ST. LEONARDS TO BE RAILROAD CENTRE

Will Have Connection With C.P.R. Grand Trunk and International Lines.

EARLY OPERATIONS

St. Leonards, Oct. 23.—It is reported here that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway will begin the operation of trains from Moncton, N. B., its eastern terminus, to Edmundston, N. B., during the coming month. At this town and four some miles along the St. John river the new road is parallel to the Canadian Pacific railway; in fact the C.P.R., has built a considerable stretch, entailing expensive excavation, to the north of its former route, to permit the Grand Trunk Pacific to have its course next to the river.

The St. John Valley railroad, which will run from the city of St. John to the towns along the St. John river, has reciprocal relations with the G.T.P. which will be of great mutual advantage. This will enable the new transcontinental road to reach St. John over the St. John Valley tracks, and will give the latter road a connection with St. Leonards, which now has the Canadian Pacific and the International lines.

Van Buren, which is across the river from St. Leonards, in the State of Maine, is, it is understood soon to be entered by the Aroostook Valley line, which now runs to New Sweded, sixteen miles below Van Buren.

During the years that you have been our head there has always existed the most kindly feeling among the members towards you, and they have held you in their highest esteem. No greater harmony could have prevailed than that which was at all times evident.

Before the term of your office the Fire Brigade of the town consisted of a few firemen receiving yearly remuneration of ten or fifteen dollars. You were not long in seeing the defects of this system, and feeling that unity was necessary, the

GIRL WILL LEAVE JACK JOHNSON

To Give up Negro Pugilist and Return Home.

Chicago, Oct. 23.—It is announced that the nineteen-year-old girl, Lucille Cameron, whom Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist is alleged to have abducted, and for which he is to stand trial, has consented to give up the negro and return to her home in Minneapolis with her mother, Mrs. Cameron-Falconet.

When the girl appeared before the Federal Grand Jury yesterday she became hysterical and had to be removed to the office of the United States deputy marshal. The rumor sent broadcast on Saturday last that Johnson had been killed has had the effect of arousing hostility against him, and he has kept himself carefully secluded in the rooms above his cafe.

His bodyguard stationed in the saloon below and at his mother's residence turned all questioners away with the statement that Johnson would see no one. He refused to answer any telephone calls.

Following his rough experience of Saturday, when a mob of a thousand people threatened to lynch him, Johnson realizes that his life is not safe. At first he assumed an air of braggadocio, and swelled around his cafe with the remark that the advertisement was bringing in fine business, but later he came to the realization that in the crowds there might be some one who would take a shot at him.

He has received many warnings by telephone, letter and personal message that plans are being made to kill him. These plans are openly discussed on the cars, in saloons and everywhere the man congregates, and everybody believes that Johnson will yet be assassinated.

TO PROTECT SHEEP Lantern and Gun Keep Wild Animals at a Distance. A device to protect sheep from the incursions of wolves, coyotes, and other animals is the invention of a Westerner. The machine consists of an automatic gun which shoots a blank cartridge every thirty, forty, or sixty minutes, as arranged, while a bull's-eye lantern is so adjusted as to revolve and flash its light in every direction. It makes more than one revolution a minute, operating by means of a coiled spring and cog wheels, a sort of clockwork, in fact. The mechanism is inclosed in a sturdy and dust-proof metal case and mounted on four adjustable legs. It has a weight of 25 pounds, so that it can be carried with the sheepman's outfit with no difficulty.

THREATENED TO KILL LAWYER

Jack Johnson's Serious Threat

Chicago, Oct. 22.—When Attorney Charles E. Erbstein, representing the mother of Lucille Cameron, visited Jack Johnson's saloon yesterday in company with United States Deputy marshals to serve subpoenas on witnesses who were to appear before the federal grand jury today, the negro pugilist, became excited and threatened the lawyer with personal injury.

"Throw that lawyer out of the place or I will kill him," shouted Johnson to one of his bodyguards. Federal officers protected the attorney and served the pugilist's aged mother and nine employees of the saloon with subpoenas before leaving the place.

