon the British from both sides. A terrible struggle ensued. The Arabs fought with the greatest pluck and bravado, but nearly all were killed. The second brigade met with an obstinate resistance, and the galling gun and Gardner guns fell into the hands of the rebels and were only recovered after a severe fight, when the British gained possession of the rebel camp. The Hussars made a forward movement and cut off the rebels' retreat to Sinkat. It is hoped they will find there the families of the massacred garrison.

A number of rebels still hover around the camp and fire when the cattle are being watered. The native guides boiled when the square was broken. Further fighting is probable. The battle raged two and a half hours. The rebel loss is estimated at four thousand killed and six thousand wounded. The British covered the smoke crept close up to the British lines and dashed against the marines, the Sixty-fifth and Black Watch regiments, throwing them selves upon the bayonets of the British and giving and receiving. Great confusion ensued. The Sixty-fifth began to retreat, crowding upon the marines when all became intricately mixed. Gen. Graham and staff did their utmost to rally the men, a signal from the other brigade prevented a disaster. There were many narrow escapes among the officers. The horse of Gen. Buller was shot from under him. The pluck shown by the rebels is unexampled. The rebels entered the second square upon their hands and knees, beneath the fire of the galling guns and then commenced slashing with their weapons, doing terrible execution. The British were not much for them at close quarters.

LONDON, March 14.—The Queen has telegraphed to Gen. Graham her congratulations upon yesterday's victory. The Government has received congratulations upon the victory from foreign Embassies here.

The Post says it understands Baker Pasha will shortly be ordered to the British army with the rank of Major-General.

Tuesday his counsel obtained an
appeal to the Supreme Court. Early
this morning the warden of the jail
entered his cell and found Lucky Joe
lying on his back, dead, with a
bullet in his head, which was
covered with blood, as was the
prisoner's shirt and mouth. His

jaws fallen, and his limbs cold.
Help was summoned, and the body

and feet well frozen in it, and when
he heard footsteps in the corridor he
threw the snow into the air, and
therefore, when the jailer entered, he
saw Wilson's feet and hands so
cold as to leave no doubt of his
death.
