MURDER IN ST. SYLVESTER, QUE.

A New 77 Years Old Murderer Another in a Dispute About Land.

Quebec, Aug. 2.-Full particulars of the St. Sylvester murder reached town, on Saturday night, with the district coroner, who returned from holding the inquest, bringing with him as prisoners Francois, Jean Nappert, Simon Nappert and Jean Nappert, Jr., who were at once lodged in goal on a warrant charging them with wilful murder and complicity therein.