Several important witnesses against Johnson have disappeared and could not be found yesterday, but federal officers continued their search.

A despatch received from Sydney, N.S.W., states that Hugh McIntosh, who had offered Johnson \$50,000 for fights with Sam Langford and Sam McVey, or Joe Jeanette, has cancelled all negotiations.

McIntosh explains as a reason for his action that Johnson's part in the alleged abduction has so angered the sporting men and public of Australia that the matches were no longer desirable.

He declared that the liquor interests were responsible and deplored the fact that they had such influence. He considered the dismissal a serious blow to the church, and to the temperance cause, and gave Magistrate Kay credit for a carefully and fearless administration of his court.

THE AXE

Notice was received this week by harbor master G. E. Asker to hand over his books when called for to Mr. W. W. Doherty. This is the result of a farce which was played in the Waverly Hotel early in the summer and was termed an investigation. Mr. Asker was charged by Mr. O. Smith and others with being a violent partizan in the Dominion election of Sept. 1911. The finding of the commissioner is as usual not produced, but to those who listened to the evidence at the alleged investigation the violent partizanship shown by Mr. Asker consisted in the following facts. (1) On the polling day he walked up the street with a man who lived near him, both were liberals, both were voting at the same time, and going to vote at the same time, and that was all. Surely we are right in calling it a farce. It was clearly shown at the time of the enquiry that the Harbor master had to go to make room for a conservative worker who deserved an easy job, and he was rewarded.

This system of removing civil officials who serve the public faithfully and well irrespective of politics is a disgrace to any party, and the sooner that the civil service is taken out of the hands of politicians and placed on a business footing the better it will be for the country. No true progress in any land will ever be made while the people allow public positions to be juggled with and used as vote catchers, and looking to what has transpired in past years one would imagine that we Canadians were living in the dark ages when after the battle was heard the cry, "To the victors, the spoils". Much has been written in certain places regarding loyalty and America, yet we are striving everyday to imitate the American in everything. We accept their money gladly, while they refuse ours, we follow shamefacedly their crooked political pulls, while they laugh at us, and with loud voices we accept their doctrine and worship with them at the common altar of the golden calf "the almighty dollar." Away with all this mockery and despicable hypocrisy. Clear away this cruel and treacherous wring of removing respectable public servants no matter by which party, either liberals or conservative, for the benefit of party heeled who go into politics for what they can get out of it, and let the civil service stand where it stands today in the old land, an institution where politics is unknown, composed of men against whom no breath of scandal could ever be made.

MAIL SERVICES

Many complaints are being registered against the postal service, or lack of postal service on the side of the river. The other week as a case in point, no daily papers were delivered to Cross Point for two days, all the issues being received by subscribers on the third day. This we are informed is quite a common occurrence and one that ought to be remedied at once.

There seems no adequate reason why the mail delivery should be so uncertain unless it is that the clerks are unable to handle the mail matter on the short run from Matapedia to Cross Point, but that we think is far from the case.

The whole matter of rural mail service ought to be taken up by the various Boards of trade and the establishment of rural mail delivery advocated.

Take our own side of the river. Dalhousie is but 16 miles distant, on many occasions owing to the shortness of the distance the mail

BRITISH TRADE

Just at the time that the Duke of Westminster was calling together rich supporters of tariff reform to raise a million dollar fund for campaign purposes in Great Britain—even sending to Canada for help—British trade returns were being published, showing that the trade in the month of September was the best in the history of that great and prosperous country. The imports were valued at £57,184,788 an increase of £505,233 compared with September last year; the exports were £43,204,469, an increase of £6,385,215, and the re-exports were £8,034,788, an increase of £216,469. A glance at the figures for the last nine months shows more strikingly the immense gains made in trade during 1912. Imports were valued at £528,965,340, an increase of £39,570,231 compared with the same nine months in 1911; exports were £354,282,595, an increase of £24,104,708, re-exports £82,919,938, an increase of £5,386,324. When it is shown that the exports of British goods which stood at £23,300,000 in September, 1903, were valued last month at £43,200,000, not far from doubling in a period of nine years, it is not surprising that the people refuse to take the tariff reform nostrum. AFFINITY CASE IN BOSTON COURT

Nineteen Year Old Wife of William Ryan Arrested

Boston, Oct. 24.—Mrs. Phoebe Ryan, a very pretty nineteen-year-old girl from Shelburne, N. S., is the principal figure in an affinity case now before Judge Wentworth. She has admitted guilt of the charge brought against her, and Judge Wentworth will tomorrow announce his disposition of the case. Shelburne people will be deeply concerned in this affair, as the girl has several relatives there, and her first and legal husband, whom she married when a mere girl, is living there. He is William Ryan, said to be a seafaring man. The young woman who seems particularly well educated, says that following her early marriage to Ryan at Shelburne, they came to Boston to live, but that her husband was unsuccessful and he returned home. She went to live with her sister in Charlestown, and there, after a time, became acquainted with Henry V. Mace, Somerville, Mass. Between them a deep affection sprang up, and the young Mrs. Ryan is said to have announced that her husband had been lost at sea. In September of last year Mace married her, and the couple are said to have been very happy together. Then the fact that Ryan was still very much alive became known, and the girl's arrest followed. She is at the East Cambridge jail, broken-hearted.

Lynn, Mass., Oct. 24.—Although the police department has been making an effort to locate Mrs. E. M. Elliot and her three year old daughter, Beatrice, who disappeared on September 26, and who is said by her husband, Alfred Elliot, to have left town at the same time that William J. Lane, of 24 Staniford street, Boston, disappeared, no definite trace of them has been discovered. The Elliots came here from Nova Scotia. Her husband is anxious to find her because of his desire to secure possession of the little girl. No warrant has been issued, and the only interest which the police have in the case concerns the whereabouts of the woman and the child. Elliot says that his domestic affairs were not of the most pleasant kind for several weeks prior to the departure of his wife, and their furniture had been stored and she had lived with her sister, while he lived at a lodging house. He was surprised by her disappearance. He says he has traced his wife to Philadelphia and Chicago. A Man's Club Not in it With Violence of Suffragettes Says Writer.

Commenting on a statement made recently by a suffrage leader in New York, to the effect that the man's club and not the suffrage question is the real menace of the home, a Philadelphia newspaper writer, who evidently feels very deeply on the subject, says:

Is not the prosperity of some clubs due to the fact that home and husband are neglected by the woman of the house, while she engages in the propaganda of votes for women? The club, as an institution, is not inimical to domesticity. The suppression of the elemental feminine instincts of delicacy and refinement, as exemplified in the disgusting conduct of certain English women who are no better than raving Anarchists, is sure to undermine the foundations of the home and destroy the integrity of the family.

The man's club is chiefly patronized by young men who are not yet married. Older men find it a convenient meeting place for business conference or social purposes. It is often the greatest possible relief to the housekeeper to have a large dinner, for which the household facilities are scarcely adequate, given by the impersonal, institutional resources of the club chef and his assistants.

In this way the club may be an invaluable auxiliary of the domestic and private establishment, in the case of a man whose position is such that he is often called upon to be the host at large and formal affairs. To intimate that the club, which brings men together in sociable amity is a foe to well-ordered existence comparable with the disruptive, antagonistic influences of lawless and unbridled violence that the "militant suffragette" and the "shrieking sisterhood" would release upon society is indeed to talk ridiculously.

A WOMAN'S LATE CONFESSION

A Maine Woman Who Sent Man to Jail For Stealing Now Confesses

Augusta, Me., Oct. 18.—The following remarkable letter will play a part in the hearing to-day before the Governor and council on the petition of Wm. H. Eldridge, of Anagnance, N. B., for a pardon:

"Howland, Me., July 5, 1912.—To Mr. Wm. H. Eldridge: I will write you a few lines. I am sick, and the doctor says that I can't get well again, so I will say that you are not guilty of the crime which you are in prison for. I was hired to help put a job on you to get you out of town. I did not lose my money at all, but they got me to swear that you robbed me of \$85. I am sorry for you, but I hope that you will not hold a bad feeling against me. I ask you to forgive me for doing this, wrong thing. I will say that you ought to be let out to go home to your family. Well, I have told you all. I ask you to forgive me. You know that I am the one who sent you there. Signed Mrs. Ellen Lee, Howland, Maine."

Mrs. Lee died later in the month, a short time after the letter was written. Eldridge has served two years and eight months of a four year sentence in the state prison on a charge of robbing Mrs. Lee of \$85 at the point of a rifle, Oct. 21, 1909.

The petition is signed by W. H. McKay and forty-three other residents of Edinburgh and Passadumkeag. Eldridge has a wife and children living in destitute circumstances in Anagnance, N. B.

London, Oct. 22.—Terrible as the fascination of the war in the Balkans is, we in England during the past week have been absorbed with our own tremendous conflict. This conflict received additional impetus and enormously increased bitterness owing to the violent scene between Councillor Lloyd George and the Unionist landlords in the House of Commons Tuesday night.

Challenged as to private committee which was appointed and financed by Lloyd George and the other advanced land reformers to inquire into land conditions in England, Lloyd George refused peremptorily to promise that the names of witnesses should be revealed to the landlords. The obvious reason for this refusal is that the inquiry deals largely with the wholesale intimidation exercised by the landlords over all the rural land holders and that unless the witnesses to this tyranny are protected from the landlords, every one would refuse information lest as a marked man, he could be ruined by the landlords' party.

When the Unionists discovered that Lloyd George would not thus play into their hands they burst into a tornado of hissing, yelling continuously for minutes at a time, threw insults at Lloyd George, drowned his voice every time he attempted to speak and when he had defied and beaten them after a quarter of an hour's fierce struggle, took their revenge by hissing and hooting him as he left the chamber—an unprecedented form of outburst in the annals of the House of Commons.

This terrible outburst took place too late at night to receive full record in the next morning London papers, but the story gradually reached them, and the public, and the scene now is realized as the great turning point in the history both in the immediate and remote future of English politics.

The Liberal papers first noted the remarkable contrast between the comparative tranquility of the Unionists in fighting Home Rule and their ebullient passion when they were assailing Lloyd George. This leads to the conclusion that what really interests and excites the English Unionists is not home rule for Ireland but their own threatened monopoly of land in England and their century old domination of the rural England.

The scene also justifies Lloyd George's skilful strategy, which by the starting of the land campaign, gives the British Radicals a new great programme, which may sweep the country in the next election and submerge in interest all the other topic, including the Home Rule Bill.

Minimized Ice Danger
On the steamship Royal Edward, from Bristol, was Dr. Meyer Coplans, bacteriologist of public health in the University of Leeds, Eng. Dr. Coplans made the voyage for the purpose of testing an apparatus he has invented as an aid to navigators in fog and haze and for detecting the presence of icebergs. His instrument "nose" the presence of icebergs three miles and a half away and sounded an alarm on three occasions in the vicinity of the ice.

According to exhaustive tests by two German scientists one coat of paint or varnish protects iron from corrosion better than two or more coats.

Carnotite, a mineral found in Colorado, has been found sufficiently radio-active to produce shadow photographs resembling those made by X-rays.

RESTIGOUCHE SALMON BREAKS RECORD

Archibald Mitchell's Salmon Weighing Over 40 Pounds Awarded First Prize

In a recent issue the Norwich (Conn.) Bulletin says:— Anglers of this vicinity will be interested to learn that Archibald Mitchell of this city has been notified by Field and Stream, one of the leading magazines of the country devoted to sports, that the 40 1/2 pound salmon that he killed last June on his fishing preserve on the Restigouche river in Canada has been awarded first prize in the recent game fish contest for 1912 for the largest Atlantic salmon taken with a fly on the American continent. The prize is a silver cup with the winner's name and the record of the fish engraved. The prize winning fish is being mounted in Bangor, Me., and will be placed on exhibition at sometime in the near future in one of the show windows of the Porteous & Mitchell company, together with the trophy and the fly and tackle on which the fish was taken. The story of the killing of this large fish will be published in the next issue of the magazine. Mr. Mitchell owns his own fishing grounds at Desdise and is one of the many sportsmen who enjoy the fishing on the Restigouche.

GREEK KILLS SISTER AND FLEES FOR HOME

Murderer in Chicopee, Mass., Quarreled With Girl Over Her Love Affairs.

Chicopee, Oct. 24—John Pitropoulos, 20 years old, shot and instantly killed his sister, Theodora, aged 18, at 25 Centre street, in a quarrel over love affairs. Pitropoulos fired two shots, the first taking effect, but the second was diverted by the interference of Anastasius Andripoulos, his brother-in-law. The murderer escaped on a trolley bound for Springfield.

Peter Mangos and Andripoulos, who witnessed the tragedy, said that Theodora was in love with Peter Fanos. Andripoulos said that Pitropoulos returned from work about 6 o'clock. After supper, Theodora went into the corridor and was followed by Pitropoulos, who was talking about Fanos's affections. Before any one was aware, the girl was dragged into the kitchen and shot in the right side of the neck. The bullet severed the jugular vein and penetrated the brain.

Pitropoulos has lived in this city a year, coming from Greece, and worked in the Dwight mills as a weaver. During the last week, according to Andripoulos, he talked many times about the war in the Far East, and it is thought he is on his way to New York and thence to Greece. Members of the household said that Pitropoulos persistently warned his sister against keeping company with Fanos. Mrs. Pitropoulos was hysterical after the murder and could not discuss the case. Andripoulos said Pitropoulos carried a revolver for some time. He said he was in the adjoining room when the first shot was fired and ran out and wrested the weapon from the murderer.

LIBERAL WINS IN RICHLIEU

Sorel, Que., Oct. 24.—The by-election for the House of Commons to fill the vacancy for the county of Richlieu caused by the unseating of the sitting member, took place today and resulted in the return of Arthur Carlin, Liberal, by a majority of 301, the complexion of the division thus remaining unchanged.

LITTLE MIX-UX IN CHURCH EXCHANGE

Two Clergymen in Hand For One Pulpit in North Shore Town.

Newcastle, Oct. 22—A mysterious mix-up among provincial clergymen occurred in a North Shore town on Sunday: One of the pastors was exchanging pulpits with a brother minister from a neighboring town. The visiting clergyman arrived Saturday afternoon to fill the appointment and became comfortably ensconced in the parsonage. About half an hour before church-time on Sunday morning a stranger arrived there and announced that he was Mr. So-and-so, who had come from St. John to preach for the pastor in response to a telephone message. Consternation reigned for some time, explanations were earnestly sought for. The nearest explanation that can be given now is that a prominent St. John clergyman who was visiting the North Shore town, the end of the week, decided to remain over Sunday and telephoned a brother minister in St. John to send a supply to his church. The clergyman in St. John misunderstood the name for a prominent clergyman of the North Shore town and very promptly sent a supply to that town instead of to his church in St. John.

OCEAN LIMITED WILL BE CONTINUED

Intercolonial Railway will Maintain Present Train Service until End of the Year

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 18—It has been decided that the Ocean Limited Express on the Intercolonial Railway will be continued as a daily train between Montreal and Halifax and that there will be no general change of time as is usual in October. The patronage given by the travelling public to the Ocean Limited has made this step necessary, for since the summer months the rush of travel has been increasing instead of diminishing. The Maritime Express will also be continued as usual, leaving Montreal daily except Saturday for all points East of Campbellton, and daily for points between Montreal and Campbellton. Regarding local trains no changes are announced.
